According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “too” as an adverb can have the following definitions:

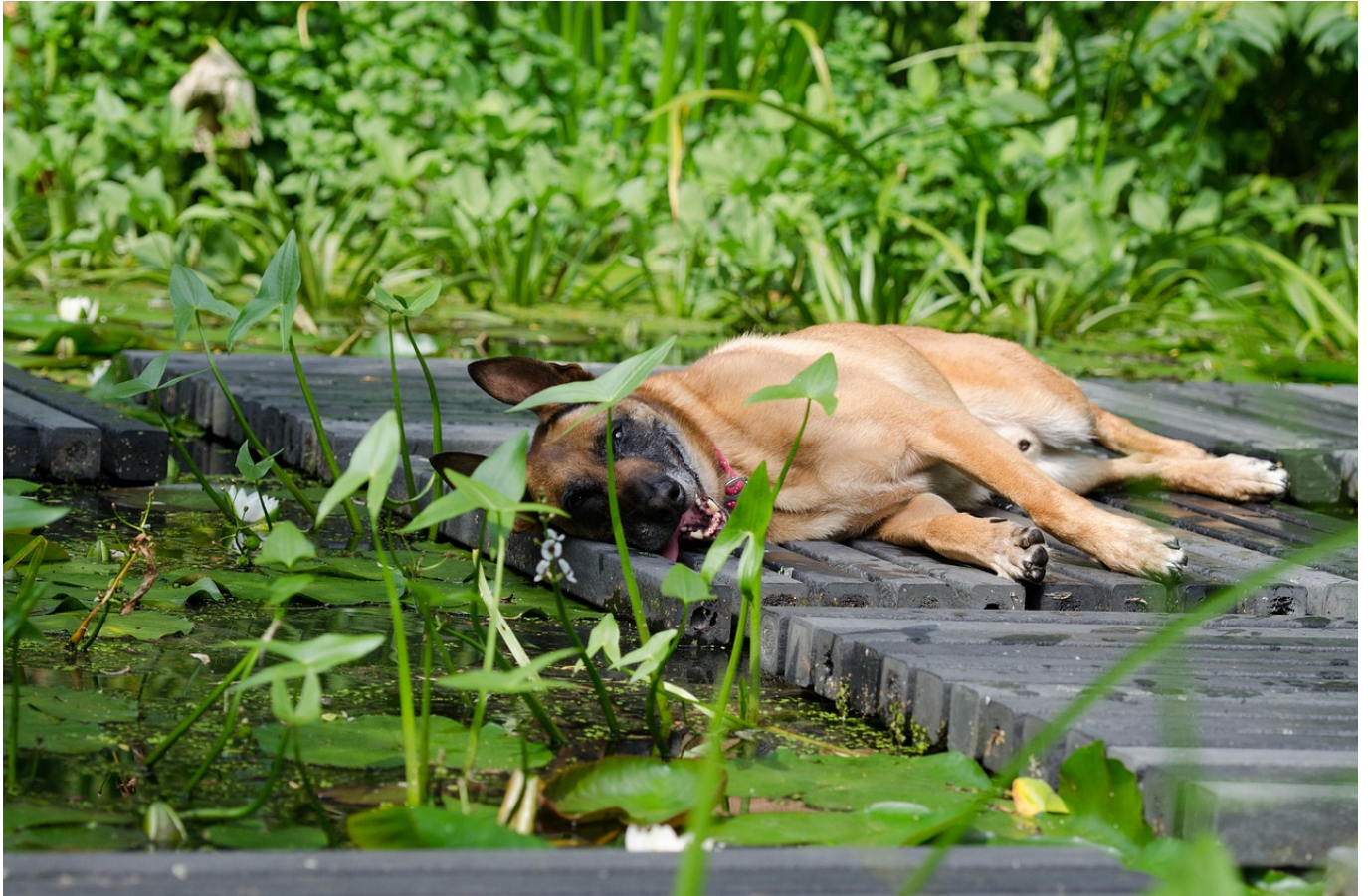
- *Moreover (used when adding a further point.*

- *To a higher degree than is desirable, permissible, or possible; excessively.*
- *In addition; also.*
- *In addition.*



Synonyms of "Too" as an adverb (21 Words)

additionally	As an extra factor or circumstance. <i>Brokers finance themselves additionally by short term borrowing.</i>
also	In addition; too. <i>A brilliant linguist he was also interested in botany.</i>
as well	To the same degree (often followed by `as.
<u>besides</u>	In addition. <i>I don t want to go to a restaurant besides we can t afford it.</i>
excessively	To a greater degree or in greater amounts than is necessary, normal, or desirable; inordinately. <i>They don t drink excessively.</i>
extremely	To a very great degree; very. <i>Extremely cold.</i>

furthermore	In addition; besides (used to introduce a fresh consideration in an argument. <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time furthermore their quality is improving.</i>
immoderately	To a degree that exceeds the bounds or reason or moderation.
in addition	To or toward the inside of.
inordinately	To an unusually or disproportionately large degree; excessively. <i>The information was inordinately vetted and censored.</i>
likewise	In a like manner; similarly. <i>Some people have little power to do good and have likewise little strength to resist evil.</i>
moreover	In addition. <i>The cellar was dark moreover mice nested there.</i>
over	Over the entire area. <i>Message understood over and out.</i>
overly	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>She was a jealous and overly possessive woman.</i>
ridiculously	So as to invite mockery or derision; absurdly. <i>It had been ridiculously easy to track him down.</i>
to too great an degree	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits.
to too great an extent	In addition.
unduly	To an undue degree. <i>There is no need to be unduly alarmed.</i>
unreasonably	To a degree that exceeds the bounds or reason or moderation. <i>Rather unreasonably perhaps Elliott is worried.</i>
very	In a high degree. <i>The very best quality.</i>
yet	From now into the future for a specified length of time. <i>A yet sadder tale.</i>



Usage Examples of "Too" as an adverb

- *He has a Mercedes, too.*
- *You're too kind.*
- *Too big.*
- *He wore suits that seemed a size too small for him.*
- *He was driving too fast.*
- *She is a grown woman, and a strong one too.*
- *Is he coming too?*



Associations of "Too" (30 Words)

additionally	Used to introduce a new fact or argument. <i>Brokers finance themselves additionally by short term borrowing.</i>
also	In addition; too. <i>Dyslexia also known as word blindness.</i>
another	Any of various alternatives; some other. <i>Put it off to another or some other day.</i>
<u>anyway</u>	Used to end a conversation, to change the subject, or to resume a subject after interruption. <i>It s too late now anyway.</i>
<u>besides</u>	In addition; as well. <i>I don t want to go to a restaurant besides we can t afford it.</i>
both	Used before the first of two alternatives to emphasize that the statement being made applies to each (the other alternative being introduced by 'and'). <i>Studies of zebra finches both in the wild and in captivity.</i>
<u>either</u>	After a negative statement used as an intensive meaning something like 'likewise' or 'also'.
exaggerated	Represented as greater than is true or reasonable. <i>Comic book characters are drawn with exaggerated features so you will remember them.</i>
except	Take exception to. <i>Five classes of advertisement are excepted from control.</i>
excessive	Unrestrained, especially with regard to feelings. <i>Excessive charges.</i>
excessively	To a degree exceeding normal or proper limits. <i>Excessively high taxes.</i>
extra	Excessive or extravagant. <i>An extra pair of shoes.</i>
extremely	To an extreme degree. <i>This is an extremely difficult thing to do.</i>
<u>furthermore</u>	In addition. <i>Computer chess games are getting cheaper all the time furthermore their quality is improving.</i>
immoderate	Beyond reasonable limits. <i>Immoderate laughter.</i>

<u>inordinate</u>	Beyond normal limits. <i>A book of inordinate length.</i>
intemperate	Having or showing a lack of self-control; immoderate. Intemperate rage.
<u>likewise</u>	Used to introduce a point similar or related to one just made. <i>The programmes of study will apply from five years of age likewise the attainment targets.</i>
more	Forming the comparative of adjectives and adverbs especially those of more than one syllable. More quickly.
<u>moreover</u>	In addition. Moreover statistics show that competition for places is growing.
<u>over</u>	Over the entire area. <i>The match is over.</i>
overdo	Do something to an excessive degree. <i>I d overdone the garlic in the curry.</i>
<u>overly</u>	Excessively. <i>She was a jealous and overly possessive woman.</i>
prolix	(of speech or writing) using or containing too many words; tediously lengthy. <i>Editing a prolix manuscript.</i>
similarly	In like or similar manner- Samuel Johnson. <i>He was similarly affected.</i>
<u>simplistic</u>	Treating complex issues and problems as if they were much simpler than they really are. Simplistic solutions.
superabundance	A quantity that is more than what is appropriate.
<u>undue</u>	Lacking justification or authorization. <i>I didn t want to show undue excitement.</i>
<u>unreasonable</u>	Beyond the limits of acceptability or fairness. Unreasonable demands.
<u>unwarranted</u>	Without a basis in reason or fact. <i>I am sure your fears are unwarranted.</i>
