### **Definitions of "Tome" as a noun**

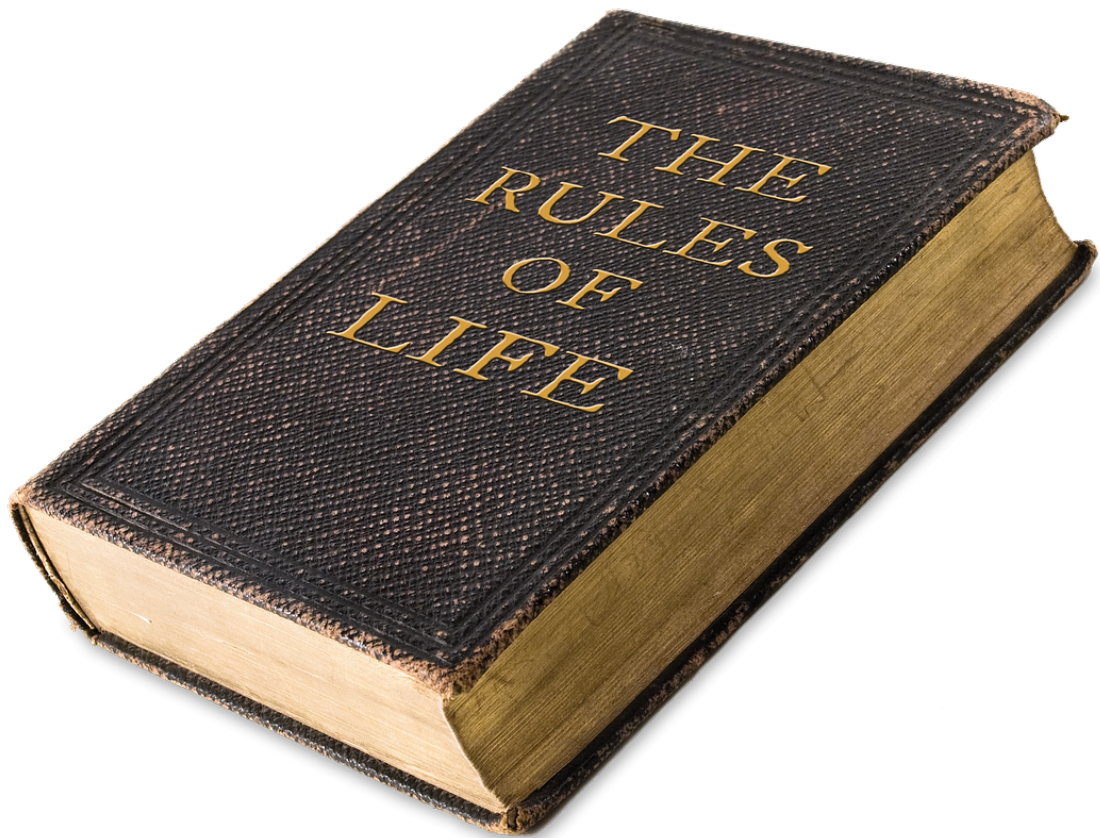
According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “tome” as a noun can have the following definitions:

- *A (usually) large and scholarly book.*



## Synonyms of "Tome" as a noun (7 Words)

<b><u>book</u></b>	A literary composition that is published or intended for publication as a book. <i>I am reading a good <b>book</b> on economics.</i>
<b>opus</b>	A musical work that has been created. <i>He was writing an <b>opus</b> on Mexico.</i>
<b><u>publication</u></b>	The action of making something generally known. <i>Scientific <b>publications</b>.</i>
<b><u>title</u></b>	An established or recognized right. <i>He looked for books with the word jazz in the <b>title</b>.</i>
<b><u>volume</u></b>	A single book or a bound collection of printed sheets. <i>A botanical library of 5 000 <b>volumes</b>.</i>
<b>work</b>	A place where work is done. <i>A lot of people are out of <b>work</b>.</i>
<b>writing</b>	The activity or skill of writing. <i>The idea occurs with increasing frequency in Hemingway s <b>writings</b>.</i>

## Associations of "Tome" (30 Words)

<b><u>adaptation</u></b>	The action or process of adapting or being adapted. <i>Living in groups is an <b>adaptation</b> to increase the efficiency of hunting.</i>
<b><u>allegory</u></b>	A symbol. <i>Pilgrim s Progress is an <b>allegory</b> of the spiritual journey.</i>
<b><u>anecdotal</u></b>	Characterized by or given to telling anecdotes. <i>Nineteenth century French <b>anecdotal</b> paintings.</i>
<b>big</b>	On an ambitiously large scale. <i>A <b>big</b> tennis fan.</i>
<b>bulky</b>	(of a person) heavily built. <i>A <b>bulky</b> overcoat clad figure.</i>
<b>cumbersome</b>	Slow or complicated and therefore inefficient. <i>His <b>cumbersome</b> writing style.</i>

<b>description</b>	A type or class of people or things. <i>It is laughably easy to buy drugs of all <b>descriptions</b>.</i>
<b>editorial</b>	Relating to the commissioning or preparing of material for publication. <i>The <b>editorial</b> team.</i>
<b>elephantine</b>	Of great mass; huge and bulky. <i>There was an <b>elephantine</b> thud from the bathroom.</i>
<b><u>entourage</u></b>	A group of people attending or surrounding an important person. <i>An <b>entourage</b> of loyal courtiers.</i>
<b>giant</b>	Used in names of very large animals and plants e.g. giant hogweed, giant tortoise. <i><b>Giant</b> multinational corporations.</i>
<b><u>hefty</u></b>	(of a person) possessing physical strength and weight; rugged and powerful. <i>A <b>hefty</b> dictionary.</i>
<b>hulking</b>	Of great size and bulk. <i>A <b>hulking</b> young man.</i>
<b>illustrious</b>	Having or conferring glory. <i>An <b>illustrious</b> career.</i>
<b>immense</b>	Extremely large or great, especially in scale or degree. <i>At vast or <b>immense</b> expense.</i>
<b>large</b>	A garment size for a large person. <i>We can afford to take a <b>larger</b> view of the situation.</i>
<b>mammoth</b>	So exceedingly large or extensive as to suggest a giant or mammoth. <i>A <b>mammoth</b> ship.</i>
<b>massive</b>	A group of young people from a particular area with a common interest in dance music. <i>Moore's <b>massive</b> sculptures.</i>
<b><u>narration</u></b>	(rhetoric) the second section of an oration in which the facts are set forth. <i>The style of <b>narration</b> in the novel.</i>
<b>oversized</b>	Larger than normal for its kind. <i>An <b>oversized</b> T shirt.</i>
<b><u>overwhelming</u></b>	Very intense. <i>His party won <b>overwhelming</b> support.</i>
<b>page</b>	A page of a newspaper or magazine set aside for a particular topic. <i>A text file reader enables you to <b>page</b> through the author's text file using indexes.</i>

<b>reportedly</b>	According to what some say (used to express the speaker's belief that the information given is not necessarily true. <i>He was in El Salvador <b>reportedly</b> on his way to Texas.</i>
<b>sizable</b>	Large in amount or extent or degree. <i>A <b>sizable</b> fortune.</i>
<b>swathe</b>	A row or line of grass, corn, or other crop as it falls or lies when mown or reaped. <i>The combine had cut a deep <b>swathe</b> around the border of the fields.</i>
<b>titanic</b>	Of great force or power. <i>A series of <b>titanic</b> explosions.</i>
<b>tremendous</b>	Very great in amount, scale, or intensity. <i>There was a <b>tremendous</b> explosion.</i>
<b>unwieldy</b>	Difficult to use or handle or manage because of size or weight or shape. <i>Huge <b>unwieldy</b> arc lamps.</i>
<b>vast</b>	An immense space. <i>The <b>vast</b> reaches of outer space.</i>
<b>voluminous</b>	Large in volume or bulk. <i>A <b>voluminous</b> purple cloak.</i>
