- thump** A strong heartbeat, especially one caused by fear or excitement.  
*Through the wall came the **thump** of rock music.*

<b>banging</b>	Excellent or impressive. <i>A beautiful celebrity with a <b>banging</b> bod.</i>
<b>colossal</b>	So great in size or force or extent as to elicit awe. <i><b>Colossal</b> crumbling ruins of an ancient temple.</i>
<b>downright</b>	(of something bad or unpleasant) utter; complete (used for emphasis). <i>A <b>downright</b> kind of person.</i>
<b>elephantine</b>	Of, resembling, or characteristic of an elephant or elephants, especially in being large, clumsy, or awkward. <i>There was an <b>elephantine</b> thud from the bathroom.</i>
<b>enormous</b>	Extraordinarily large in size or extent or amount or power or degree. <i>The possibilities are <b>enormous</b>.</i>
<b>fantastic</b>	Extraordinarily good or attractive. <i>The film was <b>fantastic</b>.</i>
<b>gargantuan</b>	Enormous. <i>A <b>gargantuan</b> appetite.</i>
<b>giant</b>	Used in names of very large animals and plants e g giant hogweed giant tortoise. <i><b>Giant</b> multinational corporations.</i>
<b><u>gigantic</u></b>	Of very great size or extent; huge or enormous. <i>A <b>gigantic</b> concrete tower.</i>
<b>goodly</b>	Large in amount or extent or degree. <i>A <b>goodly</b> amount.</i>
<b>huge</b>	Extremely popular or successful. <i><b>Huge</b> government spending.</i>
<b>humongous</b>	Very large. <i>A <b>humongous</b> steak.</i>
<b>immense</b>	Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope. <i>At vast or <b>immense</b> expense.</i>
<b>mammoth</b>	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A <b>mammoth</b> corporation.</i>
<b>massive</b>	Very successful or influential. <i>The band are going to be <b>massive</b>.</i>
<b>monstrous</b>	Having the ugly or frightening appearance of a monster. <i>No excess was too <b>monstrous</b> for them to commit.</i>

<b>monumental</b>	Relating or belonging to or serving as a monument. <i>A <b>monumental</b> scale.</i>
<b>mountainous</b>	Having hills and crags. <i>A <b>mountainous</b> dark man.</i>
<b>positive</b>	Having a positive charge. <i>Adopt a <b>positive</b> outlook on life.</i>
<b>prodigious</b>	Of momentous or ominous significance. <i>The stove consumed a <b>prodigious</b> amount of fuel.</i>
<b>stupendous</b>	So great in size or force or extent as to elicit awe. <i>The most <b>stupendous</b> views.</i>
<b><u>substantial</u></b>	Fairly large. <i>Won by a <b>substantial</b> margin.</i>
<b>terrific</b>	Of great size, amount, or intensity. <i>Fought a <b>terrific</b> battle.</i>
<b>titanic</b>	Of great force or power. <i>A series of <b>titanic</b> explosions.</i>
<b><u>tremendous</u></b>	Extraordinarily good or great; used especially as intensifiers. <i>A <b>tremendous</b> fact in human experience that a whole civilization should be dependent on technology.</i>
<b>vast</b>	Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope. <i>The <b>vast</b> reaches of outer space.</i>
<b>very</b>	Precisely as stated. <i>Those were his <b>very</b> words.</i>
<b>very great</b>	Being the exact same one; not any other.
<b>walloping</b>	Very large. <i>A <b>walloping</b> shock.</i>
<b>whopping</b>	Very large. <i>A <b>whopping</b> great lie.</i>

<b>aggressor</b>	A confident assertive person who acts as instigator.
<b>assailant</b>	A person who physically attacks another. <i>The police have no firm leads about the identity of his <b>assailant</b>.</i>
<b>bang</b>	Leap jerk bang. <i>He began to <b>bang</b> the table with his fist.</i>
<b>beat</b>	Shape by beating. <i>His <b>beat</b> is construction property and hotels.</i>
<b>belabor</b>	Attack verbally with harsh criticism. <i>She was <b>belabored</b> by her fellow students.</i>
<b>bludgeon</b>	Beat someone repeatedly with a bludgeon or other heavy object. <i>Maces and spiked <b>bludgeons</b>.</i>
<b>crump</b>	Explode heavily or with a loud dull noise. <i>The <b>crump</b> of shells could be heard hours later.</i>
<b>hit</b>	Hit against come into sudden contact with. <i>The car <b>hit</b> a tree.</i>
<b>loud</b>	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i>The band played <b>loudly</b>.</i>
<b>nudge</b>	Prod (someone) gently with one's elbow in order to attract attention. <i>She appreciated the <b>nudge</b> to her memory.</i>
<b>pang</b>	A sudden sharp feeling. <i>A <b>pang</b> of conscience.</i>
<b>ping</b>	Hit with a pinging noise. <i><b>Ping</b> your machine in the office.</i>
<b>poignancy</b>	A state of deeply felt distress or sorrow. <i>A moment of extraordinary <b>poignancy</b>.</i>
<b>poke</b>	Prod and stir a fire with a poker to make it burn more fiercely. <i><b>Poke</b> the embers in the fireplace.</i>
<b>prickle</b>	(of a part of the body) experience a tingling sensation, especially as a result of strong emotion. <i>The sound made her skin <b>prickle</b> with horror.</i>
<b>punch</b>	Drive forcibly as if by a punch. <i>He reeled under the well aimed <b>punch</b>.</i>
<b>pushing</b>	The act of applying force in order to move something away. <i>The <b>pushing</b> is good exercise.</i>

- resounding** Characterized by resonance.  
*The evening was a **resounding** success.*
- slap** A sound made or as if made by a slap.

- spank** Give a spanking to subject to a spanking.  
*She was **spanked** for spilling ink on the carpet.*
