Definitions of "Then" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “then” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *Used at the end of a sentence to emphasize an inference being drawn.*
- *At that time; at the time in question.*
- *In that case or as a consequence.*
- *Also; in addition.*
- *In that case; therefore.*
- *Used to finish off a conversation.*
- *After that; next; afterwards.*
- *Subsequently or soon afterward (often used as sentence connectors).*
- *At that time.*

under those circumstances	In or into a state of subordination or subjugation.
what's more	Comparative of much; to a greater degree or extent.
