<b>annoying</b>	Causing irritation or annoyance. <i>Tapping an <b>annoying</b> rhythm on his glass with his fork.</i>
<b>boring</b>	Not interesting; tedious. <i>A <b>boring</b> evening with uninteresting people.</i>
<b>bothersome</b>	Annoying; troublesome. <i>Aircraft noise is particularly <b>bothersome</b> near the airport.</i>
<b>common</b>	Commonly encountered. <i>Problems <b>common</b> to both communities.</i>
<b>commonplace</b>	Not challenging; dull and lacking excitement. <i><b>Commonplace</b> everyday activities.</i>
<b>deadening</b>	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. <i>A <b>deadening</b> routine.</i>
<b>dull</b>	Blunted in responsiveness or sensibility. <i>She said she wouldn't be <b>dull</b> and lonely.</i>

<b>everyday</b>	Happening or used every day; daily. <i>Everyday clothes.</i>
<b>exasperating</b>	Extremely annoying or displeasing. <i>I ve had an <b>exasperating</b> day.</i>
<b>ho-hum</b>	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness.
<b>humdrum</b>	Not challenging; dull and lacking excitement. <i><b>Humdrum</b> routine work.</i>
<b>infuriating</b>	Extremely annoying or displeasing. <i>Her <b>infuriating</b> indifference.</i>
<b>irksome</b>	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. <i>An <b>irksome</b> journey.</i>
<b>irritating</b>	Serving to stimulate or excite. <i>An <b>irritating</b> delay.</i>
<b>laborious</b>	(of speech or writing style) showing obvious signs of effort and lacking in fluency. <i>Years of <b>laborious</b> training.</i>
<b>maddening</b>	Extremely annoying. <i>The ceaseless tumult of the jukebox was <b>maddening</b>.</i>
<b>monotonous</b>	Tediously repetitious or lacking in variety. <i>Nothing is so <b>monotonous</b> as the sea.</i>
<b>ordinary</b>	With no special or distinctive features; normal. <i>He sets out to depict <b>ordinary</b> people.</i>
<b>pedestrian</b>	Lacking inspiration or excitement; dull. <i>A <b>pedestrian</b> movie plot.</i>
<b>prosaic</b>	Having or using the style or diction of prose as opposed to poetry; lacking imaginativeness or originality. <i>The masses were too preoccupied by <b>prosaic</b> day to day concerns.</i>
<b>quotidian</b>	Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>His story is an achingly human one mired in <b>quotidian</b> details.</i>
<b>repetitious</b>	Characterized by repetition. <i>Many hours of <b>repetitious</b> labour.</i>
<b>repetitive</b>	Repetitive and persistent. <i>A <b>repetitive</b> task.</i>
<b>routine</b>	Found in the ordinary course of events- Anita Diamant. <i>The Ministry insisted that this was just a <b>routine</b> annual drill.</i>
<b>run-of-the-mill</b>	Not special in any way.

<b>slow</b>	Slow to learn or understand lacking intellectual acuity. <i>A <b>slow</b> process.</i>
<b><u>tedious</u></b>	Too long, slow, or dull; tiresome or monotonous. <i><b>Tedious</b> days on the train.</i>
<b><u>troublesome</u></b>	Difficult to deal with. <i>A <b>troublesome</b> situation.</i>
<b>trying</b>	Hard to endure. <i>It had been a very <b>trying</b> day.</i>
<b><u>uneventful</u></b>	Not marked by interesting or exciting events. <i>A place where dull people lead <b>uneventful</b> lives.</i>
<b>unexciting</b>	Not stimulating. <i>Many school prospectuses are dull and <b>unexciting</b>.</i>
<b>uninteresting</b>	Arousing no interest or attention or curiosity or excitement. <i>A very <b>uninteresting</b> account of her trip.</i>
<b><u>unremarkable</u></b>	Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>An <b>unremarkable</b> house.</i>
<b>unvaried</b>	Lacking variety. <i>A plain <b>unvaried</b> diet.</i>
<b>unvarying</b>	Unvarying in nature. <i>Principles of <b>unvarying</b> validity.</i>
<b><u>usual</u></b>	Occurring or encountered or experienced or observed frequently or in accordance with regular practice or procedure. <i>The <b>usual</b> summer heat.</i>
<b><u>vexatious</u></b>	Causing irritation or annoyance. <i>A frivolous or <b>vexatious</b> litigant.</i>
<b>vexing</b>	Causing annoyance, frustration, or worry. <i>The most <b>vexing</b> questions for policymakers.</i>
<b>wearing</b>	Mentally or physically tiring. <i>It would be a lot less <b>wearing</b> if we could work together amicably.</i>
<b>wearisome</b>	So lacking in interest as to cause mental weariness. <i>Other people s dreams are dreadfully <b>wearisome</b>.</i>
<b>workaday</b>	Found in the ordinary course of events. <i>The <b>workaday</b> world of timecards and performance reviews.</i>

<b>annoying</b>	The act of troubling or annoying someone. <i><b>Annoying</b> habits.</i>
<b>banality</b>	The fact or condition of being banal; unoriginality. <i>There is an essential <b>banality</b> to the story he tells.</i>
<b>bore</b>	Cause to be bored. <i><b>Bore</b> a hole in the wall to pass the cable through.</i>
<b>bored</b>	Tired of the world. <i><b>Bored</b> with life.</i>
<b>boredom</b>	The state of feeling bored. <i>I ll die of <b>boredom</b> if I live that long.</i>
<b>boring</b>	The act of drilling. <i>A <b>boring</b> evening with uninteresting people.</i>
<b>bromide</b>	A sedative preparation containing potassium bromide. <i>Feel good <b>bromides</b> create the illusion of problem solving.</i>
<b>dull</b>	Become dull or lusterless in appearance lose shine or brightness. <i>A <b>dull</b> throbbing.</i>
<b>ennui</b>	The feeling of being bored by something tedious. <i>He succumbed to <b>ennui</b> and despair.</i>
<b>exhausting</b>	Making one feel very tired; very tiring. <i>An <b>exhausting</b> job in the hot sun.</i>
<b>fatigue</b>	A group of soldiers ordered to do menial tasks. <i>Growing <b>fatigue</b> was apparent from the decline in the execution of their athletic skills.</i>
<b>featureless</b>	Lacking distinguishing characteristics or features. <i>The <b>featureless</b> landscape of the steppe.</i>
<b>humdrum</b>	Tediously repetitious or lacking in variety. <i><b>Humdrum</b> routine work.</i>
<b>irksome</b>	Irritating; annoying. <i>What an <b>irksome</b> task the writing of long letters is.</i>
<b>jejune</b>	(of ideas or writings) dry and uninteresting. <i>The <b>jejune</b> diets of the very poor.</i>
<b>lackluster</b>	Lacking brilliance or vitality. <i>A dull <b>lackluster</b> life.</i>
<b>monotonous</b>	Sounded or spoken in a tone unvarying in pitch. <i>Her slurred <b>monotonous</b> speech.</i>

<b>monotony</b>	Sameness of pitch or tone in a sound or utterance. <i>Depression flattens the voice almost to <b>monotony</b>.</i>
<b>ponderous</b>	Having great mass and weight and unwieldiness. <i>The show is loaded down with <b>ponderous</b> one liners.</i>
<b>prolixity</b>	Boring verbosity.
<b>prosaic</b>	Lacking wit or imagination. <i>A <b>prosaic</b> and unimaginative essay.</i>
<b>tedious</b>	Too long, slow, or dull; tiresome or monotonous. <i><b>Tedious</b> days on the train.</i>
<b>tedium</b>	Dullness owing to length or slowness. <i>The <b>tedium</b> of car journeys.</i>
<b>tired</b>	(of a thing) no longer fresh or in good condition. <i>I have to look after these animals when you get <b>tired</b> of them.</i>
<b>tiring</b>	Causing one to need rest or sleep; fatiguing. <i>It had been a <b>tiring</b> day.</i>
<b>uninteresting</b>	Not arousing curiosity or interest. <i>The scenery is dull and <b>uninteresting</b>.</i>
<b>unvaried</b>	Not involving change. <i>A plain <b>unvaried</b> diet.</i>
<b>vapid</b>	Lacking significance or liveliness or spirit or zest. <i><b>Vapid</b> tea.</i>
<b>wearing</b>	The mechanical process of wearing or grinding something down as by particles washing over it. <i>A plan of action will make the whole event a less <b>wearing</b> experience.</i>
<b>wearisome</b>	Causing one to feel tired or bored. <i>Other people s dreams are dreadfully <b>wearisome</b>.</i>
