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## Associations of "To no avail meaning" (30 Words)

<b>abnegation</b>	The denial and rejection of a doctrine or belief. <i><b>Abnegation</b> of the Holy Trinity.</i>
<b>apophasis</b>	Mentioning something by saying it will not be mentioned.
<b>controvert</b>	Deny the truth of (something). <i>Subsequent work from the same laboratory <b>controverted</b> these results.</i>
<b>deniable</b>	Able to be denied. <i>The government did agree to play a limited and <b>deniable</b> role in the rebellion.</i>
<b><u>denial</u></b>	A defendant’s answer or plea denying the truth of the charges against him. <i>The <b>denial</b> of insurance to people with certain medical conditions.</i>
<b><u>deny</u></b>	Deny oneself something restrain especially from indulging in some pleasure. <i>There was no way that I was going to <b>deny</b> myself ice cream.</i>
<b><u>disallow</u></b>	Refuse to declare valid. <i>He was offside and the goal was <b>disallowed</b>.</i>
<b><u>disavow</u></b>	Refuse to acknowledge; disclaim knowledge of; responsibility for, or association with. <i>The union leaders resisted pressure to <b>disavow</b> picket line violence.</i>
<b>disavowal</b>	The denial of any responsibility or support for something; repudiation. <i>They know this despite their <b>disavowals</b>.</i>
<b>disclaim</b>	Make a disclaimer about. <i>The earl <b>disclaimed</b> his title.</i>
<b>extradite</b>	Hand over (a person accused or convicted of a crime) to the jurisdiction of the foreign state in which the crime was committed. <i>Brazil refused to <b>extradite</b> him to Britain.</i>
<b>gainsay</b>	Deny or contradict (a fact or statement). <i>None could <b>gainsay</b> her.</i>

<b>impugn</b>	Dispute the truth, validity, or honesty of (a statement or motive); call into question. <i>The father does not <b>impugn</b> her capacity as a good mother.</i>
<b>inadmissible</b>	Not to be allowed or tolerated. <i>An <b>inadmissible</b> interference in the affairs of the Church.</i>
<b>interdict</b>	A court order forbidding an act; a negative injunction. <i>Army efforts to <b>interdict</b> enemy supply shipments.</i>
<b>negate</b>	Make ineffective; nullify. <i>Alcohol <b>negates</b> the effects of the drug.</i>
<b>nullify</b>	Make of no use or value; cancel out. <i>Judges were unwilling to <b>nullify</b> government decisions.</i>
<b>objection</b>	The speech act of objecting. <i>They have raised no <b>objections</b> to the latest plans.</i>
<b>ostracism</b>	The state of being banished or ostracized (excluded from society by general consent). <i>The family suffered social <b>ostracism</b>.</i>
<b>perjure</b>	Knowingly tell an untruth in a legal court and render oneself guilty of perjury. <i>She admitted that she had <b>perjured</b> herself.</i>
<b>rebut</b>	Drive back or repel (a person or attack). <i>But he their sharp assault right boldly did <b>rebut</b>.</i>
<b>refusal</b>	The act of refusing. <i>He became tired of his friend s <b>refusal</b> to see him.</i>
<b>refuse</b>	Refuse to let have. <i>Her horse <b>refused</b> a high hedge.</i>
<b>refutable</b>	Able to be refuted.
<b>refutation</b>	The speech act of answering an attack on your assertions. <i>His <b>refutation</b> of the charges was short and persuasive.</i>
<b>refute</b>	Prove that (someone) is wrong. <i>These claims have not been convincingly <b>refuted</b>.</i>
<b>reject</b>	Reject with contempt. <i>Some of the team s <b>rejects</b> have gone on to prove themselves in championships.</i>
<b>rejection</b>	The dismissing or refusing of a proposal, idea, etc. <i>The <b>rejection</b> of the application for parole.</i>
<b>repudiate</b>	Refuse to accept; reject. <i>She <b>repudiated</b> the accusations.</i>

**repudiation** Refusal to fulfil or discharge an agreement, obligation, or debt.  
*Congressional **repudiation** of the treaty that the President had negotiated.*
