- colossal** (of an order) having more than one storey of columns.  
*A **colossal** amount of mail.*
- downright** Complete and without restriction or qualification; sometimes used informally as intensifiers.  
*A **downright** answer.*
- elephantine** Of great mass; huge and bulky.  
*There was an **elephantine** thud from the bathroom.*
- enormous** Very large in size, quantity, or extent.  
***Enormous** sums of money.*
- fantastic** Extraordinarily good or attractive.  
*She had spent a **fantastic** amount of cash.*
- gargantuan** Of great mass; huge and bulky.  
*A **gargantuan** appetite.*

<b>giant</b>	Used in names of very large animals and plants e.g. giant hogweed, giant tortoise. <b>Giant</b> multinational corporations.
<b>gigantic</b>	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. A <b>gigantic</b> redwood.
<b>goodly</b>	Considerable in size or quantity. A <b>goodly</b> number of our countrymen.
<b>huge</b>	Extremely popular or successful. This could be the start of something <b>huge</b> for you.
<b>immense</b>	Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope. A factor of <b>immense</b> importance.
<b>mammoth</b>	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. Supervision of a ward is a <b>mammoth</b> task.
<b>massive</b>	Imposing in size or bulk or solidity. Earth is the most <b>massive</b> of the terrestrial planets.
<b>monstrous</b>	Distorted and unnatural in shape or size; abnormal and hideous. He wasn't lovable; he was <b>monstrous</b> and violent.
<b>monumental</b>	Of or serving as a monument. Additional details are found in <b>monumental</b> inscriptions.
<b>mountainous</b>	(of a region) having many mountains. Struggling under <b>mountainous</b> debts.
<b>positive</b>	Having a positive charge. A <b>positive</b> demand.
<b>prodigious</b>	Unnatural or abnormal. Her memory was <b>prodigious</b> .
<b>stupendous</b>	So great in size or force or extent as to elicit awe. The most <b>stupendous</b> views.
<b>substantial</b>	Strongly built or made. There was <b>substantial</b> agreement on changing policies.
<b>terrific</b>	Extraordinarily good or great; used especially as intensifiers. There was a <b>terrific</b> bang.
<b>titanic</b>	Of great force or power. A series of <b>titanic</b> explosions.
<b>tremendous</b>	Extraordinarily large in size or extent or amount or power or degree. A <b>tremendous</b> achievement.
<b>vast</b>	Unusually great in size or amount or degree or especially extent or scope. The <b>vast</b> reaches of outer space.

**very** Being the exact same one; not any other.  
*The **very** thing he said yesterday.*

**very great** Precisely as stated.

<b>cackle</b>	A loud laugh suggestive of a hen s cackle. <i>Her delighted <b>cackle</b>.</i>
<b>clamorous</b>	Expressing or characterized by vehement protests or demands. <i>A <b>clamorous</b> uproar.</i>
<b>crackle</b>	Having the surface decorated with a network of fine cracks as in crackleware. <i>A <b>crackle</b> glaze.</i>
<b>deafening</b>	(of a noise) so loud as to make it impossible to hear anything else. <i>The music reached a <b>deafening</b> crescendo.</i>
<b><u>din</u></b>	Make a resonant sound, like artillery. <i>A runner up he <b>dinned</b> into them was a loser.</i>
<b>hubbub</b>	A busy, noisy situation. <i>She fought through the <b>hubbub</b>.</i>
<b>huge</b>	Extremely large; enormous. <i>A <b>huge</b> wave.</i>

<b><u>impressive</u></b>	Making a strong or vivid impression. <i>An <b>impressive</b> ceremony.</i>
<b>loud</b>	Used chiefly as a direction or description in music loud with force. <i><b>Loud</b> trombones.</i>
<b>megaphone</b>	Utter through or as if through a megaphone. <i>The director stood around megaphoning orders.</i>
<b>noise</b>	Emit a noise. <i>Making a <b>noise</b> like a pig.</i>
<b><u>noisy</u></b>	Making or given to making a lot of noise. <i>A <b>noisy</b> giggling group of children.</i>
<b>obstreperous</b>	Noisily and stubbornly defiant. <i><b>Obstreperous</b> boys.</i>
<b>racket</b>	Hit a ball with a racket. <i>A squash <b>racket</b>.</i>
<b><u>raucous</u></b>	Making or constituting a disturbingly harsh and loud noise. <i><b>Raucous</b> youths.</i>
<b><u>resonant</u></b>	(of a colour) enhancing or enriching another colour or colours by contrast. <i>A <b>resonant</b> voice.</i>
<b>resonate</b>	(of an idea or action) meet with agreement. <i>The crystal <b>resonates</b> at 16 MHz.</i>
<b>resounding</b>	Unmistakable; emphatic. <i>A <b>resounding</b> smack across the face.</i>
<b><u>roar</u></b>	Act or proceed in a riotous, turbulent, or disorderly way. <i>The water <b>roared</b> down the chute.</i>
<b><u>rumble</u></b>	A fight between rival gangs of adolescents. <i>Thunder <b>rumbled</b> lightning flickered.</i>
<b>screech</b>	Make a high pitched screeching noise. <i>He ducked at the <b>screechings</b> of shells.</i>
<b>shattering</b>	Seemingly loud enough to break something; violently rattling or clattering. <i>He found it a <b>shattering</b> experience.</i>
<b>shriek</b>	(of something inanimate) make a high-pitched screeching sound. <i>She was <b>shrieking</b> abuse at a taxi.</i>
<b>sound</b>	Test the lungs or another body cavity by noting the sound they produce. <i>The <b>sound</b> of the Beatles.</i>
<b><u>squeal</u></b>	Make a squeal. <i>The girls <b>squealed</b> with delight.</i>

- strident** (of a sound) loud and harsh; grating.  
*Public pronouncements on the crisis became less **strident**.*
- thud** Make a dull sound.  
*The knocker **thudded** against the front door.*
- uproarious** Uncontrollably noisy.  
***Uproarious** humour.*
- vociferous** Conspicuously and offensively loud; given to vehement outcry.  
*A **vociferous** mob.*
- whinny** Of a horse make a whinny.  
*The pony whinnied and tossed his head happily.*
