<b>bell</b>	A percussion instrument consisting of a set of tuned bells that are struck with a hammer used as an orchestral instrument. <i>The church <b>bells</b> tolled.</i>
<b>charge</b>	The price charged for some article or service. <i>The judge s <b>charge</b> to the jury.</i>
<b>cost</b>	The total spent for goods or services including money and time and labor. <i>The <b>cost</b> in human life was enormous.</i>
<b>count</b>	The total number counted. <i>A blood <b>count</b>.</i>

<b>damage</b>	The occurrence of a change for the worse. <i>She was awarded 284 000 in <b>damages</b>.</i>
<b><u>detriment</u></b>	A cause of harm or damage. <i>He is engrossed in his work to the <b>detriment</b> of his married life.</i>
<b><u>directory</u></b>	A book or website listing individuals or organizations alphabetically or thematically with details such as names, addresses, and phone numbers.
<b>dues</b>	That which is deserved or owed.
<b>duty</b>	The social force that binds you to the courses of action demanded by that force. <i>A strong sense of <b>duty</b>.</i>
<b>enumeration</b>	The action of establishing the number of something. <i>Detailed <b>enumeration</b> of the income of the household.</i>
<b>fee</b>	An interest in land capable of being inherited. <i>An annual membership <b>fee</b>.</i>
<b>grand total</b>	The cardinal number that is the product of 10 and 100.
<b><u>harm</u></b>	Material damage. <i>I can't see any <b>harm</b> in it.</i>
<b>hurt</b>	The act of damaging something or someone. <i>Rolling properly into a fall minimizes <b>hurt</b>.</i>
<b>impost</b>	A tax or similar compulsory payment. <i>Some of the labels are used for the purpose of collecting Customs duty or other <b>imposts</b>.</i>
<b><u>index</u></b>	A pointer on an instrument, showing a quantity, a position on a scale, etc. <i>The oral hygiene <b>index</b> was calculated as the sum of the debris and calculus indices.</i>
<b>injury</b>	Wrongdoing that violates another's rights and is unjustly inflicted. <i>She suffered an <b>injury</b> to her back.</i>
<b>inventory</b>	The value of a firm's current assets including raw materials and work in progress and finished goods. <i>An <b>inventory</b> may be necessary to see if anything is missing.</i>
<b>levy</b>	A tax raised by levying. <i>We all pay a fossil fuel <b>levy</b> in our electricity bills.</i>
<b>list</b>	A formal structure analogous to a list by which items of data can be stored or processed in a definite order. <i>The ship developed a <b>list</b> to starboard.</i>

<b>listing</b>	The act of making a list of items.
<b><u>number</u></b>	A numbered item in a series. <i>The exhibition attracted vast <b>numbers</b> of visitors.</i>
<b>payment</b>	Something given as a reward or in recompense for something done. <i>Three interest free monthly <b>payments</b>.</i>
<b>price</b>	The amount of money needed to purchase something. <i>Land could be sold for a high <b>price</b>.</i>
<b>reckoning</b>	A person's opinion or judgement. <i>The fear of being brought to <b>reckoning</b>.</i>
<b>record</b>	Anything such as a document or a phonograph record or a photograph providing permanent evidence of or information about past events. <i>He tied the Olympic <b>record</b>.</i>
<b><u>register</u></b>	A cashbox with an adding machine to register transactions used in shops to add up the bill. <i>The central <b>register</b> shows a Roman Emperor on horseback.</i>
<b>roll</b>	A document typically an official record historically kept in scroll form. <i>The school had no one by his name on its <b>roll</b>.</i>
<b><u>roster</u></b>	A list of members of a team or organization, in particular of sports players available for team selection. <i>Next week s duty <b>roster</b>.</i>
<b>running total</b>	The act of running; traveling on foot at a fast pace.
<b>score</b>	An act of gaining a goal or point in a game. <i>What s wrong Simon What s the <b>score</b>.</i>
<b><u>sum</u></b>	A quantity obtained by the addition of a group of numbers. <i>They could not afford such a <b>sum</b>.</i>
<b>sum total</b>	The choicest or most essential or most vital part of some idea or experience.
<b><u>tally</u></b>	An account kept by means of a tally. <i>I kept a <b>tally</b> of David s debt on a note above my desk.</i>
<b>tariff</b>	A list of import or export tariffs. <i>The reduction of trade barriers and import <b>tariffs</b>.</i>
<b><u>tax</u></b>	A compulsory contribution to state revenue, levied by the government on workers' income and business profits, or added to the cost of some goods, services, and transactions. <i>A <b>tax</b> bill.</i>

<b>bridge</b>	Be or make a bridge over something. <i>Ebony <b>bridges</b> and fingerboards.</i>
<b>bypass</b>	An alternative channel created during a bypass operation. <i>You cannot <b>bypass</b> these rules.</i>
<b>charge</b>	Cause formation of a net electrical charge in or on. <i>This cartridge has a powder <b>charge</b> of 50 grains.</i>
<b>cost</b>	Legal expenses, especially those allowed in favour of the winning party or against the losing party in a suit. <i>We are able to cover the <b>cost</b> of the event.</i>
<b>crosscut</b>	Cut using a diagonal line.
<b>dam</b>	Build a dam across a river or lake. <i>Discussion was in full flow and refused to be <b>dammed</b>.</i>
<b>door</b>	A doorway. <i>He stuck his head in the <b>doorway</b>.</i>
<b>driving</b>	Having the power of driving or impelling. <i>He was the <b>driving</b> force behind the plan.</i>
<b>embankment</b>	A long artificial mound of stone or earth; built to hold back water or to support a road or as protection. <i>A railway <b>embankment</b>.</i>
<b>entrance</b>	The right, means, or opportunity to enter somewhere or be a member of an institution, society, or other body. <i>The <b>entrance</b> to a tunnel.</i>
<b>expressway</b>	A broad highway designed for high-speed traffic.
<b>fare</b>	A passenger paying to travel in a taxi. <i>Traditional Scottish <b>fare</b>.</i>
<b>floodgate</b>	Regulator consisting of a valve or gate that controls the rate of water flow through a sluice. <i>Suspension of surveillance opened the <b>floodgates</b> to illegal immigrants.</i>
<b>gate</b>	A gateway. <i>A logic <b>gate</b>.</i>
<b>highway</b>	(chiefly in official use) a public road. <i>An information <b>highway</b>.</i>
<b>lane</b>	A well-defined track or path; for e.g. swimmers or lines of traffic. <i>A bus <b>lane</b>.</i>
<b>lintel</b>	Horizontal beam used as a finishing piece over a door or window.

<b>overpass</b>	Bridge formed by the upper level of a crossing of two highways at different levels. <i>Did not its sublimity <b>overpass</b> a little the bounds of the ridiculous.</i>
<b>penstock</b>	A sluice for controlling or directing the flow of water.
<b>price</b>	Attach price labels or tickets to an item for sale. <i>The cattle thief has a <b>price</b> on his head.</i>
<b>prohibitive</b>	Tending to discourage (especially of prices). <i>The price was <b>prohibitive</b>.</i>
<b>purchaser</b>	A person who buys something; a buyer. <i>One of the club's prospective <b>purchasers</b>.</i>
<b>reimbursement</b>	The action of repaying a person who has spent or lost money. <i><b>Reimbursement</b> of everyday medical costs.</i>
<b>road</b>	The part of a road intended for vehicles especially in contrast to a verge or pavement. <i>He had to work in a <b>road</b> about six feet wide.</i>
<b>route</b>	Send via a specific route. <i>All lines of communication were <b>routed</b> through London.</i>
<b>shut</b>	Move so that an opening or passage is obstructed make shut. <i>They ought to <b>shut</b> the path up to that terrible cliff.</i>
<b>skyway</b>	A designated route followed by airplanes in flying from one airport to another. <i>A second storey <b>skyway</b> links the two shops.</i>
<b>sluice</b>	Draw through a sluice. <i><b>Sluice</b> logs.</i>
<b>subscription</b>	An arrangement to receive something, typically a publication, regularly by paying in advance. <i>He signed the letter and added a <b>subscription</b>.</i>
<b>tollbooth</b>	A town jail.
