<b>creeping sensation</b>	Someone unpleasantly strange or eccentric.
<b>dart</b>	A small pointed missile with a feather or plastic flight used in the game of darts. <i>The classroom was littered with paper <b>darts</b>.</i>

<b>goose pimples</b>	Web-footed long-necked typically gregarious migratory aquatic birds usually larger and less aquatic than ducks.
<b>goosebumps</b>	A state of the skin caused by cold, fear, or excitement, in which small bumps appear on the surface as the hairs become erect; goose pimples. <i>This place gives me <b>goosebumps</b>.</i>
<b>itch</b>	A contagious skin infection caused by the itch mite characterized by persistent itching and skin irritation. <i>He has a bad case of the <b>itch</b>.</i>
<b>pins and needles</b>	A number you choose and use to gain access to various accounts.
<b>pricking</b>	The act of puncturing with a small point.
<b>prickling</b>	A somatic sensation as from many tiny stings.
<b>quiver</b>	An almost pleasurable sensation of fright. <i>She couldn't help the <b>quiver</b> in her voice.</i>
<b>rush</b>	Physician and American Revolutionary leader; signer of the Declaration of Independence (1745-1813). <i>A <b>rush</b> job.</i>
<b>shiver</b>	An almost pleasurable sensation of fright. <i>A look that gave him the <b>shivers</b>.</i>
<b>shudder</b>	An act of shuddering. <i>The elevator rose with a <b>shudder</b>.</i>
<b>smart</b>	Intelligence; acumen. <i>The <b>smart</b> of the recent cuts.</i>
<b>smarting</b>	The fact or sensation of feeling a sharp stinging pain. <i>Ammonia can cause <b>smarting</b> of the eyes and breathing difficulties.</i>
<b>stab</b>	A wound made by stabbing. <i>The fuzz guitar riff is replaced by some slinky brass <b>stabs</b>.</i>
<b>sting</b>	A wound from a sting. <i>I recalled the <b>sting</b> of his betrayal.</i>
<b>stinging</b>	A mental pain or distress. <i>He felt the <b>stinging</b> of nettles.</i>
<b>surge</b>	A sudden marked increase in voltage or current in an electric circuit. <i>Sophie felt a <b>surge</b> of anger.</i>

**thrill**

A wave or nervous tremor of emotion or sensation.  
*The **thrills** of space travel.*

**throb**

A strong, regular beat or sound; a steady pulsation.  
*The **throb** of the ship's engines.*

**tingling**

A somatic sensation as from many tiny prickles.

**tremble**

A reflex motion caused by cold or fear or excitement.  
*There was a slight **tremble** in his voice.*

**tremor**

An involuntary vibration (as if from illness or fear).  
*A **tremor** of unease.*

**vibration**

A regular periodic variation in value about a mean.  
*Powerful **vibrations** from an earthquake.*

**wave**

A shape regarded as resembling a breaking wave.  
*A **wave** of settlers.*

### Synonyms of "Tingle" as a verb (22 Words)

**be irritated**

Represent, as of a character on stage.

**be itchy**

Work in a specific place, with a specific subject, or in a specific function.

<b>have a creeping sensation</b>	Have or possess, either in a concrete or an abstract sense.
<b>have goose pimples</b>	Serve oneself to, or consume regularly.
<b>have gooseflesh</b>	Undergo (as of injuries and illnesses).
<b>have pins and needles</b>	Serve oneself to, or consume regularly.
<b>itch</b>	Scrape or rub as if to relieve itching. <i>I <b>itched</b> all over.</i>
<b>prickle</b>	Cause a tingling sensation in. <i>She <b>prickled</b> at the implication that she had led a protected life.</i>
<b>pulsate</b>	Produce a regular throbbing sensation or sound. <i>The city <b>pulsated</b> with music and excitement.</i>
<b>quake</b>	(of a person) shake or shudder with fear. <i>The rumbling vibrations set the whole valley quaking.</i>
<b>quaver</b>	Sing or play with trills, alternating with the half note above or below. <i>His voice <b>quavered</b> with rage.</i>
<b><u>quiver</u></b>	Move with or as if with a regular alternating motion. <i>Juliet's lower lip <b>quivered</b>.</i>
<b>shiver</b>	Tremble convulsively, as from fear or excitement. <i>The children are <b>shivering</b> turn on the heat.</i>
<b><u>shudder</u></b>	Tremble convulsively, as from fear or excitement. <i>The building cracked and <b>shuddered</b>.</i>
<b>smart</b>	(of a wound or part of the body) feel or cause a sharp stinging pain. <i>Her legs were scratched and <b>smarting</b>.</i>
<b><u>sting</u></b>	Deliver a sting to. <i>A nettle <b>stings</b> if you brush it lightly.</i>
<b><u>throb</u></b>	Pulsate or pound with abnormal force. <i>Her heart was <b>throbbing</b>.</i>
<b><u>tremble</u></b>	(of a person or part of the body) shake involuntarily, typically as a result of anxiety, excitement, or frailty. <i>Her voice <b>trembled</b> as she described how much she missed him.</i>
<b><u>twitch</u></b>	Use a twitch to subdue a horse. <i>His face is <b>twitching</b>.</i>
<b><u>vibrate</u></b>	Sound with resonance. <i>The bumblebee <b>vibrated</b> its wings for a few seconds.</i>

Move or cause to move up and down or from side to side with small rapid movements.

Vi **wiggled** her toes.
