## Text as a Noun

### Definitions of "Text" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “text” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *Written or printed words, typically forming a connected piece of work.*
- *A text message.*
- *A script or libretto.*
- *The main body of a book or other piece of writing, as distinct from other material such as notes, appendices, and illustrations.*
- *A book or other written or printed work, regarded in terms of its content rather than its physical form.*
- *A book prepared for use in schools or colleges.*
- *The main body of a written work (as distinct from illustrations or footnotes etc.*
- *Fine, large handwriting, used especially for manuscripts.*
- *A passage from the Bible or other religious work, especially when used as the subject of a sermon.*
- *A written work chosen or set as a subject of study.*
- *Data in the form of words or alphabetic characters.*
- *A textbook.*

- A piece of written or printed material regarded as conveying the authentic or primary form of a particular work.
- The words of something written.
- A passage from the Bible that is used as the subject of a sermon.
- A subject or theme for a discussion or exposition.

### **extract**

A preparation containing the active ingredient of a substance in concentrated form.  
*A shampoo with **extract** of camomile.*

### **issue**

Supplies as food or clothing or ammunition issued by the government.  
*He died without **issue**.*

### **line**

A contour or outline considered as a feature of design or composition.  
*I can't draw a straight **line**.*

<b>motif</b>	A leitmotif or figure. <i>The colourful hand painted <b>motifs</b> which adorn narrowboats.</i>
<b>narrative</b>	The practice or art of telling stories. <i>The dialogue and the <b>narrative</b> suffer from awkward syntax.</i>
<b>passage</b>	A narrow way allowing access between buildings or to different rooms within a building a passageway. <i>He picked up the newspaper and read the <b>passage</b> again.</i>
<b>point</b>	The angular interval between two successive points of a compass i e one eighth of a right angle 11 15. <i>It took her a long time to come to the <b>point</b>.</i>
<b>printed work</b>	A picture or design printed from an engraving.
<b>quotation</b>	A passage or expression that is quoted or cited. <i>A great argument with much <b>quotation</b> of Darwin.</i>
<b>school text</b>	A large group of fish.
<b>schoolbook</b>	A textbook used in a school.
<b>script</b>	Writing using a particular alphabet. <i>Her neat tidy <b>script</b>.</i>
<b>subject</b>	The subject matter of a conversation or discussion. <i><b>Subjects</b> were asked to complete a questionnaire.</i>
<b>text edition</b>	A passage from the Bible that is used as the subject of a sermon.
<b>textbook</b>	A book used as a standard work for the study of a particular subject. <i>His economics <b>textbook</b> is in its tenth edition.</i>
<b>textual matter</b>	Having consequence.
<b>theme</b>	The first major constituent of a clause, indicating the subject matter, typically being the subject but optionally other constituents, as in 'smitten he is not'. <i>The first violin takes up the <b>theme</b> high up in its register.</i>
<b>topic</b>	Some situation or event that is thought about. <i>It was a very sensitive <b>topic</b>.</i>
<b>transcript</b>	Something that has been transcribed; a written record (usually typewritten) of dictated or recorded speech. <i>He read a <b>transcript</b> of the interrogation.</i>
<b>verse</b>	Literature in metrical form. <i><b>Verse</b> drama.</i>
<b>wording</b>	The manner in which something is expressed in words. <i>The standard form of <b>wording</b> for a consent letter.</i>

- words** The words that are spoken.  
*I listened to his **words** very closely.*
- work** A place where work is done.  
*Extra costs caused by additional building **works**.*



## Usage Examples of "Text" as a noun

- *His economics textbook is in its tenth edition.*

- *He took as his text the fact that Australia is paradise.*

## Associations of "Text" (30 Words)

- alphabet** A character set that includes letters and is used to write a language.  
*The first letter of the **alphabet**.*
- annotate** Add notes to (a text or diagram) giving explanation or comment.  
*He **annotated** on what his teacher had written.*
- annotation** A comment or instruction (usually added).  
***Annotation** of prescribed texts.*

<b><u>bibliography</u></b>	A list of the books referred to in a scholarly work, typically printed as an appendix. A <b>bibliography</b> of his publications.
<b><u>decipher</u></b>	Convert code into ordinary language. Visual signals help us <b>decipher</b> what is being communicated.
<b><u>descriptive</u></b>	Describing or classifying in an objective and non-judgemental way. The text contains some good <b>descriptive</b> passages.
<b>dictation</b>	Speech intended for reproduction in writing. He signed and mailed his <b>dictation</b> without bothering to read it.
<b><u>document</u></b>	Support or accompany with documentation. The parents <b>documented</b> every step of their child s development.
<b>dramaturgy</b>	The theory and practice of dramatic composition. Studies of Shakespeare s <b>dramaturgy</b> .
<b>hieroglyphic</b>	Resembling hieroglyphic writing. Without the Rosetta Stone it is likely that Egyptian <b>hieroglyphics</b> would still be a mystery.
<b><u>indent</u></b>	An indentation. An <b>indentured</b> servant.
<b>indentation</b>	The formation of small pits in a surface as a consequence of corrosion. An <b>indentation</b> for each change of speaker.
<b>inscription</b>	Letters inscribed (especially words engraved or carved) on something. The <b>inscription</b> on her headstone.
<b>lexicographer</b>	A compiler or writer of a dictionary; a student of the lexical component of language.
<b><u>linguistic</u></b>	Relating to language or linguistics. A child s <b>linguistic</b> ability.
<b>notation</b>	A note or annotation. Algebraic <b>notation</b> .
<b>palimpsest</b>	Something reused or altered but still bearing visible traces of its earlier form. Sutton Place is a <b>palimpsest</b> of the taste of successive owners.
<b>paragraph</b>	Write about in a paragraph. The concluding <b>paragraph</b> .
<b><u>quote</u></b>	A passage or expression that is quoted or cited. He is <b>quoted</b> as 9 2 favourite to score the first goal of the match.

<b>record</b>	Anything such as a document or a phonograph record or a photograph providing permanent evidence of or information about past events. <i>They <b>recorded</b> her singing.</i>
<b>stenographer</b>	A person whose job is to transcribe speech in shorthand. <i>A court <b>stenographer</b>.</i>
<u><b>subliminal</b></u>	(of a stimulus or mental process) below the threshold of sensation or consciousness; perceived by or affecting someone's mind without their being aware of it.
<u><b>summarize</b></u>	Give a summary (of). <i>I will now <b>summarize</b>.</i>
<u><b>transcribe</b></u>	Rewrite or arrange a piece of music for an instrument or medium other than that originally intended. <i>The anthropologist <b>transcribed</b> the sentences of the native informant.</i>
<b>transcript</b>	A written or printed version of material originally presented in another medium. <i>You can obtain a <b>transcript</b> of this radio program by sending a self addressed envelope to the station.</i>
<b>transcription</b>	A written or printed version of something; a transcript. <i>They produced a complete <b>transcription</b> of the journals.</i>
<b>transliterate</b>	Rewrite in a different script. <i>Names from one language are often <b>transliterated</b> into another.</i>
<u><b>verbatim</b></u>	Copied, quoted, or translated in exactly the same words as were used originally. <i>Repeated their dialog <b>verbatim</b>.</i>
<u><b>write</b></u>	Underwrite an insurance policy. <i>She <b>writes</b> code faster than anybody else.</i>
<b>writing</b>	Handwriting. <i>A leather product with gold <b>writing</b> on it.</i>
