A certified public accountant.

**certitude** Something that someone firmly believes is true.

The question may never be answered with **certitude**.

In a way that relates to the observation and treatment of actual patients

**clinically** rather than theoretical or laboratory studies.

They calmly and **clinically** documented the ongoing destruction.

**convinced** Having a strong belief or conviction.

Were **convinced** that it would be to their advantage to join.

(of a victory or a winner) leaving no margin of doubt; clear.

**convincing** There is no **convincing** evidence that advertising influences total alcohol

consumption.

**credible** Appearing to merit belief or acceptance.

A **credible** threat.

**decided** (of a quality) definite; unquestionable.

At a distinct or **decided** disadvantage.

definite Known for certain.

**dependable** Worthy of reliance or trust.

A **dependable** supply of cold beer.

**documented** Furnished with or supported by documents.

The first **documented** case of shark attack in those waters.

**established** Brought about or set up or accepted especially long established.

The **established** social order.

formally In terms of form or structure.

He was **formally** attired.

indisputable Not open to question; obviously true.

**Indisputable** evidence of a witness.

(of a new method, system, or treatment) tried and tested.

A proven liar.

reliable A reliable person or thing.

**Reliable** information.



scientifically With respect to science; in a scientific way.

Everything is planned out **scientifically**.

Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely.

**Sure** of her friends.

An arrangement whereby a person a trustee holds property as its nominal

**trust** owner for the good of one or more beneficiaries.
