- *A very large solitary cat with a yellow-brown coat striped with black, native to the forests of Asia but becoming increasingly rare.*
- *A dynamic economy of one of the smaller East Asian countries, especially that of Singapore, Taiwan, or South Korea.*
- *Large feline of forests in most of Asia having a tawny coat with black stripes; endangered.*
- *Used to refer to someone fierce, determined, or ambitious.*
- *A person with an insatiable appetite for something.*
- *A fierce or audacious person.*

### **activist**

A person who campaigns to bring about political or social change.  
*A committed animal rights **activist**.*

### **doer**

A person who is admired because of their courage and toughness.  
*I m a **doer** not a moaner.*

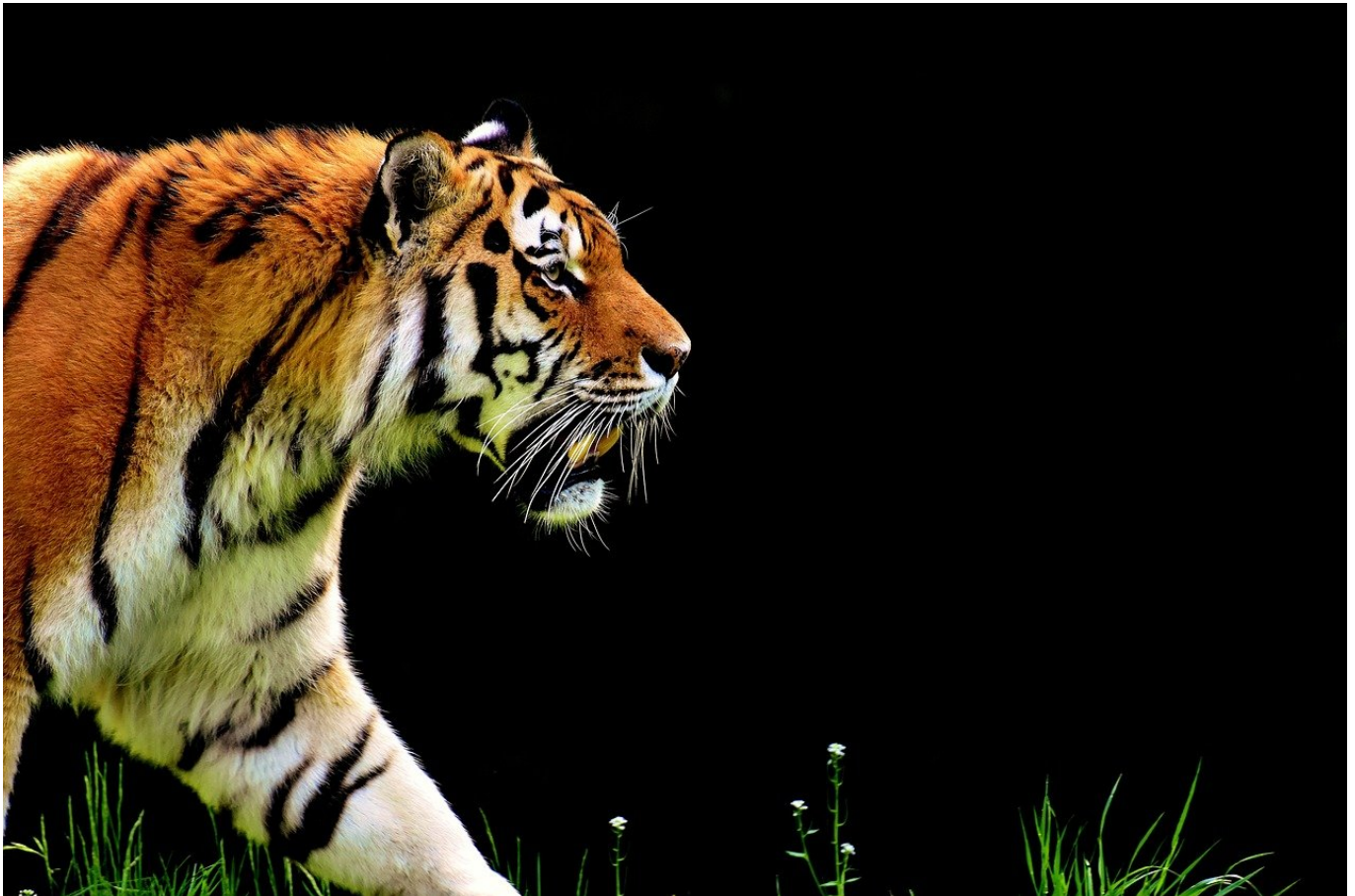
### **entrepreneur**

A person who sets up a business or businesses, taking on financial risks in the hope of profit.  
*The music **entrepreneur** pulled back from financing a screenplay Hopper had written.*

### **high achiever**

An air mass of higher than normal pressure.

<b>man of action</b>	Any living or extinct member of the family Hominidae characterized by superior intelligence, articulate speech, and erect carriage.
<b>panthera tigris</b>	An Asian river; a tributary of the Euphrates River.
<b>performer</b>	A person who entertains an audience. <i>A circus <b>performer</b>.</i>
<b>succeeder</b>	A person who accomplishes a desired aim or result. <i>The true <b>succeeder</b> of his house.</i>
<b>woman of action</b>	An adult female person (as opposed to a man).
<b>worker</b>	A neuter or undeveloped female bee, wasp, ant, or other social insect, large numbers of which do the basic work of the colony. <i>He s a miracle <b>worker</b>.</i>



### Usage Examples of "Tiger" as a noun

- *Despite his wound, he still fought like a tiger.*
- *I'm a tiger for a bargain.*



## Associations of "Tiger" (30 Words)

<b>anteater</b>	A burrowing monotreme mammal covered with spines and having a long snout and claws for hunting ants and termites; native to Australia.
<b>camel</b>	A yellowish fawn colour like that of camel hair. A <b>camel</b> coat.
<b>carnivore</b>	A terrestrial or aquatic flesh-eating mammal. <i>Tyrannosaurus Rex</i> was a large <b>carnivore</b> .
<b>cat</b>	Raise an anchor from the surface of the water to the cathead. <i>His mother called me an old <b>cat</b>.</i>
<b>cheetah</b>	Long-legged spotted cat of Africa and southwestern Asia having nonretractile claws; the swiftest mammal; can be trained to run down game.

<b>eagle</b>	A figure of an eagle especially as a symbol of the US. <i>He <b>eagled</b> the last to share fourth place.</i>
<b>elephant</b>	A very large plant-eating mammal with a prehensile trunk, long curved ivory tusks, and large ears, native to Africa and southern Asia. It is the largest living land animal.
<b>giraffe</b>	A large African mammal with a very long neck and forelegs, having a coat patterned with brown patches separated by lighter lines. It is the tallest living animal.
<b>gorilla</b>	Largest anthropoid ape; terrestrial and vegetarian; of forests of central west Africa. <i>The 800 lb <b>gorilla</b> of the home mortgage industry.</i>
<b>leopard</b>	The pelt of a leopard. <i>A <b>leopard</b> print outfit.</i>
<b>lion</b>	The lion as an emblem e g of English or Scottish royalty or as a charge in heraldry.
<b>mammalian</b>	Relating to or denoting a mammal. <i>Cats and other <b>mammalian</b> predators.</i>
<b>mane</b>	Growth of hair covering the scalp of a human being. <i>He had a <b>mane</b> of white hair.</i>
<b>marsupial</b>	Relating to the marsupials.
<b>monkey</b>	A person who is dominated or controlled by another with reference to the monkey traditionally kept by an organ grinder. <i>Where have you been you little <b>monkey</b>.</i>
<b>omnivore</b>	An animal or person that eats a variety of food of both plant and animal origin.
<b>orangutan</b>	Large long-armed ape of Borneo and Sumatra having arboreal habits.
<b>ostrich</b>	A person who refuses to face reality or recognize the truth a reference to the popular notion that the ostrich hides from danger by burying its head in the sand. <i>Don t be an <b>ostrich</b> when it comes to security systems.</i>
<b>pachyderm</b>	Any of various nonruminant hoofed mammals having very thick skin: elephant; rhinoceros; hippopotamus.
<b>panda</b>	Reddish brown Old World raccoon like carnivore in some classifications considered unrelated to the giant pandas.
<b>panther</b>	A large spotted feline of tropical America similar to the leopard; in some classifications considered a member of the genus Felis.

<b>poach</b>	Cook by simmering in a small amount of liquid. <i>A breakfast of <b>poached</b> egg and grilled bacon.</i>
<b>predator</b>	A person who ruthlessly exploits others. <i>Females defend the nest by actively chasing off <b>predators</b>.</i>
<b>rhinoceros</b>	A large, heavily built plant-eating mammal with one or two horns on the nose and thick folded skin, native to Africa and southern Asia. All kinds have become endangered through hunting.
<b>simmer</b>	(of water or food that is being heated) stay just below boiling point while bubbling gently. <i>She gave him time to <b>simmer</b> down after their argument.</i>
<b>sloth</b>	A disinclination to work or exert yourself. <i>The pair had been attacked by a <b>sloth</b> of bears.</i>
<b>spotted</b>	Having spots or patches (small areas of contrasting color or texture). <i>A red <b>spotted</b> handkerchief.</i>
<b>striped</b>	Marked with or having stripes. <i>A green <b>striped</b> coat.</i>
<b>vulture</b>	A contemptible person who preys on or exploits others. <i>The press are <b>vultures</b>.</i>
<b>zebra</b>	A silvery-gold sea bream with vertical black stripes.
