| <b>brouhaha</b>                    | Loud confused noise from many sources.<br><i>All that election <b>brouhaha</b>.</i>  |
| <b><a href="#">commotion</a></b>   | Civil insurrection.<br><i>Damage caused by civil <b>commotion</b>.</i>   |
| <b>confusion</b>                   | Uncertainty about what is happening, intended, or required.<br><i>Most of the errors are reasonable <b>confusions</b> between similar words.</i>   |
| <b><a href="#">disturbance</a></b> | A state in which normal mental or physical functioning is disrupted.<br><i>They were amazed by the furious <b>disturbance</b> they had caused.</i> |

| <b>dither</b>      | An excited state of agitation.<br><i>After months of <b>dither</b> ministers had still not agreed.</i>   |
| <b>flap</b>        | An act of flapping something typically a wing or arm up and down or from side to side.<br><i>There was a terrible <b>flap</b> about the theft.</i> |
| <b>fuss</b>        | An angry disturbance.<br><i>They settled in with very little <b>fuss</b>.</i>  |
| <b>hubbub</b>      | Loud confused noise from many sources.<br><i>She fought through the <b>hubbub</b>.</i>   |
| <b>outcry</b>      | A loud utterance; often in protest or opposition.<br><i>The public <b>outcry</b> over the bombing.</i>   |
| <b>palaver</b>     | Loud and confused and empty talk.<br><i>There s a lot of <b>palaver</b> involved.</i>  |
| <b>pandemonium</b> | Wild and noisy disorder or confusion; uproar.<br><i>There was complete <b>pandemonium</b> everyone just panicked.</i>                              |
| <b>pother</b>      | A commotion or fuss.<br><i>What a <b>pother</b> you make.</i>  |
| <b>tempest</b>     | (literary) a violent wind.<br><i>A raging <b>tempest</b>.</i>  |
| <b>to-do</b>       | A disorderly outburst or tumult.   |
| <b>tumult</b>      | The act of making a noisy disturbance.<br><i>The whole neighbourhood was in a state of fear and <b>tumult</b>.</i>                                 |
| <b>turmoil</b>     | A violent disturbance.<br><i>He endured years of inner <b>turmoil</b>.</i>   |
| <b>uproar</b>      | A loud and impassioned noise or disturbance.<br><i>It caused an <b>uproar</b> in the press.</i>  |
| <b>upset</b>       | The act of upsetting something.<br><i>His carelessness could have caused an ecological <b>upset</b>.</i>   |
