### **Definitions of "Texts" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “texts” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A passage from the Bible that is used as the subject of a sermon.*
- *The main body of a written work (as distinct from illustrations or footnotes etc.*
- *A book prepared for use in schools or colleges.*
- *The words of something written.*



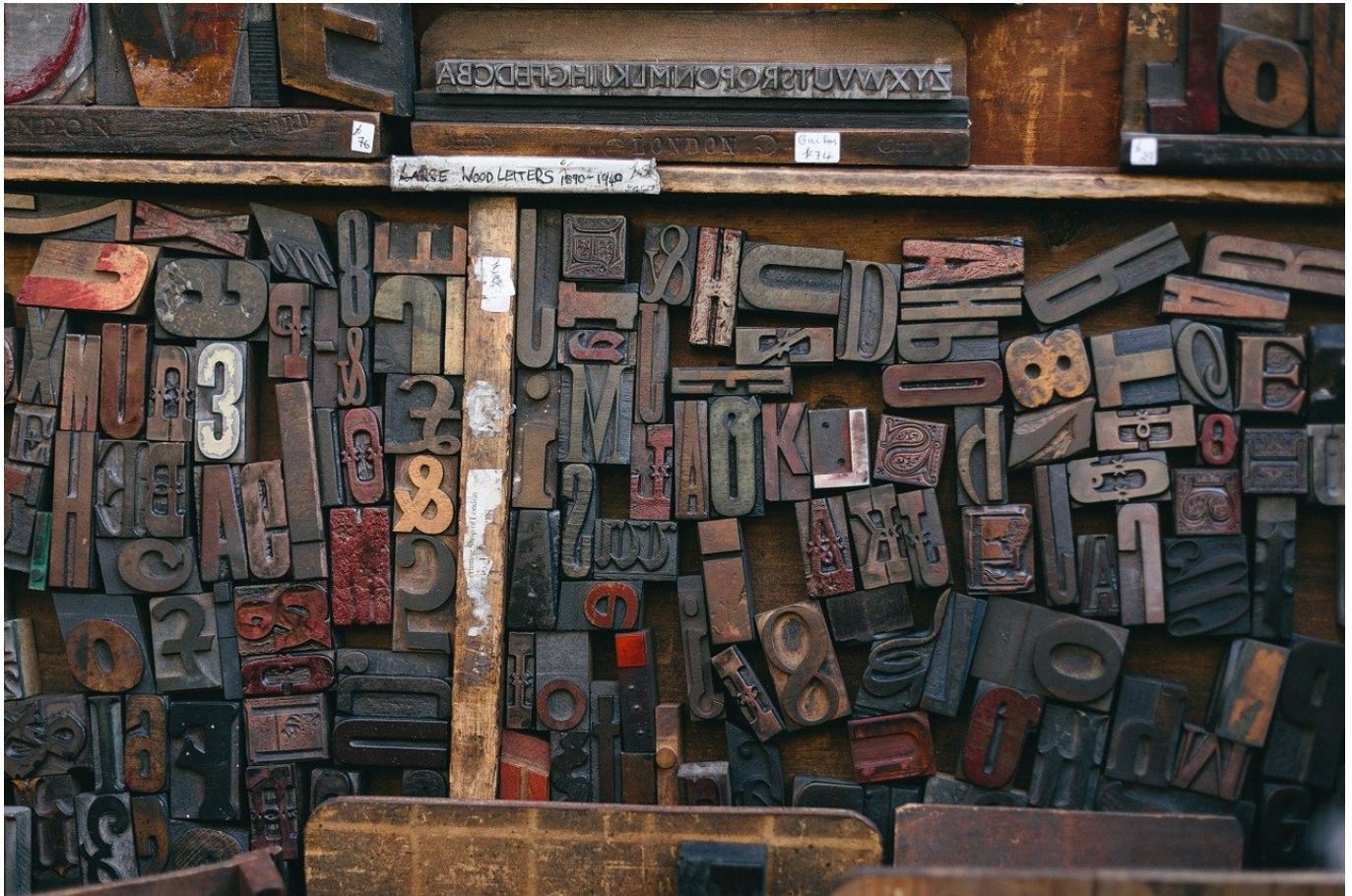
## Synonyms of "Texts" as a noun (5 Words)

- schoolbook** A textbook used in a school.
- text edition** The words of something written.
- textbook** A book prepared for use in schools or colleges.  
*His economics **textbook** is in its tenth edition.*
- textual matter** A problem.

- The preacher chose a text from Psalms to introduce his sermon.
- He wants to reconstruct the original text.
- There were more than a thousand words of text.
- Pictures made the text easier to understand.
- They handed out the printed text of the mayor's speech.
- His economics textbook is in its tenth edition.
- The professor wrote the text that he assigned students to buy.



## Associations of "Texts" (30 Words)

- alphabet** The basic elements in a system which combine to form complex entities.  
*A phonetic **alphabet**.*
- [annotate](#) Add explanatory notes to or supply with critical comments.  
*The scholar **annotated** the early edition of a famous novel.*
- annotation** The action of annotating a text or diagram.  
*Marginal **annotations**.*
- [bibliography](#) The history or systematic description of books, their authorship, printing, publication, editions, etc.  
*A **bibliography** of his publications.*
- [decipher](#) Read with difficulty.  
*Visual signals help us **decipher** what is being communicated.*

<b><u>descriptive</u></b>	Of or relating to an approach to linguistic analysis that aims at the description of a language's forms, structures and usage. <i><b>Descriptive</b> grammar.</i>
<b>dictation</b>	Matter that has been dictated and transcribed; a dictated passage. <i>The <b>dictation</b> of letters.</i>
<b><u>document</u></b>	Support or accompany with documentation. <i>Can you <b>document</b> your claims.</i>
<b>dramaturgy</b>	The theory and practice of dramatic composition. <i>Studies of Shakespeare s <b>dramaturgy</b>.</i>
<b>hieroglyphic</b>	Writing that resembles hieroglyphics usually by being illegible. <i>Notebooks filled with illegible <b>hieroglyphics</b>.</i>
<b><u>indent</u></b>	A space left by indenting text. <i>We were <b>indenting</b> for paper clips one by one in those days.</i>
<b>indentation</b>	A concave cut into a surface or edge (as in a coastline). <i>An <b>indentation</b> for each change of speaker.</i>
<b>inscription</b>	Letters inscribed (especially words engraved or carved) on something. <i>The <b>inscription</b> on her headstone.</i>
<b>lexicographer</b>	A compiler or writer of a dictionary; a student of the lexical component of language.
<b><u>linguistic</u></b>	Relating to language or linguistics. <i>A child s <b>linguistic</b> ability.</i>
<b>notation</b>	A note or annotation. <i>Algebraic <b>notation</b>.</i>
<b>palimpsest</b>	A manuscript or piece of writing material on which later writing has been superimposed on effaced earlier writing. <i>Sutton Place is a <b>palimpsest</b> of the taste of successive owners.</i>
<b>paragraph</b>	Write paragraphs work as a paragrapher. <i>His style deploys a lack of conventional <b>paragraphing</b>.</i>
<b><u>quote</u></b>	Put quote marks around. <i>A <b>quote</b> from Wordsworth.</i>
<b>record</b>	Make a record of set down in permanent form. <i>The temperature was the lowest <b>recorded</b> since 1926.</i>
<b>stenographer</b>	A person whose job is to transcribe speech in shorthand. <i>A court <b>stenographer</b>.</i>
<b><u>subliminal</u></b>	Below the threshold of conscious perception.
<b><u>summarize</u></b>	Give a brief statement of the main points of (something). <i>These results can be <b>summarized</b> in the following table.</i>

- transcribe** Synthesize (RNA) using a template of existing DNA (or vice versa), so that the genetic information is copied.  
*His largest early work was **transcribed** for organ.*
- transcript** A written or printed version of material originally presented in another medium.  
*You can obtain a **transcript** of this radio program by sending a self addressed envelope to the station.*
- transcription** Something written, especially copied from one medium to another, as a typewritten version of dictation.  
*Our usual **transcription** is given in brackets.*
- transliterate** Rewrite in a different script.  
*The Sanskrit text had to be **transliterated**.*
- verbatim** In precisely the same words used by a writer or speaker.  
*Your quotations must be **verbatim**.*
- write** Create code write a computer program.  
*Thank you and goodbye I ll **write** soon.*
- writing** Handwriting.  
*The doctor s **writing** was illegible.*
