- accord** Sympathetic compatibility.
*The government and the rebels are in **accord** on one point.*
- affinity** The degree to which a substance tends to combine with another.
*The bacterial proteins bind to these molecules with high **affinity**.*
- agreement** Harmony or accordance in opinion or feeling.
*A trade **agreement**.*
- association** (chemistry) any process of combination (especially in solution) that depends on relatively weak chemical bonding.
*There s nothing new in the **association** of fasting with spirituality.*
- closeness** The quality of being only a short distance away or apart in space or time.
*The geographical **closeness** of our two countries.*
- communication** The imparting or exchanging of information by speaking, writing, or using some other medium.
*Television is an effective means of **communication**.*

community	A group of people having a religion, ethnic, profession, or other particular characteristic in common. Community health services.
concord	Town in eastern Massachusetts near Boston where the first battle of the American Revolution was fought. A concord was to be drawn up.
connection	(usually plural) a person who is influential and to whom you are connected in some way (as by family or friendship). The plane was late and he missed his connection in Atlanta.
empathy	The ability to understand and share the feelings of another.
fellow feeling	A boy or man.
fellowship	Money granted (by a university or foundation or other agency) for advanced study or research. A fellowship in mathematics.
friendship	The emotions or conduct of friends; the state of being friends. Old ties of love and friendship .
harmony	An arrangement of the four Gospels, or of any parallel narratives, which presents a single continuous narrative text. The piece owes its air of tranquillity largely to the harmony .
kinship	Relatedness or connection by blood or marriage or adoption. Felt a deep kinship with the other students.
rapport	A relationship of mutual understanding or trust and agreement between people. She had an instant rapport with animals.
sharing	Sharing thoughts and feelings. The sharing of electrons creates molecules.
sympathy	Sharing the feelings of others (especially feelings of sorrow or anguish). Repairs had to be in sympathy with the original structure.
understanding	The ability to understand something; comprehension. He and I have an understanding .
unity	Each of the three dramatic principles requiring limitation of the supposed time of a drama to that occupied in acting it or to a single day unity of time use of one scene throughout unity of place and concentration on the development of a single plot unity of action. Ways of preserving family unity .

ally	Become an ally or associate as by a treaty or marriage. <i>He was forced to dismiss his closest political ally.</i>
amalgamate	Alloy (a metal) with mercury. <i>The amalgamated colleges constituted a university.</i>
bilateral	Having two sides or parts. <i>The bilateral agreements with Japan.</i>
coalesced	Joined together into a whole.
collaborate	Cooperate traitorously with an enemy. <i>He collaborated with him on numerous hotel projects.</i>
collaborative	Accomplished by collaboration. <i>Collaborative research.</i>
combine	Combine so as to form a whole mix. <i>One of the world s biggest food and personal products combines.</i>

<u>communal</u>	Involving the sharing of work and property. <i>A communal settlement in which all earnings and food were shared.</i>
concerted	Done with great effort or determination. <i>Concerted secular music for voices.</i>
concurrent	(of three or more lines) meeting at or tending towards one point. <i>There are three concurrent art fairs around the city.</i>
cooperation	The formation and operation of cooperatives. <i>Their cooperation with us was essential for the success of our mission.</i>
<u>cooperative</u>	Involving mutual assistance in working towards a common goal. <i>We run the agency as a workers cooperative.</i>
coordinated	Being dexterous in the use of more than one set of muscle movements- Mary McCarthy. <i>Curtains and walls were color coordinated.</i>
federate	Relating to a federated state or organization. <i>The country was federated after the civil war.</i>
<u>friendship</u>	A state of mutual trust and support between allied nations. <i>Because of the friendship between our countries we had a very frank exchange.</i>
hinge	A natural joint which performs a function similar to that of a man made hinge for example that of a bivalve shell. <i>The future of the industry could hinge on the outcome of next month s election.</i>
integrate	Become one become integrated. <i>Cities efforts to integrate.</i>
integrated	Formed or united into a whole. <i>A more closely integrated economic and political system.</i>
interconnect	Cause to be interconnected or interwoven. <i>The way human activities interconnect with the environment.</i>
join	Cause to become joined or linked. <i>I joined the demonstration.</i>
joint	Fit as if by joints. <i>Listen to one of his joints nowadays and you don t even need to see the production credit.</i>
multilateral	Having members or contributors from several groups, especially several different countries. <i>Multilateral nuclear disarmament.</i>
<u>mutual</u>	A mutual building society or insurance company. <i>The world s oldest mutual insurance company.</i>

- reciprocal** Something a term or expression or concept that has a reciprocal relation to something else.
***Reciprocal** privileges at other clubs.*
- sync** Make synchronous and adjust in time or manner.

- tripartite** Shared by or involving three parties.
*A **tripartite** treaty.*
- unified** Formed or united into a whole.
*A **unified** utility system.*
- unite** Be or become joined or united or linked.
