### Definitions of "Tied" as an adjective

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “tied” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *(of a house) occupied subject to the tenant's working for its owner.*
- *Bound together by or as if by a strong rope; especially as by a bond of affection.*
- *(of two or more notes) united by a tie and performed as one unbroken note.*
- *Fastened or attached with string or similar cord.*
- *Of the score in a contest.*
- *(of aid or an international loan) given subject to the condition that it should be spent on goods or services from the donor or lender.*
- *Closed with a lace.*
- *(of a pub) owned by a brewery and bound to supply the products produced or specified by that brewery.*
- *Fastened with strings or cords.*
- *(of a game or contest) with both or more competitors or teams achieving the same score.*
- *Bound or secured closely.*

<b>controlled by</b>	Restrained or managed or kept within certain bounds.
<b>dependent on</b>	Held from above.
<b>determined by</b>	Characterized by great determination.
<b>even</b>	Being level or straight or regular and without variation as e g in shape or texture or being in the same plane or at the same height as something else i e even with. <i>They travelled at an <b>even</b> and leisurely pace.</i>
<b>fastened</b>	Fastened with strings or cords. <i>A <b>fastened</b> seatbelt.</i>
<b>fettered</b>	Restrained with chains or manacles, typically around the ankles. <i>A <b>fettered</b> economy.</i>
<b>laced</b>	Trimmed or fitted with lace or laces. <i>White blossoms with purple <b>laced</b> petals.</i>
<b>level</b>	Having the same relative position; not in front of or behind. <i>His eyes were <b>level</b> with hers.</i>
<b>secured</b>	Not likely to fail or give way.
<b>shackled</b>	Bound by chains fastened around the ankles.
<b>subject to</b>	Being under the power or sovereignty of another or others.
<b>tethered</b>	Confined or restricted with or as if with a rope or chain.

<b>tied to</b>	Bound or secured closely.
<b>tied up</b>	Bound or secured closely.
<b>trussed</b>	Bound or secured closely. A <b>trussed</b> chicken.

<b>bandanna</b>	Large and brightly colored handkerchief; often used as a neckerchief.
<b>belay</b>	Secure a climber with a belayed rope. <i>The trees along the top are used as <b>belays</b>.</i>
<b>bind</b>	Provide with a binding. <i>He is in a <b>bind</b> that gets worse with every passing minute.</i>
<b>bond</b>	Join or be joined by a chemical bond. <i>A 10 000 <b>bond</b> was furnished by an alderman.</i>
<b>bound</b>	Headed or intending to head in a certain direction often used as a combining form as in college bound students. <i>An injury <b>bound</b> in fresh gauze.</i>
<b>chain</b>	A decorative chain worn round the neck as jewellery or as a badge of office. <i>A <b>chain</b> restaurant.</i>
<b>concatenate</b>	Link (things) together in a chain or series. <i>Some words may be <b>concatenated</b> such that certain sounds are omitted.</i>
<b>concatenation</b>	The action of linking things together in a series, or the condition of being linked in such a way. <i>It was caused by an improbable <b>concatenation</b> of circumstances.</i>
<b>cravat</b>	Neckwear worn in a slipknot with long ends overlapping vertically in front.
<b>ensnare</b>	Catch in or as in a trap. <i>They were <b>ensnared</b> in city centre traffic.</i>
<b>entrap</b>	Trick (someone) into committing a crime in order to secure their prosecution. <i>Discarded fishing lines can <b>entrap</b> wildlife.</i>
<b>intertwine</b>	Make a loop in. <i>As with most traditions fact and fiction have become inextricably <b>intertwined</b>.</i>
<b>knot</b>	A particular method of making a knot. <i>The scarves were <b>knotted</b> loosely around their throats.</i>
<b>lariat</b>	A long noosed rope used to catch animals.
<b>lasso</b>	Catch an animal with a lasso. <i>At last his father <b>lassoed</b> the horse.</i>
<b>link</b>	The means of connection between things linked in series. <i>The walls are held together with metal <b>links</b> placed in the wet mortar during construction.</i>

<b>nexus</b>	A connected series or group. <i>The <b>nexus</b> of any government in this country is No 10.</i>
<b>rope</b>	Catch fasten or secure with rope. <i>The calves must be <b>roped</b> and led out of the stockade.</i>
<b>shackle</b>	Chain with shackles. <i>They seek to <b>shackle</b> the oil and gas companies by imposing new controls.</i>
<b>snare</b>	Strings stretched across the lower head of a snare drum they make a rattling sound when the drum is hit. <i>The car salesman had <b>snared</b> three potential customers.</i>
<b>splice</b>	Join by interweaving strands. <i>The break was due to an imperfect <b>splice</b>.</i>
<b>string</b>	Thread a series of small objects on a string. <i>A <b>string</b> quartet.</i>
<b>strung</b>	That is on a string.
<b>throttle</b>	A pedal that controls the throttle valve. <i>It has two engines that can be <b>throttled</b>.</i>
<b>tie</b>	Unite musical notes by a tie. <i><b>Tie</b> a necktie.</i>
<b>trammel</b>	A restraint that confines or restricts freedom (especially something used to tie down or restrain a prisoner). <i>We have no wish to be <b>trammelled</b> by convention.</i>
<b>trap</b>	Hold or catch as if in a trap. <i>A bear <b>trap</b>.</i>
<b>tying</b>	The act of tying or binding things together.
<b>undergird</b>	Make secure underneath. <i>That s a philosophy that needs to <b>undergird</b> retailers business plans this year.</i>
<b>yarn</b>	Tell or spin a yarn. <i>They were <b>yarning</b> about local legends and superstitions.</i>
