Definitions of "Tome" as a noun

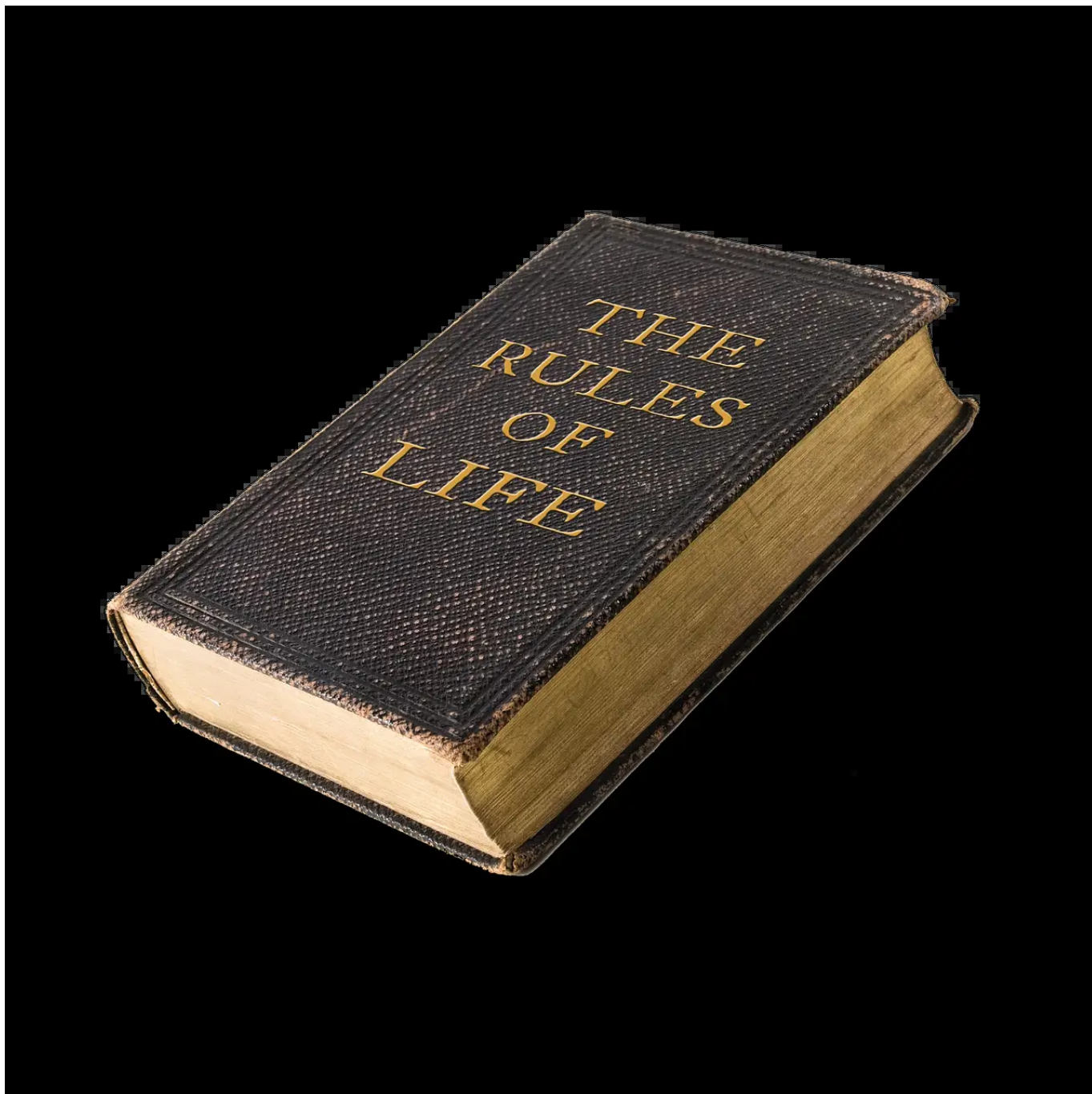
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “tome” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A book, especially a large, heavy, scholarly one.*
- *A (usually) large and scholarly book.*



Synonyms of "Tome" as a noun (7 Words)

<u>book</u>	A literary composition that is published or intended for publication as a book. <i>I am reading a good book on economics.</i>
opus	A musical work that has been created. <i>He was writing an opus on Mexico.</i>
<u>publication</u>	The action of making something generally known. <i>Scientific publications.</i>
<u>title</u>	An established or recognized right. <i>He looked for books with the word jazz in the title.</i>
<u>volume</u>	A single book or a bound collection of printed sheets. <i>A botanical library of 5 000 volumes.</i>
work	A place where work is done. <i>A lot of people are out of work.</i>
writing	The activity or skill of writing. <i>The idea occurs with increasing frequency in Hemingway s writings.</i>

adaptation

The action or process of adapting or being adapted.

*Living in groups is an **adaptation** to increase the efficiency of hunting.*

allegory

A symbol.

*Pilgrim s Progress is an **allegory** of the spiritual journey.*

anecdotal

Characterized by or given to telling anecdotes.

*Nineteenth century French **anecdotal** paintings.*

big

On an ambitiously large scale.

*A **big** tennis fan.*

bulky

(of a person) heavily built.

*A **bulky** overcoat clad figure.*

cumbersome

Slow or complicated and therefore inefficient.

*His **cumbersome** writing style.*

description	A type or class of people or things. <i>It is laughably easy to buy drugs of all descriptions.</i>
editorial	Relating to the commissioning or preparing of material for publication. <i>The editorial team.</i>
elephantine	Of great mass; huge and bulky. <i>There was an elephantine thud from the bathroom.</i>
<u>entourage</u>	A group of people attending or surrounding an important person. <i>An entourage of loyal courtiers.</i>
giant	Used in names of very large animals and plants e g giant hogweed giant tortoise. <i>Giant multinational corporations.</i>
<u>hefty</u>	(of a person) possessing physical strength and weight; rugged and powerful. <i>A hefty dictionary.</i>
hulking	Of great size and bulk. <i>A hulking young man.</i>
illustrious	Having or conferring glory. <i>An illustrious career.</i>
immense	Extremely large or great, especially in scale or degree. <i>At vast or immense expense.</i>
large	A garment size for a large person. <i>We can afford to take a larger view of the situation.</i>
mammoth	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A mammoth ship.</i>
massive	A group of young people from a particular area with a common interest in dance music. <i>Moore s massive sculptures.</i>
<u>narration</u>	(rhetoric) the second section of an oration in which the facts are set forth. <i>The style of narration in the novel.</i>
oversized	Larger than normal for its kind. <i>An oversized T shirt.</i>
<u>overwhelming</u>	Very intense. <i>His party won overwhelming support.</i>
page	A page of a newspaper or magazine set aside for a particular topic. <i>A text file reader enables you to page through the authors text file using indexes.</i>

reportedly	According to what some say (used to express the speaker's belief that the information given is not necessarily true. <i>He was in El Salvador reportedly on his way to Texas.</i>
sizable	Large in amount or extent or degree. <i>A sizable fortune.</i>
swathe	A row or line of grass, corn, or other crop as it falls or lies when mown or reaped. <i>The combine had cut a deep swathe around the border of the fields.</i>
titanic	Of great force or power. <i>A series of titanic explosions.</i>
tremendous	Very great in amount, scale, or intensity. <i>There was a tremendous explosion.</i>
unwieldy	Difficult to use or handle or manage because of size or weight or shape. <i>Huge unwieldy arc lamps.</i>
vast	An immense space. <i>The vast reaches of outer space.</i>
voluminous	Large in volume or bulk. <i>A voluminous purple cloak.</i>
