<b>accredit</b>	Ascribe an achievement to. <i>He was <b>accredited</b> with being one of the world's fastest sprinters.</i>
<b>accuracy</b>	(mathematics) the number of significant figures given in a number. <i>The <b>accuracy</b> of radiocarbon dating.</i>
<b>assurance</b>	A positive declaration intended to give confidence; a promise. <i>She drove with <b>assurance</b>.</i>
<b>assured</b>	Characterized by certainty or security. <i>A tiny but <b>assured</b> income.</i>
<b><u>authentic</u></b>	Conforming to fact and therefore worthy of belief. <i>Every detail of the film was totally <b>authentic</b>.</i>
<b>authenticated</b>	Established as genuine.
<b>authorized</b>	Endowed with authority. <i>The <b>authorized</b> biography.</i>



<b>believable</b>	Capable of being believed. <i>She felt that Dawn's story was not quite <b>believable</b>.</i>
<b>certain</b>	Certain to occur destined or inevitable. <i>Felt <b>certain</b> of success.</i>
<b>certified</b>	Fit to be certified as insane and treated accordingly. <i>A <b>certified</b> public accountant.</i>
<b>certitude</b>	Something that someone firmly believes is true. <i>The question may never be answered with <b>certitude</b>.</i>
<b>clinically</b>	In a way that relates to the observation and treatment of actual patients rather than theoretical or laboratory studies. <i>They calmly and <b>clinically</b> documented the ongoing destruction.</i>
<b>convinced</b>	Having a strong belief or conviction. <i>Were <b>convinced</b> that it would be to their advantage to join.</i>
<b>convincing</b>	(of a victory or a winner) leaving no margin of doubt; clear. <i>There is no <b>convincing</b> evidence that advertising influences total alcohol consumption.</i>
<b>credible</b>	Appearing to merit belief or acceptance. <i>A <b>credible</b> threat.</i>
<b>decided</b>	(of a quality) definite; unquestionable. <i>At a distinct or <b>decided</b> disadvantage.</i>
<b>definite</b>	Known for certain. <i>I want a <b>definite</b> answer.</i>
<b>dependable</b>	Worthy of reliance or trust. <i>A <b>dependable</b> supply of cold beer.</i>
<b>documented</b>	Furnished with or supported by documents. <i>The first <b>documented</b> case of shark attack in those waters.</i>
<b>established</b>	Brought about or set up or accepted especially long established. <i>The <b>established</b> social order.</i>
<b>formally</b>	In terms of form or structure. <i>He was <b>formally</b> attired.</i>
<b>indisputable</b>	Not open to question; obviously true. <i><b>Indisputable</b> evidence of a witness.</i>
<b>proven</b>	(of a new method, system, or treatment) tried and tested. <i>A <b>proven</b> liar.</i>
<b>reliable</b>	A reliable person or thing. <i><b>Reliable</b> information.</i>

<b>scientifically</b>	With respect to science; in a scientific way. <i>Everything is planned out <b>scientifically</b>.</i>
<b>sure</b>	Definitely or positively sure is sometimes used informally for surely. <i><b>Sure</b> of her friends.</i>
<b>trust</b>	An arrangement whereby a person a trustee holds property as its nominal owner for the good of one or more beneficiaries. <i>The experience destroyed his <b>trust</b> and personal dignity.</i>
<b>trustworthy</b>	Worthy of trust or belief. <i>An experienced and <b>trustworthy</b> traveling companion.</i>
<b>verifiable</b>	Able to be checked or demonstrated to be true, accurate, or justified. <i>There is not a single <b>verifiable</b> fact.</i>
<b>verified</b>	Proved to be true. <i>A <b>verified</b> claim.</i>
