dramatics	The art of writing and producing plays. <i>Cut out the dramatics.</i>
dramaturgy	The art of writing and producing plays. <i>Studies of Shakespeare s dramaturgy.</i>
field	A fielder. <i>Anthropologists do much of their work in the field.</i>
field of operations	A region where a battle is being (or has been) fought.
house	The management of a gambling house or casino. <i>The sixty member National Council the country s upper house.</i>
theater of operations	A region in which active military operations are in progress.
theatre	An operating theatre. <i>This is intense moving and inspiring theatre.</i>

theatre of operations A process or series of acts especially of a practical or mechanical nature involved in a particular form of work.



Usage Examples of "Theater" as a noun

- *He served in the Vietnam theater for three years.*



Associations of "Theater" (30 Words)

- acting** Serving temporarily especially as a substitute.
*She studied **acting** in New York.*
- actor** A person whose profession is acting on the stage, in films, or on television.
*In war one must be a good **actor**.*
- anteroom** A large room in an officers' mess, typically adjacent to the dining room.
- cinematic** Relating to the cinema.
***Cinematic** output.*
- comedian** An entertainer on stage or television whose act is designed to make an audience laugh.
*He s a real **comedian** this fellow.*
- comic** A professional performer who tells jokes and performs comical acts.
*A **comic** monologue.*

composer	Someone who composes music as a profession. <i>Mozart was her favourite composer.</i>
doll	Informal terms for a (young) woman. <i>I got all dolled up for a party.</i>
dramatist	A person who writes plays.
entertainer	A person who tries to please or amuse. <i>Street entertainers.</i>
film	Be well or badly suited to portrayal in a film. <i>A horror film.</i>
foyer	An entrance hall in a house or flat. <i>The foyer of the concert hall.</i>
histrionic	Excessively theatrical or dramatic in character or style. <i>Histrionic gestures.</i>
impresario	A person who organizes and often finances concerts, plays, or operas.
lobby	An interest group that tries to influence legislators or bureaucrats to act in their favor typically through lobbying. <i>Members of the anti abortion lobby.</i>
minstrel	A performer in a minstrel show. <i>The exaggerated dialect of blackface minstrels.</i>
movie	A cinema film. <i>They went to a movie every Saturday night.</i>
musician	Someone who plays a musical instrument (as a profession). <i>Your father was a fine musician.</i>
nickelodeon	A cinema with an admission fee of one nickel.
novelist	One who writes novels.
performer	An entertainer who performs a dramatic or musical work for an audience. <i>A circus performer.</i>
playwright	Someone who writes plays.
preview	A facility for inspecting the appearance of a document before it is printed. <i>The company will preview an enhanced version of its database.</i>
puppet	A small figure of a person operated from above with strings by a puppeteer. <i>A puppet show.</i>
screening	Fabric of metal or plastic mesh. <i>The less than successful screening of the sitcom s pilot episode.</i>
stunt	Perform a stunt or stunts. <i>Some weeds produce chemicals that stunt the plant s growth.</i>

- theatrical** A professional actor or actress.
*A boarding house that catered for **theatricals**.*
- vaudeville** A light or comic stage play with interspersed songs.
*His comedic roots are in **vaudeville**.*
- ventriloquist** A person, especially an entertainer, who can make their voice appear to come from somewhere else, typically a dummy of a person or animal.
- video** A recording of moving visual images made digitally or on videotape.
*They sat down to watch a **video**.*
