| for all that | To a complete degree or to the full or entire extent (‘whole’ is often used informally for ‘wholly’. |
| however | To whatever degree or extent. <i>However you look at it you can t criticize that.</i> |

| <u>nonetheless</u> | Despite anything to the contrary (usually preceding a concession). <i>The rally which the government had declared illegal was nonetheless attended by some 6 000.</i> |
| notwithstanding | Despite anything to the contrary (usually following a concession). <i>I didn't like it. Notwithstanding, I remained calm.</i> |
| <u>regardless</u> | Despite the prevailing circumstances. <i>The allowance is paid regardless of age or income.</i> |

| already | Used after a word or phrase to express impatience. <i>Anna has suffered a great deal already.</i> |
| but | An argument against something; an objection. <i>Hopes that last but a moment.</i> |
| despite | Contemptuous disregard. <i>The theatre only earns my despite.</i> |
| endurance | Denoting or relating to a race or other sporting event that takes place over a long distance or otherwise demands great physical stamina. <i>The annual 24 hour endurance race.</i> |
| heretofore | Used in negative statement to describe a situation that has existed up to this point or up to the present time. <i>Diseases that heretofore were usually confined to rural areas.</i> |
| hitherto | Used in negative statement to describe a situation that has existed up to this point or up to the present time. <i>Hitherto part of French West Africa Benin achieved independence in 1960.</i> |
| however | By contrast; on the other hand. <i>However you look at it you can't criticize that.</i> |
| inaction | The state of being inactive. <i>Future generations will condemn us for inaction.</i> |
| inactivity | Being inactive; being less active. <i>People are frustrated with government inactivity.</i> |
| lull | Become quiet or less intensive. <i>There was a lull in the storm.</i> |
| merely | And nothing more. <i>I was merely asking.</i> |
| motionless | Not moving; stationary. <i>An eagle hung almost motionless close to the ground.</i> |
| nevertheless | Despite anything to the contrary (usually preceding a concession). <i>While we disliked each other nevertheless we agreed.</i> |
| nonetheless | Despite anything to the contrary (usually following a concession). <i>The rally which the government had declared illegal was nonetheless attended by some 6 000.</i> |
| notwithstanding | Despite anything to the contrary (usually following a concession). <i>I didn't like it. Notwithstanding, I remained calm.</i> |

| only | Being the only one single and isolated from others. <i>Genes that were discovered only last year.</i> |
| preliminary | A preliminary action or event. <i>The discussions were seen as preliminary to the policy paper.</i> |
| quiescence | A state of quiet (but possibly temporary) inaction. <i>This method has been shown to induce sleep like quiescence in adult animals.</i> |
| quiescent | Being quiet or still or inactive. <i>The quiescent level of centimeter wave length solar radiation.</i> |
| simply | Used to introduce a short summary of a situation. <i>She spoke simply and from the heart.</i> |
| standing | Executed in or initiated from a standing position. <i>I took a standing jump.</i> |
| statics | The branch of mechanics concerned with forces in equilibrium. |
| stationary | Not moving or not intended to be moved. <i>Stationary machinery.</i> |
| still | Deep silence and calm stillness. <i>Still waters run deep.</i> |
| suffix | Attach a suffix to. <i>Suffix words.</i> |
| tranquilize | Cause to be calm or quiet as by administering a sedative to. |
| unformed | Without a definite form or shape. <i>She packed the unformed butter into the mould.</i> |
| unmoving | Not moving; still. <i>Claudia sat unmoving behind her desk.</i> |
| whatever | At all; of any kind (used for emphasis). <i>They received no help whatever.</i> |
| yet | Referring to something that will or may happen in the future. <i>Yet another diet book.</i> |
