Definitions of "Theory" as a noun


According to the <u>Oxford Dictionary of English</u>, "theory" as a noun can have the following definitions:

- A belief that can guide behavior.
- A well-substantiated explanation of some aspect of the natural world; an organized system of accepted knowledge that applies in a variety of circumstances to explain a specific set of phenomena.
- An idea used to account for a situation or justify a course of action.
- A supposition or a system of ideas intended to explain something, especially one based on general principles independent of the thing to be explained.
- A collection of propositions to illustrate the principles of a subject.
- A tentative insight into the natural world; a concept that is not yet verified but that if true would explain certain facts or phenomena.



ullet A set of principles on which the practice of an activity is based.




