dues	That which is deserved or owed.
duty	The social force that binds you to the courses of action demanded by that force. <i>A strong sense of duty.</i>
enumeration	The action of establishing the number of something. <i>Detailed enumeration of the income of the household.</i>
fee	An interest in land capable of being inherited. <i>An annual membership fee.</i>
grand total	The cardinal number that is the product of 10 and 100.
<u>harm</u>	Material damage. <i>I can't see any harm in it.</i>
hurt	The act of damaging something or someone. <i>Rolling properly into a fall minimizes hurt.</i>
impost	A tax or similar compulsory payment. <i>Some of the labels are used for the purpose of collecting Customs duty or other imposts.</i>
<u>index</u>	A pointer on an instrument, showing a quantity, a position on a scale, etc. <i>The oral hygiene index was calculated as the sum of the debris and calculus indices.</i>
injury	Wrongdoing that violates another's rights and is unjustly inflicted. <i>She suffered an injury to her back.</i>
inventory	The value of a firm's current assets including raw materials and work in progress and finished goods. <i>An inventory may be necessary to see if anything is missing.</i>
levy	A tax raised by levying. <i>We all pay a fossil fuel levy in our electricity bills.</i>
list	A formal structure analogous to a list by which items of data can be stored or processed in a definite order. <i>The ship developed a list to starboard.</i>

listing	The act of making a list of items.
<u>number</u>	A numbered item in a series. <i>The exhibition attracted vast numbers of visitors.</i>
payment	Something given as a reward or in recompense for something done. <i>Three interest free monthly payments.</i>
price	The amount of money needed to purchase something. <i>Land could be sold for a high price.</i>
reckoning	A person's opinion or judgement. <i>The fear of being brought to reckoning.</i>
record	Anything such as a document or a phonograph record or a photograph providing permanent evidence of or information about past events. <i>He tied the Olympic record.</i>
<u>register</u>	A cashbox with an adding machine to register transactions used in shops to add up the bill. <i>The central register shows a Roman Emperor on horseback.</i>
roll	A document typically an official record historically kept in scroll form. <i>The school had no one by his name on its roll.</i>
<u>roster</u>	A list of members of a team or organization, in particular of sports players available for team selection. <i>Next week s duty roster.</i>
running total	The act of running; traveling on foot at a fast pace.
score	An act of gaining a goal or point in a game. <i>What s wrong Simon What s the score.</i>
<u>sum</u>	A quantity obtained by the addition of a group of numbers. <i>They could not afford such a sum.</i>
sum total	The choicest or most essential or most vital part of some idea or experience.
<u>tally</u>	An account kept by means of a tally. <i>I kept a tally of David s debt on a note above my desk.</i>
tariff	A list of import or export tariffs. <i>The reduction of trade barriers and import tariffs.</i>
<u>tax</u>	A compulsory contribution to state revenue, levied by the government on workers' income and business profits, or added to the cost of some goods, services, and transactions. <i>A tax bill.</i>

bridge	Be or make a bridge over something. <i>Ebony bridges and fingerboards.</i>
bypass	An alternative channel created during a bypass operation. <i>You cannot bypass these rules.</i>
charge	Cause formation of a net electrical charge in or on. <i>This cartridge has a powder charge of 50 grains.</i>
cost	Legal expenses, especially those allowed in favour of the winning party or against the losing party in a suit. <i>We are able to cover the cost of the event.</i>
crosscut	Cut using a diagonal line.
dam	Build a dam across a river or lake. <i>Discussion was in full flow and refused to be dammed.</i>
door	A doorway. <i>He stuck his head in the doorway.</i>
driving	Having the power of driving or impelling. <i>He was the driving force behind the plan.</i>
embankment	A long artificial mound of stone or earth; built to hold back water or to support a road or as protection. <i>A railway embankment.</i>
entrance	The right, means, or opportunity to enter somewhere or be a member of an institution, society, or other body. <i>The entrance to a tunnel.</i>
expressway	A broad highway designed for high-speed traffic.
fare	A passenger paying to travel in a taxi. <i>Traditional Scottish fare.</i>
floodgate	Regulator consisting of a valve or gate that controls the rate of water flow through a sluice. <i>Suspension of surveillance opened the floodgates to illegal immigrants.</i>
gate	A gateway. <i>A logic gate.</i>
highway	(chiefly in official use) a public road. <i>An information highway.</i>
lane	A well-defined track or path; for e.g. swimmers or lines of traffic. <i>A bus lane.</i>
lintel	Horizontal beam used as a finishing piece over a door or window.

overpass	Bridge formed by the upper level of a crossing of two highways at different levels. <i>Did not its sublimity overpass a little the bounds of the ridiculous.</i>
penstock	A sluice for controlling or directing the flow of water.
price	Attach price labels or tickets to an item for sale. <i>The cattle thief has a price on his head.</i>
prohibitive	Tending to discourage (especially of prices). <i>The price was prohibitive.</i>
purchaser	A person who buys something; a buyer. <i>One of the club's prospective purchasers.</i>
reimbursement	The action of repaying a person who has spent or lost money. <i>Reimbursement of everyday medical costs.</i>
road	The part of a road intended for vehicles especially in contrast to a verge or pavement. <i>He had to work in a road about six feet wide.</i>
route	Send via a specific route. <i>All lines of communication were routed through London.</i>
shut	Move so that an opening or passage is obstructed make shut. <i>They ought to shut the path up to that terrible cliff.</i>
skyway	A designated route followed by airplanes in flying from one airport to another. <i>A second storey skyway links the two shops.</i>
sluice	Draw through a sluice. <i>Sluice logs.</i>
subscription	An arrangement to receive something, typically a publication, regularly by paying in advance. <i>He signed the letter and added a subscription.</i>
tollbooth	A town jail.
