Thud as a Noun

Definitions of "Thud" as a noun

- *A heavy dull sound (as made by impact of heavy objects).*
- *A dull, heavy sound, such as that made by an object falling to the ground.*

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| bang | A vigorous blow. <i>They got a great bang out of it.</i> |
| boom | The characteristic resonant cry of the bittern. <i>The boom of the bittern may be enjoyed in the country.</i> |
| clonk | An abrupt, heavy sound of impact. |
| clump | A compacted mass or lump of something. <i>They sat on the wall in clumps of two and three.</i> |

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| clunk | A heavy dull sound (as made by impact of heavy objects). <i>There was a clunk as the receiver went down.</i> |
| crash | A sudden loud noise as of something breaking or hitting another object. <i>A car crash.</i> |
| smack | The act of smacking something a blow delivered with an open hand. <i>She closed the ledger with a smack.</i> |
| <u>smash</u> | An act or sound of something smashing. <i>He heard the smash of glass.</i> |
| thump | A heavy blow with the hand. <i>Through the wall came the thump of rock music.</i> |
| <u>thumping</u> | A heavy blow with the hand. |
| thunder | Used to express emphasis, anger, or incredulity. <i>I am Brother Joachim he announced in a voice like thunder.</i> |
| wallop | A severe blow. <i>An endless supply of free wallop.</i> |

Usage Examples of "Thud" as a noun

- *School-leavers have now come back down to earth with a thud.*
- *He hit the floor with a terrific thud.*
- *Jean heard the thud of the closing door.*

Thud as a Verb

Definitions of "Thud" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "thud" as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Strike with a dull sound.*
- *Make a noise typical of an engine lacking lubricants.*
- *Make a dull sound.*
- *Move, fall, or strike something with a dull, heavy sound.*

Synonyms of "Thud" as a verb (10 Words)

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| bang | Leap jerk bang. <i>One of them banged the sash of the window nearest my bed.</i> |
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| clonk | Move with or make a clonk. <i>The horses clonked and snorted softly.</i> |
| clunk | Move with or make a clunk. <i>The machinery clunked into life.</i> |
| crash | Move with or as if with a crashing noise. <i>My son s friends crashed our house last weekend.</i> |
| crump | Make a noise typical of an engine lacking lubricants. <i>We heard the cannon crumping.</i> |
| scrunch | Make wrinkles or creases on a smooth surface; make a pressed, folded or wrinkled line in. <i>Their faces scrunch up with concentration.</i> |
| smack | Part (one's lips) noisily in eager anticipation or enjoyment of food or drink. <i>Jessica smacked his face quite hard.</i> |
| smash | Break into pieces, as by striking or knocking over. <i>Giant Atlantic waves smashed against the wall.</i> |
| thump | Make a dull sound. <i>She thumped on the cottage door.</i> |
| thunder | Be the case that thunder is being heard. <i>The bus thundered down the road.</i> |

Usage Examples of "Thud" as a verb

- *The bullets thudded into the dusty ground.*
- *Bullets were thudding against the wall.*
- *The knocker thudded against the front door.*

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| amplifier | A device consisting of an amplifier combined with a loudspeaker and used to increase the volume of the sound produced by electric guitars and other musical instruments. |
| cackle | A loud laugh suggestive of a hen s cackle. <i>Her delighted cackle.</i> |
| clamorous | Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry. <i>A jostling clamorous mob.</i> |
| crackle | Having the surface decorated with a network of fine cracks as in crackleware. <i>A crackle glaze.</i> |

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| crump | Explode heavily or with a loud dull noise. <i>We heard the cannon crumping.</i> |
| deafening | Loud enough to cause (temporary) hearing loss. <i>The music reached a deafening crescendo.</i> |
| earshot | The range within which a voice can be heard. <i>The children were told to stay within earshot.</i> |
| echo | Ring or echo with sound. <i>For security reasons the password will not be echoed to the screen.</i> |
| growl | The sound of growling as made by animals. <i>Keep out of this he growled.</i> |
| grumble | To utter or emit low dull rumbling sounds. <i>In the distance I heard a grumble of thunder.</i> |
| loud | Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i>Cried aloud for help.</i> |
| megaphone | Utter through or as if through a megaphone. <i>The director stood around megaphoning orders.</i> |
| noise | Emit a noise. <i>The announcement of the election recount caused a lot of noise.</i> |
| noisy | Full of or characterized by noise. <i>A small noisy dog.</i> |
| resonant | (of sound) deep, clear, and continuing to sound or reverberate. <i>A resonant voice.</i> |
| resonate | Evoke images, memories, and emotions. <i>The crystal resonates at 16 MHz.</i> |
| resound | (of a sound, voice, etc.) fill or echo throughout a place. <i>The office resounds with the metronomic clicking of keyboards.</i> |
| resounding | Characterized by resonance. <i>A resounding smack across the face.</i> |
| reverberate | Be reflected as heat, sound, or light or shock waves. <i>Reverberate ore.</i> |
| roar | A loud outburst of laughter. <i>Her remarks brought a roar of laughter from the old man.</i> |
| rumble | To utter or emit low dull rumbling sounds. <i>Heavy lorries rumbled through the streets.</i> |
| screech | Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>He ducked at the screechings of shells.</i> |

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| shriek | Sharp piercing cry. <i>She was shrieking abuse at a taxi.</i> |
| sound | Cause to sound. <i>A different bell begins to sound midnight.</i> |
| spank | Give a spanking to subject to a spanking. <i>She was spanked for spilling ink on the carpet.</i> |
| spread | The fact or process of spreading over an area. <i>A wide spread of ages.</i> |
| <u>squeal</u> | Make a squeal. <i>Don't you dare she squealed.</i> |
| thump | A strong heartbeat, especially one caused by fear or excitement. <i>The bag landed on the floor with a thump.</i> |
| <u>thundering</u> | Making a resounding, loud, deep noise. <i>A thundering bore.</i> |
| whinny | Of a horse make a whinny. <i>The pony whinnied and tossed his head happily.</i> |
