- *Able to be endured.*



## Synonyms of "Tolerable" as an adjective (18 Words)

<b>acceptable</b>	Able to be tolerated or allowed. <i>Performances varied from <b>acceptable</b> to excellent.</i>
<b>adequate</b>	Having the requisite qualities or resources to meet a task. <i>She was <b>adequate</b> to the job.</i>
<b>all right</b>	Quantifier; used with either mass or count nouns to indicate the whole number or amount of or every one of a class.
<b>average</b>	Relating to or constituting the middle value of an ordered set of values or the average of the middle two in a set with an even number of values. <i>A novel of <b>average</b> merit.</i>
<b><u>bearable</u></b>	Able to be endured. <i>Things to make life in the tropics more <b>bearable</b>.</i>

<b><u>decent</u></b>	Decently clothed. <i>There s a few <b>decent</b> players in the team.</i>
<b>endurable</b>	Able to be endured; bearable. <i>My journey was long but <b>endurable</b>.</i>
<b>fair</b>	Free from favoritism or self-interest or bias or deception; conforming with established standards or rules. <i>By <b>fair</b> means or foul.</i>
<b>fair to middling</b>	Attractively feminine.
<b>good enough</b>	Appealing to the mind.
<b>not bad</b>	Physically unsound or diseased.
<b>passable</b>	Just good enough to be acceptable; satisfactory. <i>The road was <b>passable</b> with care.</i>
<b><u>presentable</u></b>	Fit to be seen. <i>I did my best to make myself look <b>presentable</b>.</i>
<b><u>respectable</u></b>	Deserving of esteem and respect. <i>All <b>respectable</b> companies give guarantees.</i>
<b><u>satisfactory</u></b>	Meeting requirements. <i><b>Satisfactory</b> living conditions.</i>
<b>sufferable</b>	Capable of being borne though unpleasant. <i><b>Sufferable</b> punishment.</i>
<b><u>sufficient</u></b>	Of a quantity that can fulfill a need or requirement but without being abundant. <i><b>Sufficient</b> food.</i>
<b>supportable</b>	Capable of being borne though unpleasant.



## Usage Examples of "Tolerable" as an adjective

- *A stimulant to make life more tolerable.*
- *The climate is at least tolerable.*
- *He was fond of music and had a tolerable voice.*



## Associations of "Tolerable" (30 Words)

<b>acceptable</b>	Moderately good; satisfactory. <i>Some coffee would be most <b>acceptable</b>.</i>
<b>adequate</b>	Having the requisite qualities or resources to meet a task. <i>The food was <b>adequate</b>.</i>
<b>allow</b>	Allow or plan for a certain possibility concede the truth or validity of something. <i>This short story <b>allows</b> of several different interpretations.</i>
<b><u>alright</u></b>	In a satisfactory or adequate manner alright is a nonstandard variant of all right.
<b><u>bear</u></b>	Be called by (a name or title). <i>She is <b>bearing</b> his child.</i>
<b><u>bearable</u></b>	Able to be endured. <i>Things to make life in the tropics more <b>bearable</b>.</i>

<b>defiant</b>	Showing defiance. A <b>defiant</b> attitude.
<b>endurable</b>	Able to be endured; bearable. My journey was long but <b>endurable</b> .
<b>endure</b>	Persist for a specified period of time. These cities have <b>endured</b> through time.
<b>forbear</b>	Refrain from doing. Rebecca could not <b>forbear</b> a smile.
<b>forbearance</b>	A delay in enforcing rights or claims or privileges; refraining from acting. His unfailing courtesy and <b>forbearance</b> under great provocation.
<b>generous</b>	Not petty in character and mind. A <b>generous</b> helping of pasta.
<b>incombustible</b>	(especially of a building material or component) consisting or made of material that does not burn if exposed to fire. An <b>incombustible</b> floor construction.
<b>largesse</b>	Money or gifts given generously. The distribution of <b>largesse</b> to the local population.
<b>leniency</b>	Lightening a penalty or excusing from a chore by judges or parents or teachers. The court could show <b>leniency</b> .
<b>nonflammable</b>	Impossible to ignite.
<b>okay</b>	In a satisfactory or adequate manner; ('alright' is a nonstandard variant of 'all right'). She'll do <b>okay</b> on her own.
<b>passable</b>	(of a route or road) clear of obstacles and able to be travelled on. The road was <b>passable</b> with care.
<b>patience</b>	Any of various forms of card game for one player, the object of which is to use up all one's cards by forming particular arrangements and sequences. I have run out of <b>patience</b> with her.
<b>patient</b>	Able to accept or tolerate delays, problems, or suffering without becoming annoyed or anxious. A <b>patient</b> smile.
<b>penicillin</b>	A blue mould of a type that produces penicillin. <b>Penicillins</b> and <b>cephalosporins</b> .
<b>permissible</b>	That may be permitted especially as according to rule. <b>Permissible</b> behavior in school.

<b><u>resistant</u></b>	Able to tolerate environmental conditions or physiological stress. <i>Plastic highly <b>resistant</b> to steam and water.</i>
<b><u>satisfactory</u></b>	Giving satisfaction. <i>The step makes a <b>satisfactory</b> seat.</i>
<b>stand</b>	Be standing be upright. <i>Small stable boats that could <b>stand</b> the punishment of heavy seas.</i>
<b>sufferance</b>	A disposition to tolerate or accept people or situations. <i>Charles was only here on <b>sufferance</b>.</i>
<b>tolerance</b>	A disposition to allow freedom of choice and behavior. <i>The body s <b>tolerance</b> to Ecstasy builds up very quickly.</i>
<b>toleration</b>	The practice of tolerating something, in particular differences of opinion or behaviour. <i>All people should practice <b>toleration</b> and live together in peace.</i>
<b>unobjectionable</b>	Not objectionable; acceptable. <i>The bail conditions were <b>unobjectionable</b> as far as he was concerned.</i>
<b><u>yes</u></b>	An affirmative. <i>I was hoping for a <b>yes</b>.</i>
