immense	Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope. <i>At vast or immense expense.</i>
mammoth	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A mammoth corporation.</i>
massive	Very successful or influential. <i>The band are going to be massive.</i>
monstrous	Having the ugly or frightening appearance of a monster. <i>No excess was too monstrous for them to commit.</i>

monumental	Relating or belonging to or serving as a monument. <i>A monumental scale.</i>
mountainous	Having hills and crags. <i>A mountainous dark man.</i>
positive	Having a positive charge. <i>Adopt a positive outlook on life.</i>
prodigious	Of momentous or ominous significance. <i>The stove consumed a prodigious amount of fuel.</i>
stupendous	So great in size or force or extent as to elicit awe. <i>The most stupendous views.</i>
<u>substantial</u>	Fairly large. <i>Won by a substantial margin.</i>
terrific	Of great size, amount, or intensity. <i>Fought a terrific battle.</i>
titanic	Of great force or power. <i>A series of titanic explosions.</i>
<u>tremendous</u>	Extraordinarily good or great; used especially as intensifiers. <i>A tremendous fact in human experience that a whole civilization should be dependent on technology.</i>

walloping	Very large. <i>A walloping shock.</i>
