**oodles** A very great number or amount of something.

**piles** Battery consisting of voltaic cells arranged in series; the earliest electric battery devised by Volta.

**rafts** A large number or amount.

- scads** A large number or quantity.  
*They raised **scads** of children.*
- scores** A number or letter indicating quality (especially of a student's performance).
- slews** A large number or amount or extent.
- stacks** A storage device that handles data so that the next item to be retrieved is the item most recently stored (LIFO).  
*She amassed **stacks** of newspapers.*
- wads** A wad of something chewable as tobacco.

<b>cluster</b>	Form a cluster or clusters. <i>Noble metal <b>clusters</b> supported on an acidic carrier.</i>
<b>countless</b>	Too many to be counted; very many. <i>She d apologized <b>countless</b> times before.</i>
<b>gram</b>	A metric unit of weight equal to one thousandth of a kilogram.
<b>heap</b>	Form a heap. <i>She <b>heaped</b> logs on the fire.</i>
<b>inch</b>	As a unit of map scale so many inches representing one mile on the ground. <i>Eighteen <b>inches</b> of thread.</i>
<b>liter</b>	A metric unit of capacity, formerly defined as the volume of one kilogram of pure water under standard conditions; now equal to 1,000 cubic centimeters (or approximately 1.75 pints).
<b>load</b>	Place a load or large quantity of something on or in a vehicle ship container etc. <i>They go to Calais to <b>load</b> up their vans with cheap beer.</i>

<b>lot</b>	The choice resulting from deciding something by lot. <i>He will need a second <b>lot</b> of tills to handle the second currency.</i>
<b>many</b>	A quantifier that can be used with count nouns and is often preceded by `as' or `too' or `so' or `that'; amounting to a large but indefinite number. <i>A good <b>many</b>.</i>
<b>metric</b>	Relating to or denoting a metric. <i>It s easier to work in <b>metric</b>.</i>
<b>ounce</b>	A unit of apothecary weight equal to 480 grains or one twelfth of a pound. <i>Robyn summoned up every <b>ounce</b> of strength.</i>
<b><u>pack</u></b>	A quantity of fish fruit or other foods packed or canned in a particular season. <i>A <b>pack</b> of cigarettes.</i>
<b>pile</b>	Place or lay as if in a pile. <i>The teacher <b> piled</b> work on the students until the parents protested.</i>
<b><u>plurality</u></b>	The number by which plurality exceeds the number of votes cast for the candidate placed second. <i>A <b>plurality</b> of critical approaches.</i>
<b><u>pound</u></b>	A symbol for a unit of currency especially for the pound sterling in Great Britain. <i>Unlicensed dogs will be taken to the <b>pound</b>.</i>
<b>ream</b>	Enlarge with a reamer. <i>He wrote <b>reams</b> and <b>reams</b>.</i>
<b>sheaf</b>	A bundle of grain stalks laid lengthways and tied together after reaping. <i>The corn and barley had to be <b>sheafed</b> and stooked.</i>
<b><u>stack</u></b>	Fill or cover a place or surface with stacks of things. <i>The new premises provided a reading room and a <b>stack</b> room.</i>
<b><u>stacked</u></b>	Arranged in a stack. <i>Full sized washer dryers are replacing <b>stacked</b> units.</i>
<b><u>unit</u></b>	The smallest measure of investment in a unit trust. <i>The team is a <b>unit</b>.</i>
<b>weigh</b>	Balance in the hands to guess or as if to guess the weight of. <i><b>Weigh</b> yourself on the day you begin the diet.</i>
