as luck would have it To the same degree (often followed by `as.

by good fortune So as to pass a given point.

by good luck In reserve; not for immediate use.

fortunately By good fortune.

Fortunately *no shots were fired and no one was hurt.*

gratefully With appreciation for something done or received.
*They smiled **gratefully** at her understanding.*

[happily](#) In an unexpectedly lucky way.
*They shouted **happily**.*

propitiously In an auspicious manner.
providentially In a prudent manner.

Usage Examples of "Thankfully" as an adverb

- *She thankfully accepted the armchair she was offered.*
- *He accepted thankfully my apologies.*
- *Thankfully, everything went smoothly.*

accept Make use of or accept for some purpose.
*Credit cards are widely **accepted**.*

accepting Tolerating without protest.
*Always more **accepting** of coaching suggestion than her teammates.*

acknowledge Express recognition of the presence or existence of, or acquaintance with.
*Henry **acknowledged** Richard as his heir.*

acknowledgement The action of showing that one has noticed someone or something.
*He touched his hat in **acknowledgement**.*

admit Admit into a group or community.
*This pipe **admits** air.*

admittedly Used to express a concession or recognition that something is the case.
***Admittedly** the salary was not wonderful.*

apologize Defend, explain, clear away, or make excuses for by reasoning.
*I **apologized** for being late.*

appreciatively With appreciation; in a grateful manner.
*He accepted my offer **appreciatively**.*

cognition A perception sensation idea or intuition resulting from the process of cognition.

cognizant Having knowledge or awareness.
*Statesmen must be **cognizant** of the political boundaries within which they work.*

concede Be willing to concede.
*The candidate **conceded** after enough votes had come in to show that he would lose.*

confess	Confess to God in the presence of a priest as in the Catholic faith. <i>St Ambrose would weep bitter tears when confessing a sinner.</i>
<u>confide</u>	Reveal in private tell confidentially. <i>The property of others confided to their care was unjustifiably risked.</i>
fallibility	The likelihood of making errors. <i>Studies on the fallibility of memory and perception.</i>
fortunately	By good fortune. <i>Fortunately no shots were fired and no one was hurt.</i>
grant	The action of granting something. <i>They will grant you asylum.</i>
gratefully	With appreciation; in a grateful manner. <i>They smiled gratefully at her understanding.</i>
<u>greet</u>	Send greetings to. <i>Everyone greeted this idea warmly.</i>
<u>happily</u>	In a happy way. <i>They shouted happily.</i>
<u>honorable</u>	Adhering to ethical and moral principles. <i>Followed the only honorable course of action.</i>
<u>luckily</u>	It is fortunate that. <i>Luckily they didn't recognize me.</i>
penance	Impose a penance on. <i>He had done public penance for those hasty words.</i>
profess	Practice as a profession teach or claim to be knowledgeable about. <i>A people professing Christianity.</i>
realization	An act of becoming fully aware of something as a fact. <i>A growing realization of the need to create common economic structures.</i>
receive	Receive a specified treatment abstract. <i>The impression she received was one of unhurried leisure.</i>
receptiveness	Willingness or readiness to receive (especially impressions or ideas). <i>This receptiveness is the key feature in oestral behavior enabling natural mating to occur.</i>
recognize	Accept (someone) to be what is claimed or accept his power and authority. <i>My work is not recognized by anybody.</i>
recognized	Provided with a secure reputation. <i>A recognized authority.</i>

resignedly

In a hopeless resigned manner.

retrospect

A survey or review of a past course of events or period of time.

*In **retrospect**.*
