## Today as a Noun

### Definitions of "Today" as a noun

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “today” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *This present day.*

<b>now</b>	The momentary present. <i>It worked up to right <b>now</b>.</i>
<b>the here and now</b>	Queen of the Olympian gods in ancient Greek mythology; sister and wife of Zeus remembered for her jealousy of the many mortal women Zeus fell in love with; identified with Roman Juno.
<b>the present</b>	Something presented as a gift.
<b>the present day</b>	Something presented as a gift.
<b>the present time</b>	Something presented as a gift.
<b>this age</b>	A prolonged period of time.
<b>this day</b>	Time for Earth to make a complete rotation on its axis.
<b>this moment</b>	An indefinitely short time.
<b>this period</b>	A punctuation mark (.) placed at the end of a declarative sentence to indicate a full stop or after abbreviations.
<b>this time</b>	The fourth coordinate that is required (along with three spatial dimensions) to specify a physical event.

## Today as an Adverb

### Definitions of "Today" as an adverb

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), "today" as an adverb can have the following definitions:

- *In these times- Nancy Mitford.*
- *On or in the course of this present day.*
- *On this day as distinct from yesterday or tomorrow.*
- *In these times.*
- *At the present period of time; nowadays.*



## Synonyms of "Today" as an adverb (9 Words)

<b>before tomorrow</b>	Earlier in time; previously.
<b>currently</b>	At this time or period; now. <i>The EC is <b>currently</b> attempting greater economic integration.</i>
<b>in these times</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>in this day and age</b>	To or toward the inside of.
<b>just now</b>	Indicating exactness or preciseness.
<b>now</b>	In these times. <i>If we leave <b>now</b> we can be home by ten.</i>
<b>nowadays</b>	In these times- Nancy Mitford. <i>It is solely by their language that the upper classes <b>nowadays</b> are distinguished.</i>
<b>right now</b>	Immediately.
<b>this very day</b>	Precisely so.



## Usage Examples of "Today" as an adverb

- *He will appear in court today.*

- *Today almost every home has television.*



## Associations of "Today" (30 Words)

<b><u>afternoon</u></b>	In the afternoon every afternoon. <i>I ll be back at three in the <b>afternoon</b>.</i>
<b><u>belated</u></b>	After the expected or usual time; delayed. <i>A <b>belated</b> apology.</i>
<b><u>briefly</u></b>	Using few words; concisely. <i>As I <b>briefly</b> mentioned earlier.</i>
<b><u>contemporary</u></b>	A person of nearly the same age as another. <i><b>Contemporary</b> ceramics by leading potters.</i>
<b>current</b>	A flow of electricity which results from the ordered directional movement of electrically charged particles. <i>The <b>current</b> topic.</i>
<b>currently</b>	At this time or period; now. <i>The EC is <b>currently</b> attempting greater economic integration.</i>
<b>epoch</b>	A particular period of time in history or a person's life. <i>The Pliocene <b>epoch</b>.</i>



<b>existing</b>	Presently existing. <i>Depletion of the oxygen <b>existing</b> in the bloodstream.</i>
<b>freshly</b>	Very recently. <i>A <b>freshly</b> cleaned floor.</i>
<b>immediately</b>	Without delay or hesitation; with no time intervening. <i>She was sitting <b>immediately</b> behind me.</i>
<b>instantaneously</b>	Without any delay. <i>Now we can communicate <b>instantaneously</b> with the rest of the world.</i>
<a href="#"><u>instantly</u></a>	At once; immediately. <i>She fell asleep almost <b>instantly</b>.</i>
<b>lately</b>	In the recent past. <i>She hasn't been looking too well <b>lately</b>.</i>
<a href="#"><u>latest</u></a>	In the current fashion or style. <i>The <b>latest</b> news.</i>
<a href="#"><u>modern</u></a>	Belonging to the modern era since the Middle Ages. <i>Matisse's contribution to <b>modern</b> art.</i>
<b>newly</b>	Very recently. <i>A <b>newly</b> acquired hi fi system.</i>
<b>now</b>	In the historical present; at this point in the narration of a series of past events. <i>Run along <b>now</b>.</i>
<b>nowadays</b>	At the present time, in contrast with the past. <i>It is solely by their language that the upper classes <b>nowadays</b> are distinguished.</i>
<b>present</b>	Bring forward and present to the mind. <i>The verbs are all in the <b>present</b>.</i>
<b>presently</b>	In the near future. <i>He is <b>presently</b> our ambassador to the United Nations.</i>
<a href="#"><u>promptly</u></a>	Used to express surprise, and slight disapproval, when someone does something shortly after something else. <i>He did his homework <b>promptly</b>.</i>
<b>realized</b>	Successfully completed or brought to an end. <i>The joy of a <b>realized</b> ambition overcame him.</i>
<b>recent</b>	Approximately the last 10,000 years. <i>In <b>recent</b> months.</i>
<b>recently</b>	In the recent past. <i>He was in Paris <b>recently</b>.</i>

**shortly** In a curt, abrupt and discourteous manner.  
*The new database will **shortly** be available for consultation.*

**soon** Early.  
*Everyone will **soon** know the truth.*

**thereafter** From that time on.  
***Thereafter** she spent much of her life abroad.*

**timing** (in an internal combustion engine) the times when the valves open and close, and the time of the ignition spark, in relation to the movement of the piston in the cylinder.  
*One of the secrets of cricket is good **timing**.*

**tomorrow** On the day after today.  
***Tomorrow** s world.*

**yesterday** On the day before today.  
*He returned to a hero s welcome **yesterday**.*
