Definitions of "Titillate" as a verb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “titillate” as a verb can have the following definitions:

- *Excite pleurably or erotically.*
- *Lightly touch; tickle.*
- *Arouse (someone) to interest or mild excitement, especially through sexually suggestive images or words.*
- *Touch (a body part) lightly so as to excite the surface nerves and cause uneasiness, laughter, or spasmodic movements.*

Synonyms of "Titillate" as a verb (16 Words)

arouse	Stimulate sexually. <i>The letter aroused in him a sense of urgency.</i>
attract	Be attractive to. <i>A campaign to attract more visitors to Shetland.</i>
chuck	Eject the contents of the stomach through the mouth. <i>She kept the personal bits and pieces and chucked the rest.</i>

<u>excite</u>	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>Excite the neurons.</i>
<u>fascinate</u>	Attract; cause to be enamored. <i>I've always been fascinated by computers.</i>
interest	Excite the curiosity of engage the interest of. <i>Efforts were made to interest her in a purchase.</i>
pet	Stroke or caress gently. <i>Couples necking and petting in cars.</i>
<u>please</u>	Give pleasure to or be pleasing to. <i>This is the first time in ages that I can just please myself.</i>
rouse	Cause to be agitated excited or roused. <i>His evasiveness roused my curiosity.</i>
sexually arousing	Cause to become awake or conscious.
stimulate	Raise levels of physiological or nervous activity in (the body or any biological system). <i>The reader could not fail to be stimulated by the ideas presented.</i>
stir	Mix or add by stirring. <i>Nothing stirred except the wind.</i>
thrill	Cause to be thrilled by some perceptual input. <i>The children were thrilled at the prospect of going to the movies.</i>
<u>tickle</u>	Feel sudden intense sensation or emotion. <i>Here are a couple of anecdotes that might tickle your fancy.</i>
vellicate	Touch (a body part) lightly so as to excite the surface nerves and cause uneasiness, laughter, or spasmodic movements. <i>Smooth surfaces can vellicate the teeth.</i>

Usage Examples of "Titillate" as a verb

- *The press are paid to titillate the public.*

Associations of "Titillate" (30 Words)

arousal	Mutual sexual fondling prior to sexual intercourse. <i>Sexual arousal in dreams is common.</i>
auditory	Relating to the sense of hearing. <i>Auditory processing.</i>

catalyst	A person or thing that precipitates an event. <i>The invasion acted as a catalyst to unite the country.</i>
excitation	The application of current to the winding of an electromagnet to produce a magnetic field. <i>Continuous rotation of the motor by sequential excitation of the phase windings.</i>
excitement	Something that arouses a feeling of excitement. <i>Her cheeks were flushed with excitement.</i>
exciting	Stimulating interest and discussion. <i>An exciting account of her trip.</i>
funny	Comic strips in newspapers. <i>Suddenly my stomach felt funny.</i>
<u>impetus</u>	A force that moves something along. <i>Hit the booster coil before the flywheel loses all its impetus.</i>
incentive	An additional payment (or other remuneration) to employees as a means of increasing output. <i>Tax incentives for investing in depressed areas.</i>
inducement	A thing that persuades or leads someone to do something. <i>There is no inducement to wait for payment.</i>
inspiration	(theology) a special influence of a divinity on the minds of human beings. <i>Crackling sounds are heard in the stethoscope on inspiration.</i>
inspire	Spur on or encourage especially by cheers and shouts. <i>His philosophy inspired a later generation of environmentalists.</i>
<u>inspiring</u>	Having the effect of inspiring someone. <i>The scenery is not very inspiring.</i>
irritant	Causing slight inflammation or other discomfort to the body. <i>Chlorine bleaches can be irritant to the skin.</i>
<u>motivate</u>	Request (something) and present facts and arguments in support of one's request. <i>He was primarily motivated by the desire for profit.</i>
motivation	A set of facts and arguments used in support of a proposal. <i>His motivation was at a high level.</i>
motivator	A person who promotes interest in or enthusiasm for something. <i>Music can be a great exercise motivator.</i>
<u>motive</u>	A motif in art, literature, or music. <i>The motive principle of a writer's work.</i>

provocation	Needed encouragement. <i>He burst into tears at the slightest provocation.</i>
sensation	The capacity to have physical sensations. <i>Anticipation produced in me a sensation somewhere between hope and fear.</i>
sense	Become aware of not through the senses but instinctively. <i>I sense his hostility.</i>
stimulant	Raising levels of physiological or nervous activity in the body. <i>It is a stimulant that has a direct effect on the nervous system.</i>
stimulate	Encourage or arouse interest or enthusiasm in. <i>This herbal infusion doesn't stimulate.</i>
stimulating	That stimulates. <i>A stimulating discussion.</i>
stimulation	The effect of a stimulus (on nerves or organs etc). <i>The stimulation of a revolution in intelligence affairs.</i>
stimulus	An interesting and exciting quality. <i>She loved the stimulus of the job.</i>
sting	Cause a sharp or stinging pain or discomfort. <i>She felt the sharp sting of tears behind her eyelids.</i>
tactile	Designed to be perceived by touch. <i>A tactile reflex.</i>
tickle	Touch (a body part) lightly so as to excite the surface nerves and cause uneasiness, laughter, or spasmodic movements. <i>He is tickled by the idea.</i>
urge	Encourage someone to continue or succeed. <i>Drawing up outside the house he urged her inside.</i>
