- *A sports match between two or more players or teams in which the winners proceed to the next round of the competition.*
- *A slur over two notes of the same pitch; indicates that the note is to be sustained for their combined time value.*
- *One of the cross braces that support the rails on a railway track.*

| constraint | Stiffness of manner and inhibition in relations between people. <i>Time constraints make it impossible to do everything.</i> |
| <u>contest</u> | An occasion on which a winner is selected from among two or more contestants. <i>A contest between traditional and liberal views.</i> |
| cord | An anatomical structure resembling a length of cord e.g the spinal cord or the umbilical cord. <i>She began toying with the telephone cord.</i> |
| cords | A unit of amount of wood cut for burning; 128 cubic feet. |
| crossie | One of the cross braces that support the rails on a railway track. |
| curb | An edge between a sidewalk and a roadway consisting of a line of curbstones usually forming part of a gutter. <i>Plans to introduce tougher curbs on insider dealing.</i> |
| dead heat | People who are no longer living. |
| <u>deadlock</u> | A type of lock requiring a key to open and close it, as distinct from a spring lock. <i>Ashton broke the deadlock with a penalty after 15 minutes.</i> |
| draw | An act of drawing on a cigarette or cigar. <i>They re dropping Es and smoking draw.</i> |
| encumbrance | An onerous or difficult concern. <i>Details of encumbrances on property.</i> |
| event | A special set of circumstances. <i>The momentous political events of the late 1980s.</i> |
| fastener | Restraint that attaches to something or holds something in place. <i>The sleeping bag is so slim that it is impossible to do up the fastener once you re inside.</i> |
| fastening | The act of fastening things together. <i>A fly front fastening.</i> |
| fetter | A restraint or check on someone's freedom to act. <i>The fetters of convention.</i> |
| fixture | The quality of being fixed in place as by some firm attachment. <i>Plumbing fixtures.</i> |

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| <u>friendship</u> | A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. <i>The foreign ministers extended to eastern Europe the hand of friendship.</i> |
| game | The equipment for a game especially a board game or a video game. <i>For actors memorizing lines is no game.</i> |
| handicap | A race or contest in which a handicap is imposed. <i>He was born with a significant visual handicap.</i> |
| <u>hindrance</u> | A thing that provides resistance, delay, or obstruction to something or someone. <i>The visitor can wander around without hindrance.</i> |

| lace | Braid used for trimming, especially on military dress uniforms. <i>A dress trimmed in white lace.</i> |
| <u>liaison</u> | A person who acts as a link to assist communication or cooperation between people. <i>I have been involved in an opportunistic sexual liaison with a work colleague.</i> |
| ligature | A stroke that joins adjacent letters in writing or printing. <i>There was no sign of the ligature which strangled her.</i> |
| limitation | A principle that limits the extent of something. <i>Severe limitations on water use.</i> |
| <u>link</u> | The means of connection between things linked in series. <i>The walls are held together with metal links placed in the wet mortar during construction.</i> |
| linkup | A fastener that serves to join or connect. |
| match | The score needed to win a match. <i>If you drop a match in there the whole place will explode.</i> |
| meeting | A gathering of people, especially Quakers, for worship. <i>The meeting elected a chairperson.</i> |
| necktie | Neckwear consisting of a long narrow piece of material worn (mostly by men) under a collar and tied in knot at the front. <i>He stood in front of the mirror tightening his necktie.</i> |

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| <u>obligation</u> | A legal agreement specifying a payment or action and the penalty for failure to comply. <i>She didn't want to be under an obligation to him.</i> |

| railroad tie | Line that is the commercial organization responsible for operating a system of transportation for trains that pull passengers or freight. |

*A **wire** coat hanger.*
