## **Timbre as a Noun**

### **Definitions of "Timbre" as a noun**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “timbre” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *The distinctive quality or character of someone or something.*
- *The character or quality of a musical sound or voice as distinct from its pitch and intensity.*
- *The distinctive property of a complex sound (a voice or noise or musical sound).*
- *(music) the distinctive property of a complex sound (a voice or noise or musical sound).*



## Synonyms of "Timbre" as a noun (12 Words)

<b>colour</b>	The use of all colours not only black and white in photography or television. <i>For <b>colour</b> plant groups of winter flowering pansies.</i>
<b>quality</b>	An essential and distinguishing attribute of something or someone-Shakespeare. <i>The <b>quality</b> of students has risen.</i>
<b>resonance</b>	Having the character of a loud deep sound; the quality of being resonant. <i>The concepts lose their emotional <b>resonance</b>.</i>
<b>ring</b>	The sound of a bell ringing E A Poe. <i>The distinctive <b>ring</b> of the church bell.</i>
<b>sound</b>	An individual sound unit of speech without concern as to whether or not it is a phoneme of some language. <i>She heard the <b>sound</b> of voices in the hall.</i>
<b>sound quality</b>	A narrow channel of the sea joining two larger bodies of water.

<b>timber</b>	The distinctive property of a complex sound (a voice or noise or musical sound). <i>Contracts to cut <b>timber</b>.</i>
<b>tonality</b>	The use of conventional keys and harmony as the basis of musical composition. <i>The sonata is noteworthy for its extensive variations of mood and <b>tonality</b>.</i>
<b>tone</b>	A musical interval of two semitones. <i>The piano <b>tone</b> appears lacking in warmth.</i>
<b>tone colour</b>	A quality of a given color that differs slightly from another color.
<b>voice</b>	The melody carried by a particular voice or instrument in polyphonic music. <i>A singer takes good care of his <b>voice</b>.</i>
<b>voice quality</b>	Expressing in coherent verbal form.



### Usage Examples of "Timbre" as a noun

- *The timbre of her soprano was rich and lovely.*
- *A voice high in pitch but rich in timbre.*



- You must demonstrate your moral timbre as a human being.
- Trumpet mutes with different timbres.



## Associations of "Timbre" (30 Words)

<b>acoustic</b>	Of or relating to the science of acoustics. <i>Acoustic</i> properties of a hall.
<b>alto</b>	An alto saxophone. <i>Alto</i> clarinet or recorder.
<b>ballad</b>	A poem or song narrating a story in short stanzas Traditional ballads are typically of unknown authorship having been passed on orally from one generation to the next.
<b>beep</b>	Call summon or alert with a beeper. Leave a message after the <b>beep</b> .
<b>blowing</b>	Processing that involves blowing a gas.

<b>bray</b>	A sound voice or laugh resembling a bray. <i>The mule uttered its insane <b>bray</b>.</i>
<b>chord</b>	Play chords on a string instrument. <i>The triumphal opening <b>chords</b>.</i>
<b>chorus</b>	A section of text spoken by the chorus in drama. <i>Strong guitar driven songs with big big <b>choruses</b>.</i>
<b>diatonic</b>	Of a melody or harmony constructed from a diatonic scale.
<b>dysphonia</b>	Difficulty in speaking due to a physical disorder of the mouth, tongue, throat, or vocal cords.
<b>emotionless</b>	Unmoved by feeling-Margaret Deland. <i>Her voice was flat and <b>emotionless</b>.</i>
<b>lugubrious</b>	Looking or sounding sad and dismal. <i>His face looked even more <b>lugubrious</b> than usual.</i>
<b>musical</b>	Talented in or devoted to music. <i>Comes from a very <b>musical</b> family.</i>
<b>octave</b>	The interval between the two notes at the extremes of an octave.
<b>sing</b>	Deliver by singing. <i>He knew Himself to <b>sing</b> and build the lofty rhyme.</i>
<b>singing</b>	The act of singing vocal music. <i>The cries of laughter from children are a pleasant counterpoint to the <b>singing</b> of blackbirds.</i>
<b>solfege</b>	A voice exercise; singing scales or runs to the same syllable.
<b>song</b>	A musical composition suggestive of a song. <i>A pop <b>song</b>.</i>
<b>tonal</b>	Having tonality i e tones and chords organized in relation to one tone such as a keynote or tonic. <i>The poem s <b>tonal</b> lapses.</i>
<b>tone</b>	A steady sound without overtones. <i>The general <b>tone</b> of articles appearing in the newspapers is that the government should withdraw.</i>
<b>toot</b>	Make a toot. <i>An accidental <b>toot</b> from the saxophonist.</i>
<b>tune</b>	The property of producing accurately a note of a given pitch. <i>The radio was <b>tuned</b> to the BBC.</i>
<b>verbal</b>	A verbal noun. <i>A <b>verbal</b> agreement.</i>

- vocal** Having or using the power to produce speech or sound.  
*He was **vocal** in condemning the action.*
- vocalization** The action or process of changing a consonant to a semivowel or vowel.  
*The respiratory muscles are involved in **vocalization** and swallowing.*
- vocalize** Write (a language such as Hebrew) with vowel points.  
*Gillie could scarcely **vocalize** her responses.*
- voice** Give voice to.  
*She had strained and falsified her literary **voice**.*
- whispering** Speaking softly without vibration of the vocal cords.
- whistle** The act of signalling e g summoning by whistling or blowing a whistle.  
*She **whistled** for her maid.*
- wordless** (of a vocal sound) not in the form of words.  
*A simple **wordless** melody.*
