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| acquisition | The action of acquiring something. <i>The acquisition of self control.</i> |
| acquirement | An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The acquisition of wealth.</i> |
| bring | Go or come after and bring or take back. <i>She brings a special atmosphere to our meetings.</i> |
| broach | (of a fish or sea mammal) rise through the water and break the surface. <i>He broached the subject he had been avoiding all evening.</i> |
| buccaneer | Live like a buccaneer. <i>The company might be a target for an individual buccaneer seeking power and prestige.</i> |
| confiscate | Appropriate (something, especially land) to the public treasury as a penalty. <i>The guards confiscated his camera.</i> |
| deprivation | The disadvantage that results from losing something. <i>Losing him is no great deprivation.</i> |
| deprive | Prevent (a person or place) from having or using something. <i>The city was deprived of its water supplies.</i> |
| dispossess | (in sport) deprive (a player) of the ball. <i>He dispossessed Hendrie and set off on a solo run.</i> |
| fetch | The action of fetching. <i>That brute Cullam fetched him a wallop.</i> |
| forfeit | The action of forfeiting something. <i>Those unable to meet their taxes were liable to forfeit their estates.</i> |
| forfeiture | Something that is lost or surrendered as a penalty. <i>Magistrates ordered the forfeiture of his computer.</i> |
| grab | Take hold of so as to seize or restrain or stop the motion of. <i>The brakes grabbed very badly.</i> |

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| have | Have or possess either in a concrete or an abstract sense. <i>Have a postdoc.</i> |
| hold | Support or hold in a certain manner. <i>This basic argument holds for almost any economic model of competition.</i> |
| impound | Place or shut up in a pound. <i>Vehicles parked where they cause an obstruction will be impounded.</i> |
| impoverish | Make poor. <i>The wars had impoverished him.</i> |
| loot | Goods or money obtained illegally. <i>A gang looted Rs 1 5 lakh from a passenger.</i> |
| own | Have something as one's own possess. <i>For your own use.</i> |
| picking | The act of picking crops or fruit or hops etc. <i>He sent the first picking of berries to the market.</i> |
| pillage | The act of stealing valuable things from a place. <i>Rebellious peasants intent on pillage.</i> |
| plunder | Plunder a town after capture. <i>Looters moved into the disaster area to plunder shops.</i> |
| procure | Cause (something) to happen. <i>He procured his wife to sign the mandate for the joint account.</i> |
| ransack | Go through (a place) stealing things and causing damage. <i>Man has ransacked the planet for fuel.</i> |
| secure | Protected against attack or other criminal activity. <i>A secure unit for young offenders.</i> |
| seize | Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one's right or possession. <i>He seized his chance to attack as Carr hesitated.</i> |
| supplant | Take the place or move into the position of. <i>The computer has supplanted the slide rule.</i> |
| usurp | Take the place of (someone in a position of power) illegally; supplant. <i>Gloom had usurped mirth at the party after the news of the terrorist act broke.</i> |
