theorise To believe especially on uncertain or tentative grounds.

Usage Examples of "Theorize" as a verb

• Galileo theorized the motion of the stars.

• He theorized that the atolls marked the sites of vanished volcanoes.

• He thinks and theorizes all day.

• The classic model of war in the modern era was theorized by the Prussian general and strategist Karl von Clausewitz.

hypothesis A message expressing an opinion based on incomplete evidence.

The **hypothesis** that every event has a cause.

Put (something) forward as a hypothesis.

hypothesize Lack of cushioning in shoes has been **hypothesize**d as a cause of running

injuries.

Form a mental image of something that is not present or that is not the case.

I couldn t **imagine** what she expected to tell them.

inductive Possessing inductance.

Inductive to the sin of Eve.

infer Guess correctly; solve by guessing.

From these facts we can **infer** that crime has been increasing.

inference A conclusion reached on the basis of evidence and reasoning.

It seemed a fair **inference** that such books would be grouped together.

Reflect deeply on a subject.

mull She began to mull over the various possibilities.

Assume a posture as for artistic purposes.

We don t know the woman who **pose**d for Leonardo so often.

Take liberties or act with too much confidence.

presumeKindly don t **presume** to issue me orders in my own house.

reckon Be of the opinion.

I don t **reckon** his chances.

. (of a ruminant) chew the cud.

ruminate Cows ruminate.



To believe especially on uncertain or tentative grounds.

He didn t look as though he had the money to **speculate** in shares.

speculation The forming of a theory or conjecture without firm evidence.

These are only **speculation**s.

speculative Not based on fact or investigation.

Raised a **speculative** eyebrow.

statement (computer science) a line of code written as part of a computer program.

The LEAs differing policies on **statement**ing.

Suggest the necessity of an intervention in medicine.

Finds of lead coffins **suggest**ed a cemetery north of the river.

Take for granted or as a given suppose beforehand.
