## Associations of "Too late" (30 Words)

<b>additionally</b>	In addition, by way of addition; furthermore. <i>He serves <b>additionally</b> as the CEO.</i>
<b>adulthood</b>	The state (and responsibilities) of a person who has attained maturity. <i>Most of the larvae die although some survive to <b>adulthood</b>.</i>
<b>afternoon</b>	In the afternoon every afternoon. <i>He spent a quiet <b>afternoon</b> in the park.</i>
<b>also</b>	In addition. <i>Dyslexia <b>also</b> known as word blindness.</i>
<b>april</b>	The month following March and preceding May.
<b>belated</b>	Coming or happening later than should have been the case. <i>A <b>belated</b> birthday card.</i>
<b>besides</b>	In addition; as well. <i>I don t want to go to a restaurant <b>besides</b> we can t afford it.</i>
<b>both</b>	Used before the first of two alternatives to emphasize that the statement being made applies to each (the other alternative being introduced by ‘and’. <i><b>Both</b> girls are pretty.</i>
<b>doyen</b>	A man who is the senior member of a group. <i>He became the <b>doyen</b> of British physicists.</i>
<b>evening</b>	An evening characterized by a particular event or activity. <i>The <b>evening</b> meal.</i>
<b>excessively</b>	To a greater degree or in greater amounts than is necessary, normal, or desirable; inordinately. <i><b>Excessively</b> high taxes.</i>
<b>fifties</b>	The time of life between 50 and 60.
<b>furthermore</b>	In addition. <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time <b>furthermore</b> their quality is improving.</i>

<b><u>inordinate</u></b>	Beyond normal limits. <i>The case had taken up an <b>inordinate</b> amount of time.</i>
<b><u>likewise</u></b>	Used to introduce a point similar or related to one just made. <i>Some people have little power to do good and have <b>likewise</b> little strength to resist evil.</i>
<b>loosen</b>	Make loose or looser. <i>The noose <b>loosened</b>.</i>
<b><u>over</u></b>	A sequence of six balls bowled by a bowler from one end of the pitch after which another bowler takes over from the other end. <i>Message understood <b>over</b> and out.</i>
<b><u>overly</u></b>	Excessively. <i>She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.</i>
<b>posthumous</b>	Occurring, awarded, or appearing after the death of the originator. <i>A <b>posthumous</b> book.</i>
<b>reconvene</b>	Convene or cause to convene again, especially after a pause in proceedings. <i>The bill will be considered when the Legislature <b>reconvenes</b> next Fall.</i>
<b>retrieval</b>	(computer science) the operation of accessing information from the computer's memory. <i>My <b>retrieval</b> of people's names is very poor.</i>
<b>reversion</b>	A property to which someone has the right of reversion. <i>There was some <b>reversion</b> to polytheism.</i>
<b>similarly</b>	Used to indicate a similarity between two facts or events. <i>He was <b>similarly</b> affected.</i>
<b>sluggish</b>	Slow to respond or make progress. <i>A <b>sluggish</b> market.</i>
<b>sometime</b>	Belonging to some prior time. <i>The <b>sometime</b> editor of the paper.</i>
<b><u>subsequent</u></b>	Following in time or order. <i><b>Subsequent</b> developments.</i>
<b><u>tardy</u></b>	After the expected or usual time; delayed. <i>Please forgive this <b>tardy</b> reply.</i>
<b>timing</b>	A particular point or period of time when something happens. <i>The introduction of new signal <b>timings</b>.</i>
<b><u>undue</u></b>	Unwarranted or inappropriate because excessive or disproportionate. <i>His dress stops just short of <b>undue</b> elegance.</i>
<b><u>unwarranted</u></b>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i><b>Unwarranted</b> limitations of personal freedom.</i>
