Definitions of "Throne" as a noun

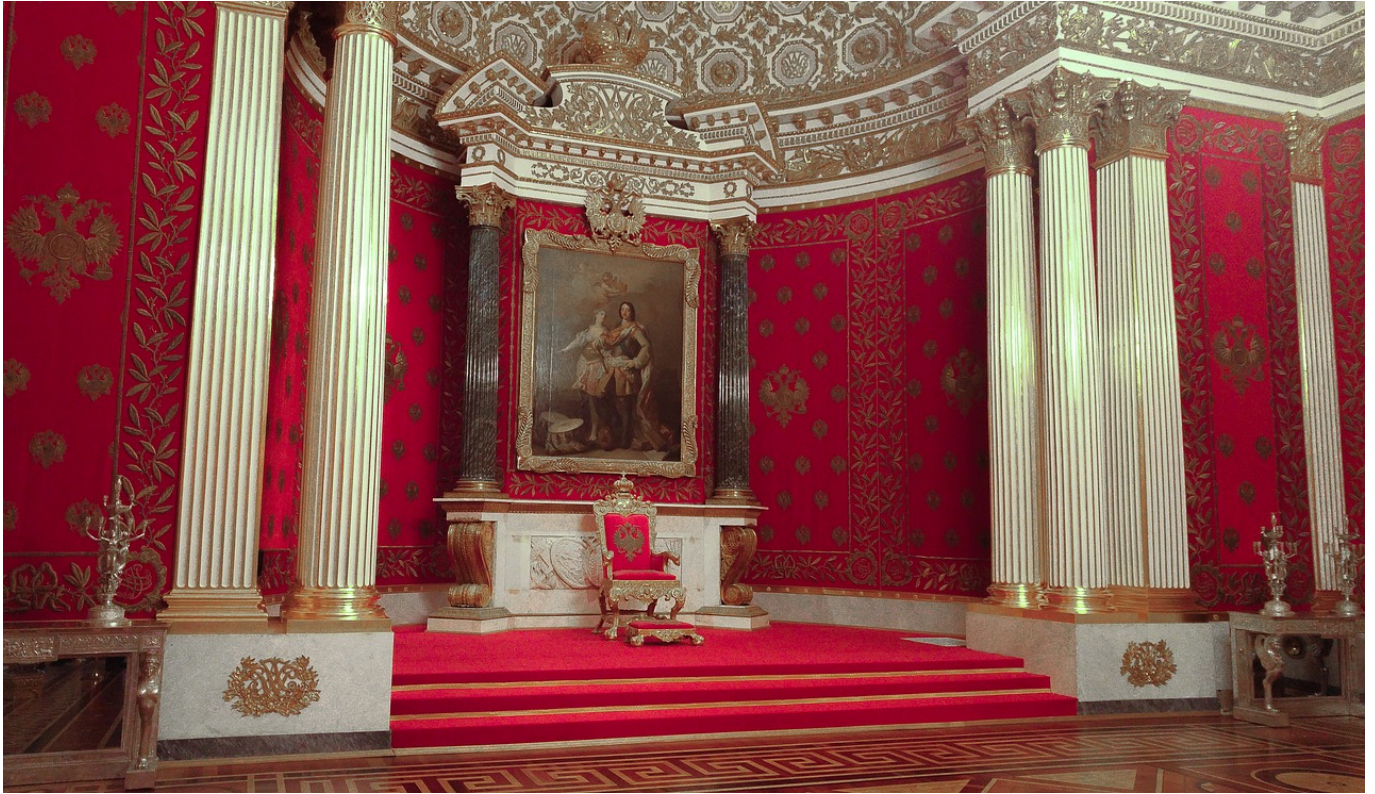
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “throne” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The position and power of an exalted person (a sovereign or bishop) who is entitled to sit in a chair of state on ceremonial occasions.*
- *A toilet.*
- *A ceremonial chair for a sovereign, bishop, or similar figure.*
- *The chair of state for a monarch, bishop, etc.*
- *A plumbing fixture for defecation and urination.*
- *(in traditional Christian angelology) the third-highest order of the ninefold celestial hierarchy.*
- *Used to signify sovereign power.*

can	The quantity contained in a can.
command	The power or authority to command. <i>An officer took command.</i>
commode	A tall elegant chest of drawers.
crapper	A plumbing fixture for defecation and urination.
<u>dominion</u>	One of the self-governing nations in the British Commonwealth. <i>The Angevin dominions.</i>
royal seat	Stag with antlers of 12 or more branches.
rule	A rule describing or prescribing a linguistic practice. <i>He knew the rules of chess.</i>
seat of state	The cloth covering for the buttocks.
sovereign power	A nation's ruler or head of state usually by hereditary right.
sovereignty	Royal authority; the dominion of a monarch. <i>National sovereignty.</i>
stool	The stump of a tree that has been felled or headed for the production of saplings. <i>Concentrations of the substance in normal stool.</i>
toilet	A room building or cubicle containing a toilet or toilets. <i>Her toilet completed she finally went back downstairs.</i>

- *King Solomon's great ivory throne.*



Throne as a Verb

Definitions of "Throne" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "throne" as a verb can have the following

definitions:

- *Put a monarch on the throne.*
- *Sit on the throne as a ruler.*
- *Place (someone) on a throne.*



Synonyms of "Throne" as a verb (1 Word)

enthrone Provide with power and authority.
*He was **enthroned** as the guru of the avant garde.*



Usage Examples of "Throne" as a verb

- *The king was throned on a rock.*
- *The Queen was enthroned more than 50 years ago.*



Associations of "Throne" (30 Words)

abdicate

Give up, such as power, as of monarchs and emperors, or duties and obligations.

*Ferdinand **abdicated** the throne in favour of the emperor's brother.*

accession

The action or process of formally joining or being accepted by an institution or group.

*Substantial **accessions** of gold.*

admission

The fee charged for admission.

*Cinema **admissions** have been rising recently.*

admittance	The act of admitting someone to enter. <i>People were unable to gain admittance to the hall.</i>
coronal	Of or in the coronal plane. Coronal imaging.
<u>crown</u>	Dentistry dental appliance consisting of an artificial crown for a broken or decayed tooth. <i>Shiny covers embossed with gold crowns.</i>
diadem	A jewelled crown or headband worn as a symbol of sovereignty. <i>He refused the diadem of all the Caesars.</i>
duke	A male holding the highest hereditary title in the British and certain other peerages.
<u>dynasty</u>	A line of hereditary rulers of a country. <i>The Tang dynasty.</i>
<u>emperor</u>	The male ruler of an empire. <i>He is regarded as one of the greatest Roman emperors.</i>
enthrone	Install (a monarch or bishop) on a throne, especially during a ceremony to mark the beginning of their rule. <i>The Queen was enthroned more than 50 years ago.</i>
fief	A person's sphere of operation or control.
<u>king</u>	Make someone king. <i>He ll start kinging it over the lot of us again.</i>
<u>kingdom</u>	A country, state, or territory ruled by a king or queen. <i>The untroubled kingdom of reason.</i>
kingship	The state or position of being a king. <i>Upon his succession to the kingship David retained his English estates.</i>
<u>lord</u>	Make a lord of someone. Lords and ladies were entertained here.
papacy	The tenure of office of a pope. <i>Relations between the English state and the papacy.</i>
papal	Relating to a pope or to the papacy. Papal dispensation.
pontifical	Denoting or governed by or relating to a bishop or bishops. <i>Such explanations were greeted with pontifical disdain.</i>
pope	The head of the Coptic Church, the Bishop or Patriarch of Alexandria.
preferment	Promotion or appointment to a position or office. <i>Most of her ministers owed their first preferment to her.</i>

prince	A male member of a royal family other than the sovereign (especially the son of a sovereign. <i>Arctic char is a prince among fishes.</i>
princess	A close female relative of a monarch, especially a granddaughter. <i>Stop being such a princess.</i>
<u>proclamation</u>	The public or official announcement of an important matter. <i>The issuing by the monarch of a proclamation dissolving Parliament.</i>
queen	Become a queen. <i>The queen of ocean liners.</i>
regency	The particular period of a regency especially in Britain from 1811 to 1820 and in France from 1715 to 1723. <i>The boy being a minor there would have to be a regency.</i>
<u>royal</u>	A sail set next above the topgallant on a royal mast. <i>The coalition obtained royal approval for the appointment.</i>
<u>sovereign</u>	Possessing royal power and status. <i>In modern democracies the people s will is in theory sovereign.</i>
vassal	A holder of land by feudal tenure on conditions of homage and allegiance. <i>A vassal state of the Ottoman Empire.</i>
<u>wreath</u>	A carved representation of a wreath. <i>The Queen laid a wreath at the Cenotaph.</i>
