## Testimonials as a Noun

### Definitions of "Testimonials" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “testimonials” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Something that serves as evidence.*
- *Something given or done as an expression of esteem.*
- *Something that recommends (or expresses commendation of) a person or thing as worthy or desirable.*



## Synonyms of "Testimonials" as a noun (4 Words)

- good word** That which is pleasing or valuable or useful.
- recommendation** The action of recommending something or someone.  
*Her pleasant personality is already a **recommendation**.*
- testimony** A solemn protest or declaration.  
*According to his own **testimony** he can't do it.*
- tribute** A proportion of ore or its equivalent, paid to a miner for his work, or to the owner or lessor of a mine.  
*His victory in the championship was a **tribute** to his persistence.*



## Associations of "Testimonials" (30 Words)

<b>advice</b>	Guidance or recommendations offered with regard to prudent future action. <i>On their solicitors <b>advice</b> the trustees have accepted 577 000 by way of compensation.</i>
<b>advise</b>	Inform (somebody) of something. <i>Sleeping pills are not <b>advised</b>.</i>
<b>adviser</b>	An expert who gives advice. <i>An <b>adviser</b> helped students select their courses.</i>
<b>advisor</b>	An expert who gives advice. <i>The United States sent military <b>advisors</b> to Guatemala.</i>
<b><u>apprise</u></b>	Gain in value. <i>Have the students been <b>apprised</b> of the tuition hike.</i>

<b>communication</b>	Means of travelling or of transporting goods, such as roads or railways. <i>Satellite <b>communications</b>.</i>
<b>consultant</b>	A hospital doctor of senior rank within a specific field. <i>A <b>consultant</b> paediatrician.</i>
<a href="#"><u>counsel</u></a>	Give advice to. <i>The <b>counsel</b> for the defence.</i>
<b>counseling</b>	Something that provides direction or advice as to a decision or course of action.
<b>encomium</b>	A formal expression of praise.
<b>expostulation</b>	The act of expressing earnest opposition or protest.
<b>feedback</b>	Information about reactions to a product, a person's performance of a task, etc. which is used as a basis for improvement. <i>Punk Rock Girl opens the disc with plenty of guitar <b>feedback</b>.</i>
<b>guidance</b>	The act of guiding or showing the way. <i>He looked to his father for inspiration and <b>guidance</b>.</i>
<b>hortative</b>	Giving strong encouragement.
<b>hortatory</b>	Tending or aiming to exhort. <i>A series of <b>hortatory</b> epistles.</i>
<b>letter</b>	Inscribe letters or writing on. <i>The officer in the incident got in trouble for following the <b>letter</b> of the law.</i>
<b>monition</b>	A formal notice from a bishop or ecclesiastical court admonishing a person not to do something specified. <i>A letter of <b>admonition</b> about the dangers of immorality.</i>
<b>nomination</b>	The act of officially naming a candidate. <i>His <b>nomination</b> was hotly protested.</i>
<b>offer</b>	Something offered as a proposal or bid. <i><b>Offer</b> prayers to the gods.</i>
<b>paeon</b>	A formal expression of praise. <i>A <b>paeon</b> of praise for the great poets.</i>
<b>proposal</b>	The act of making a proposal. <i>A set of <b>proposals</b> for a major new high speed rail link.</i>
<a href="#"><u>propose</u></a>	Propose or intend. <i>He <b>proposed</b> a new nine point peace plan.</i>
<a href="#"><u>proposition</u></a>	Make a suggestion of sex to (someone), especially in an unobvious way. <i>Setting up your own business can seem an attractive <b>proposition</b>.</i>



<b><u>reciprocate</u></b>	Feel (affection or love) for someone in the same way that they feel it for oneself. <i>The engine <b>reciprocates</b> the propeller.</i>
<b>recommend</b>	Make (someone or something) appealing or desirable. <i>A book I <b>recommended</b> to a friend of mine.</i>
<b>recommendation</b>	Something that recommends (or expresses commendation of) a person or thing as worthy or desirable. <i>Her pleasant personality is already a <b>recommendation</b>.</i>
<b><u>submit</u></b>	Hand over formally. <i>The lawyers <b>submitted</b> the material to the court.</i>
<b><u>suggest</u></b>	Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine. <i>Are you <b>suggesting</b> that I should ignore her.</i>
<b>suggestion</b>	Persuasion formulated as a suggestion. <i>Here are some <b>suggestions</b> for tackling the problem.</i>
<b>tribute</b>	Something given or done as an expression of esteem. <i>A symposium organized to pay <b>tribute</b> to Darwin.</i>
