- *A word or object conferring authority on or serving to authenticate the speaker or holder.*
- *A metal or plastic disc used to operate a machine or in exchange for particular goods or services.*

- *The smallest meaningful unit of information in a sequence of data for a compiler.*
- *Something of sentimental value.*
- *An individual instance of a type of symbol.*
- *A voucher that can be exchanged for goods or services, typically one given as a gift or forming part of a promotional offer.*
- *Something serving as a sign of something else.*
- *A metal or plastic disk that can be redeemed or used in designated slot machines.*
- *A thing serving as a visible or tangible representation of a fact, quality, feeling, etc.*
- *A badge or favour worn to indicate allegiance to a particular person or party.*
- *A sequence of bits passed continuously between nodes in a fixed order and enabling a node to transmit information.*
- *A staff or other object given to a train driver on a single-track railway as authority to proceed over a given section of line.*
- *An individual occurrence of a linguistic unit in speech or writing.*
- *A member of a minority group included in an otherwise homogeneous set of people in order to give the appearance of diversity.*

badge

Any feature that is regarded as a sign of status (a particular power or quality or rank).

*They checked everyone's **badge** before letting them in.*

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| chip | A tiny wafer of semiconducting material used to make an integrated circuit a microchip. <i>Keep an eye out for any scratches or chips on the bodywork that might need treating.</i> |
| chit | A short official note, typically recording a sum owed. <i>She was incensed that this chit of a girl should dare to make a fool of her in front of the class.</i> |
| counter | A long flat-topped fitment across which business is conducted in a shop or bank or refreshments are served in a cafeteria. <i>The proposal has become a crucial bargaining counter over prices.</i> |
| coupon | A person's face. <i>The stock carries a 10 per cent coupon.</i> |
| credit note | Approval. |
| demonstration | A visual presentation showing how something works. <i>Acts of faith are not capable of mathematical demonstration.</i> |
| disc | An object or part resembling a disc in shape or appearance. <i>A man's body with an identity disc around the neck.</i> |
| docket | A document or label listing the contents of a consignment or package. <i>One new case on the docket from Florida.</i> |
| emblem | A visible symbol representing an abstract idea. <i>Our child would be a dazzling emblem of our love.</i> |
| expression | Expression without words. <i>The prisoners developed a dialect as an everyday means of expression.</i> |
| index | A numerical scale used to compare variables with one another or with some reference number. <i>Exam results may serve as an index of the teacher's effectiveness.</i> |
| indication | The act of indicating or pointing out by name. <i>The visit was an indication of the improvement in relations between the countries.</i> |
| iou | An informal debt instrument; representing 'I owe you.' |
| item | An individual article or unit, especially one that is part of a list, collection, or set. <i>He noticed an item in the New York Times.</i> |
| jetton | A counter or token used as a gambling chip or to operate slot machines. |
| keepsake | A small item kept in memory of the person who gave it or originally owned it. <i>She was wearing the medal he gave her as a keepsake.</i> |

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| man | An adult male person who has a manly character virile and courageous competent. <i>The army will make a man of you.</i> |
| manifestation | The action or fact of showing something. <i>A manifestation of great emotion.</i> |
| mark | A marking that consists of lines that cross each other. <i>The blow left a red mark down one side of her face.</i> |
| memento | An object kept as a reminder of a person or event. <i>You can purchase a memento of your visit.</i> |
| memorial | A written statement of facts submitted in conjunction with a petition to an authority. <i>A memorial to General Robert E Lee.</i> |
| order | The insignia worn by members of an order of honour or merit. <i>We shall consider these questions in the inverse order of their presentation.</i> |
| piece | An item forming part of a set. <i>He designed a new piece of equipment.</i> |
| pledge | A thing that is given as security for the fulfilment of a contract or the payment of a debt and is liable to forfeiture in the event of failure. <i>The conference ended with a joint pledge to limit pollution.</i> |
| recognition | Approval. <i>Territorial disputes were resolved in Guatemala s recognition of Belize in 1991.</i> |
| record | Anything such as a document or a phonograph record or a photograph providing permanent evidence of or information about past events. <i>You should keep a written record.</i> |
| relic | An antiquity that has survived from the distant past. <i>The supermodel has become an embarrassing relic from the early 1990s.</i> |
| remembrance | A memory or recollection. <i>They exchanged fond remembrances of his gentle ways.</i> |
| reminder | A thing that causes someone to remember something. <i>One man was threatened with court action for not paying his water rates when he did not receive a reminder.</i> |
| representation | A picture, model, or other depiction of someone or something. <i>A striking representation of a vase of flowers.</i> |

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| ribbon | A ribbon of a special colour or design awarded as a prize or worn to indicate the holding of an honour especially a small multicoloured piece of ribbon worn in place of the medal it represents. <i>In the Silk Cup trophy class Mullins stayed in the ribbons.</i> |
| rosette | A cluster of leaves growing in crowded circles from a common center or crown (usually at or close to the ground). <i>The showjumping rosettes Samantha had accumulated.</i> |
| sign | A gesture that is part of a sign language. <i>The integral sign.</i> |
| <u>souvenir</u> | A reminder of past events. <i>The recording provides a souvenir of a great production.</i> |
| stamp | An act or sound of stamping with the foot. <i>Even the least expensive movie bore the stamp of the studio's style.</i> |
| substitute coin | A person or thing that takes or can take the place of another. |
| <u>symbol</u> | A shape or sign used to represent something such as an organization, e.g. a red cross or a Star of David. <i>The eagle is a symbol of the United States.</i> |
| <u>trophy</u> | A souvenir of an achievement, especially a part of an animal taken when hunting. |
| voucher | Someone who vouches for another or for the correctness of a statement. |

- *Done for the sake of appearances or as a symbolic gesture.*
- *Insignificantly small; a matter of form only ('tokenish' is informal).*

emblematic

Serving as a visible symbol for something abstract.
*A crown is **emblematic** of royalty.*

hollow

As if echoing in a hollow space.
***Hollow** cheeks.*

imperceptible

Impossible or difficult to perceive by the mind or senses.
*An **imperceptible** drop in temperature.*

inappreciable

Too small to make a significant difference.
*They are few in number and those numbers are **inappreciable**.*

inconsequential

Not important or significant.
*They talked about **inconsequential** things.*

indicative

Denoting a mood of verbs expressing simple statement of a fact.
*Having recurrent dreams is not necessarily **indicative** of any psychological problem.*

infinitesimal

Infinitely or immeasurably small.
*An **infinitesimal** pause.*

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| <u>insignificant</u> | Too small or unimportant to be worth consideration. <i>An insignificant sum of money.</i> |
| <u>mild</u> | Mild and pleasant. <i>Mild flulike symptoms.</i> |
| <u>minimal</u> | Characterized by simplicity and lack of adornment or decoration. <i>Production costs are minimal.</i> |
| <u>minor</u> | Of a premise containing the minor term in a categorical syllogism. <i>Many of these hardy adventurers were minor noblemen.</i> |
| minute | Characterized by painstaking care and detailed examination. <i>An exact and minute report.</i> |
| nominal | Of, relating to, or characteristic of an amount that is not adjusted for inflation. <i>A nominal roll of the Grenadier Company shows a total of 86 men.</i> |
| not worth bothering about | Worthy of being treated in a particular way (often used ironically). |
| not worth mentioning | Worthy of being treated in a particular way (often used ironically). |
| nugatory | Useless or futile. <i>The teacher shortages will render nugatory the hopes of implementing the new curriculum.</i> |
| of no account | Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of. |
| of no consequence | Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of. |
| of no importance | Quantifier; used with either mass nouns or plural count nouns for indicating a complete or almost complete lack or zero quantity of. |
| <u>perfunctory</u> | (of an action) carried out without real interest, feeling, or effort. <i>Perfunctory courtesy.</i> |
| petty | Of secondary or lesser importance, rank, or scale; minor. <i>The petty divisions of party politics.</i> |

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| slight | Small in degree; inconsiderable. <i>There s slight chance that it will work.</i> |
| small | Have fine or very small constituent particles. <i>The room was small and quiet.</i> |
| <u>superficial</u> | Of little substance or significance. <i>The resemblance between the breeds is superficial.</i> |
| <u>symbolic</u> | Involving the use of symbols or symbolism. <i>Symbolic thinking.</i> |
| tiny | Very small. <i>Tiny feet.</i> |
| tokenish | Insignificantly small a matter of form only tokenish is informal. <i>A tokenish gesture.</i> |
| trifling | Not worth considering. <i>A trifling matter.</i> |
| <u>trivial</u> | Concerned with trivialities. <i>Trivial details.</i> |
| <u>unimportant</u> | Not important. <i>The question seems unimportant.</i> |



Usage Examples of "Token" as an adjective

- A *tokenish* gesture.
- Cases like these often bring just *token* fines from magistrates.
- The *patronizing* treatment of the *token* Middle Eastern character.
- A *token* gesture of resistance.

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| buck | Of a horse to perform a buck. <i>He s got to get his head down to buck.</i> |
| bus | Ride in a bus. <i>A bus service.</i> |
| cab | Ride in a taxicab. <i>She hailed a cab.</i> |
| charge | Cause formation of a net electrical charge in or on. <i>They charge the calls to their credit card accounts.</i> |
| cog | Join pieces of wood with cogs. <i>Applewood was the favourite material for the cogs or teeth of a cogwheel.</i> |
| coin | Money in the form of coins. <i>She opened her purse and took out a coin.</i> |

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| dollar | A piece of paper money worth one dollar. <i>He worships the almighty dollar.</i> |
| fare | The sum charged for riding in a public conveyance. <i>The party fares badly in the elections.</i> |
| few | A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by 'a'; a small but indefinite number. <i>It was designed for the discriminating few.</i> |
| gear | Design or adjust the gears in a machine to give a specified speed or power output. <i>A racing bike with ten speed gears.</i> |
| irreducible | Incapable of being made smaller or simpler. <i>Literature is often irreducible to normative ideas.</i> |
| keepsake | A small item kept in memory of the person who gave it or originally owned it. <i>She was wearing the medal he gave her as a keepsake.</i> |
| least | Used in names of very small animals and plants e.g. least shrew. <i>It is the least I can do.</i> |
| limit | A speed limit. <i>Mary Ann tried everyone's patience to the limit.</i> |
| little | Used in names of animals and plants that are smaller than related kinds e.g. little grebe. <i>A little hope remained.</i> |
| marginal | Relating to water adjacent to the land's edge or coast. <i>She is defending a key marginal for the Tories.</i> |
| memento | A reminder of past events. <i>You can purchase a memento of your visit.</i> |
| mini | Denoting a miniature version of something. <i>A mini dress.</i> |
| miniature | Painting or drawing included in a book (especially in illuminated medieval manuscripts). <i>Seven full size car bodies and three miniatures were used.</i> |
| minimal | The least possible. <i>P and b are a minimal pair distinguished by the feature of voicing.</i> |
| minimum | The least or smallest amount or quantity possible, attainable, or required. <i>They checked visas with the minimum of fuss.</i> |
| minor | Of an interval characteristic of a minor scale and less by a semitone than the equivalent major interval. <i>A minor share of the profits.</i> |

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| <u>paraphernalia</u> | Miscellaneous articles, especially the equipment needed for a particular activity. <i>The rituals and paraphernalia of government.</i> |
| reducible | Capable of being reduced- Edmund Wilson. <i>Shakespeare's major soliloquies are not reducible to categories.</i> |
| reductive | Tending to present a subject or problem in a simplified form, especially one viewed as crude. <i>The reductive elimination of acetyl iodide.</i> |
| <u>relic</u> | An object surviving from an earlier time, especially one of historical interest. <i>A museum of railway relics.</i> |
| <u>souvenir</u> | A reminder of past events. <i>The recording provides a souvenir of a great production.</i> |
| subnormal | (of a person) having learning difficulties or a developmental disorder. <i>Subnormal intelligence.</i> |
| taxi | Ride in a taxicab. <i>The plane taxied to a halt at the terminal.</i> |
| <u>ticket</u> | Of a passenger be issued with a travel ticket. <i>Park illegally and you are likely to be ticketed.</i> |
