<u>inordinate</u>	Beyond normal limits. The case had taken up an <b>inordinate</b> amount of time.
<u>likewise</u>	Used to introduce a point similar or related to one just made. Some people have little power to do good and have <b>likewise</b> little strength to resist evil.
loosen	Make loose or looser. The noose <b>loosen</b> ed.
<u>over</u>	A sequence of six balls bowled by a bowler from one end of the pitch after which another bowler takes over from the other end. <i>Message understood over and out.</i>
<u>overly</u>	Excessively. She was a jealous and <b>overly</b> possessive woman.
posthumous	Occurring, awarded, or appearing after the death of the originator. A <b>posthumous</b> book.
reconvene	Convene or cause to convene again, especially after a pause in proceedings. <i>The bill will be considered when the Legislature</i> <b>reconvene</b> s next Fall.
retrieval	(computer science) the operation of accessing information from the computer's memory. My <b>retrieval</b> of people s names is very poor.
reversion	A property to which someone has the right of reversion. <i>There was some</i> <b>reversion</b> to polytheism.
similarly	Used to indicate a similarity between two facts or events. <i>He was <b>similarly</b> affected.</i>
sluggish	Slow to respond or make progress. A <b>sluggish</b> market.
sometime	Belonging to some prior time. The <b>sometime</b> editor of the paper.
<u>subsequent</u>	Following in time or order. <b>Subsequent</b> developments.
<u>tardy</u>	After the expected or usual time; delayed. <i>Please forgive this <b>tardy</b> reply.</i>
timing	A particular point or period of time when something happens. <i>The introduction of new signal <b>timing</b>s.</i>
<u>undue</u>	Unwarranted or inappropriate because excessive or disproportionate. <i>His dress stops just short of <b>undue</b> elegance.</i>
<u>unwarranted</u>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <b>Unwarranted</b> limitations of personal freedom.
