elite

Selected as the best.

***Elite** colleges.*

highborn

Belonging to the peerage.

Owning much land, especially through inheritance.

*The **landed** aristocracy.*

noble

Of imposing or magnificent size or appearance.

A **noble** gas such as helium or neon.

of noble birth

Impressive in appearance.

patrician

Befitting a person of noble origin.

A proud **patrician** face.

well born

Resulting favorably.

<u>adopt</u>	Take into one's family. <i>They adopted the Jewish faith.</i>
<u>affectionate</u>	Having or displaying warmth or affection. <i>His affectionate nature.</i>
<u>alias</u>	As known or named at another time or place. <i>Eric Blair alias George Orwell.</i>
<u>alphabetically</u>	In alphabetical order. <i>Books are now arranged alphabetically by author.</i>
<u>appellation</u>	A name or title. <i>The city fully justifies its appellation the Pearl of the Orient.</i>
<u>appraisal</u>	A document appraising the value of something (as for insurance or taxation). <i>The report has been subject to appraisal.</i>
<u>assessment</u>	An amount determined as payable. <i>Assessments of market value.</i>

autograph	<p>A signature, especially that of a celebrity written as a memento for an admirer.</p> <p><i>The earliest version of the work is possibly an autograph.</i></p>
caption	<p>Provide with a caption as of a photograph or a drawing.</p> <p><i>The photograph was captioned Three little maids.</i></p>
cognomen	<p>A name or nickname.</p>
descendants	<p>All of the offspring of a given progenitor.</p>
dub	<p>The new sounds added by dubbing.</p> <p><i>The media dubbed anorexia the slimming disease.</i></p>
<u>epithet</u>	<p>An epithet used as a term of abuse.</p> <p><i>Old men are often unfairly awarded the epithet dirty.</i></p>
evaluation	<p>Act of ascertaining or fixing the value or worth of.</p> <p><i>An initial evaluation of the programme.</i></p>
given	<p>(of a document) signed and dated.</p> <p><i>At a couture house attentive service is a given.</i></p>
heading	<p>A strip of cloth at the top of a curtain above the hooks or wire by which it is suspended.</p> <p><i>He crawled on a heading of 90 degrees until he came to the track.</i></p>
judgment	<p>An opinion formed by judging something.</p> <p><i>They criticized my judgment of the contestants.</i></p>
<u>moniker</u>	<p>A familiar name for a person (often a shortened version of a person's given name).</p> <p><i>His real moniker is Dave Kennedy.</i></p>
<u>name</u>	<p>Assign a specified usually proper proper name to.</p> <p><i>Name your accomplices.</i></p>
<u>nickname</u>	<p>Give a nickname to.</p> <p><i>An area nicknamed Sniper s Alley.</i></p>
nominally	<p>In name only.</p> <p><i>The Republicans nominally controlled both houses of Congress but by slim margins.</i></p>
patronymic	<p>Of or derived from a personal or family name.</p> <p><i>A patronymic derived from the name of their original lordship.</i></p>
reputation	<p>The beliefs or opinions that are generally held about someone or something.</p> <p><i>He acquired a reputation as an actor before he started writing.</i></p>
repute	<p>Look on as or consider.</p> <p><i>He s reputed to earn 7m per annum.</i></p>

rubric	An explanation or definition of an obscure word in a text. <i>It is usually discussed under the rubric of functional obesity.</i>
<u>sir</u>	Used as a title before the forename of a knight or baronet. <i>Excuse me sir.</i>
sobriquet	A person's nickname. <i>She was a vast and haughty person who answered to the sobriquet Duchesse.</i>
stature	High level of respect gained by impressive development or achievement. <i>A man of great stature.</i>
surname	Give a surname to. <i>Eddie Penham so aptly surnamed had produced a hand painted sign for us.</i>
