## Associations of "Told" (30 Words)

<b>aforementioned</b>	Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of. <i>Works of all the <b>aforementioned</b> authors.</i>
<b>aforesaid</b>	Being the one previously mentioned or spoken of.
<b>announce</b>	Announce publicly or officially. <i>The President s office <b>announced</b> that the siege would be lifted.</i>
<b>articulate</b>	Having or showing the ability to speak fluently and coherently. <i>They were unable to <b>articulate</b> their emotions.</i>
<b><a href="#">aver</a></b>	To declare or affirm solemnly and formally as true. <i>The defendant does not <b>aver</b> any performance by himself.</i>
<b>describe</b>	Give a description of. <i>He <b>described</b> his experiences in a letter to his parents.</i>
<b>enunciate</b>	Express (a proposition, theory, etc.) in clear or definite terms. <i>She <b>enunciated</b> each word slowly.</i>
<b><a href="#">expansive</a></b>	Of behavior that is impressive and ambitious in scale or scope. <i>He was in an <b>expansive</b> mood.</i>
<b>explain</b>	Define. <i>The committee <b>explained</b> their plan for fund raising to the Dean.</i>
<b>expository</b>	Serving to expound or set forth. <i>An <b>expository</b> prologue.</i>
<b>expound</b>	Add details, as to an account or idea; clarify the meaning of and discourse in a learned way, usually in writing. <i>The abbess <b>expounded</b> the scriptures to her nuns.</i>
<b>inform</b>	Give incriminating information about someone to the police or other authority. <i>The principles that <b>inform</b> modern teaching.</i>
<b>informing</b>	To furnish incriminating evidence to an officer of the law (usually in return for favors.

<b><u>narrate</u></b>	Narrate or give a detailed account of. <i>The series is <b>narrated</b> by Richard Baker.</i>
<b>notification</b>	Informing by words. <i>We have yet to receive formal <b>notification</b> of the announcement.</i>
<b>pronouncement</b>	An authoritative declaration. <i>Distrust of the <b>pronouncements</b> of politicians was endemic.</i>
<b><u>quote</u></b>	A passage or expression that is quoted or cited. <i><b>Quotes</b> for North Sea Brent were rising.</i>
<b><u>recite</u></b>	Recite in elocution. <i>She <b>recited</b> the dates and names of kings and queens.</i>
<b><u>recount</u></b>	Tell someone about something; give an account of an event or experience. <i>He <b>recounts</b> how they often talked of politics.</i>
<b>remark</b>	Say something as a comment; mention. <i>He <b>remarked</b> that he had some work to finish.</i>
<b>remind</b>	Assist (somebody acting or reciting) by suggesting the next words of something forgotten or imperfectly learned. <i>His impassive fierce stare <b>reminded</b> her of an owl.</i>
<b>report</b>	Be responsible for reporting the details of as in journalism. <i>Whatever things are lovely and of good <b>report</b>.</i>
<b>reportedly</b>	According to reports or other information. <i>He was in El Salvador <b>reportedly</b> on his way to Texas.</i>
<b>saying</b>	A short, pithy, commonly known expression which generally offers advice or wisdom. <i>This is stated in the <b>sayings</b> of the Prophet.</i>
<b>snitch</b>	Steal. <i>She was <b>snitching</b> a look out of the window.</i>
<b><u>soliloquy</u></b>	A part of a play involving a soliloquy. <i>In the opening <b>soliloquy</b> he declares his true intent.</i>
<b>speak</b>	Utter (a word, message, etc). <i>They <b>speak</b> a strange dialect.</i>
<b>talk</b>	Exchange thoughts talk with. <i>There is <b>talk</b> of an armistice.</i>
<b><u>utter</u></b>	Express audibly utter sounds not necessarily words. <i><b>Utter</b> seriousness.</i>
<b><u>verbalize</u></b>	Speak, especially at length and with little real content. <i>This depressed patient does not <b>verbalize</b>.</i>
