<b>autograph</b>	A signature, especially that of a celebrity written as a memento for an admirer. <i>The earliest version of the work is possibly an <b>autograph</b>.</i>
<b>caption</b>	Provide with a caption as of a photograph or a drawing. <i>The photograph was <b>captioned</b> Three little maids.</i>
<b>cognomen</b>	A name or nickname.
<b>descendants</b>	All of the offspring of a given progenitor.
<b>dub</b>	The new sounds added by dubbing. <i>The media <b>dubbed</b> anorexia the slimming disease.</i>
<b><u>epithet</u></b>	An epithet used as a term of abuse. <i>Old men are often unfairly awarded the <b>epithet</b> dirty.</i>
<b>evaluation</b>	Act of ascertaining or fixing the value or worth of. <i>An initial <b>evaluation</b> of the programme.</i>
<b>given</b>	(of a document) signed and dated. <i>At a couture house attentive service is a <b>given</b>.</i>
<b>heading</b>	A strip of cloth at the top of a curtain above the hooks or wire by which it is suspended. <i>He crawled on a <b>heading</b> of 90 degrees until he came to the track.</i>
<b>judgment</b>	An opinion formed by judging something. <i>They criticized my <b>judgment</b> of the contestants.</i>
<b><u>moniker</u></b>	A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name). <i>His real <b>moniker</b> is Dave Kennedy.</i>
<b><u>name</u></b>	Assign a specified usually proper name to. <i><b>Name</b> your accomplices.</i>
<b><u>nickname</u></b>	Give a nickname to. <i>An area <b>nicknamed</b> Sniper s Alley.</i>
<b>nominally</b>	In name only. <i>The Republicans <b>nominally</b> controlled both houses of Congress but by slim margins.</i>
<b>patronymic</b>	Of or derived from a personal or family name. <i>A <b>patronymic</b> derived from the name of their original lordship.</i>
<b>reputation</b>	The beliefs or opinions that are generally held about someone or something. <i>He acquired a <b>reputation</b> as an actor before he started writing.</i>
<b>repute</b>	Look on as or consider. <i>He s <b>reputed</b> to earn 7m per annum.</i>

<b>rubric</b>	An explanation or definition of an obscure word in a text. <i>It is usually discussed under the <b>rubric</b> of functional obesity.</i>
<b><u>sir</u></b>	Used as a title before the forename of a knight or baronet. <i>Excuse me <b>sir</b>.</i>
<b>sobriquet</b>	A person's nickname. <i>She was a vast and haughty person who answered to the <b>sobriquet</b> Duchesse.</i>
<b>stature</b>	High level of respect gained by impressive development or achievement. <i>A man of great <b>stature</b>.</i>
<b>surname</b>	Give a surname to. <i>Eddie Penham so aptly <b>surnamed</b> had produced a hand painted sign for us.</i>
