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## Associations of "Took" (30 Words)

<b>acquisition</b>	The action of acquiring something. <i>The <b>acquisition</b> of self control.</i>
<b>bring</b>	An ability that has been acquired by training. <i>The <b>acquisition</b> of wealth.</i>
<b>broach</b>	Go or come after and bring or take back. <i>She <b>brings</b> a special atmosphere to our meetings.</i>
<b>buccaneer</b>	(of a fish or sea mammal) rise through the water and break the surface. <i>He <b>broached</b> the subject he had been avoiding all evening.</i>
<b>confiscate</b>	Live like a buccaneer. <i>The company might be a target for an individual <b>buccaneer</b> seeking power and prestige.</i>
<b>deprive</b>	Appropriate (something, especially land) to the public treasury as a penalty. <i>The guards <b>confiscated</b> his camera.</i>
<b>deprivation</b>	The disadvantage that results from losing something. <i>Losing him is no great <b>deprivation</b>.</i>
<b>deprive</b>	Prevent (a person or place) from having or using something. <i>The city was <b>deprived</b> of its water supplies.</i>
<b>dispossess</b>	(in sport) deprive (a player) of the ball. <i>He <b>dispossessed</b> Hendrie and set off on a solo run.</i>
<b>fetch</b>	The action of fetching. <i>That brute Cullam <b>fetched</b> him a wallop.</i>
<b>forfeit</b>	The action of forfeiting something. <i>Those unable to meet their taxes were liable to <b>forfeit</b> their estates.</i>
<b>forfeiture</b>	Something that is lost or surrendered as a penalty. <i>Magistrates ordered the <b>forfeiture</b> of his computer.</i>
<b>grab</b>	Take hold of so as to seize or restrain or stop the motion of. <i>The brakes <b>grabbed</b> very badly.</i>

<b>have</b>	Have or possess either in a concrete or an abstract sense. <i><b>Have</b> a postdoc.</i>
<b>hold</b>	Support or hold in a certain manner. <i>This basic argument <b>holds</b> for almost any economic model of competition.</i>
<b>impound</b>	Place or shut up in a pound. <i>Vehicles parked where they cause an obstruction will be <b>impounded</b>.</i>
<b>impoverish</b>	Make poor. <i>The wars had <b>impoverished</b> him.</i>
<b>loot</b>	Goods or money obtained illegally. <i>A gang <b>looted</b> Rs 1 5 lakh from a passenger.</i>
<b>own</b>	Have something as one's own possess. <i>For your <b>own</b> use.</i>
<b>picking</b>	The act of picking crops or fruit or hops etc. <i>He sent the first <b>picking</b> of berries to the market.</i>
<b>pillage</b>	The act of stealing valuable things from a place. <i>Rebellious peasants intent on <b>pillage</b>.</i>
<b>plunder</b>	Plunder a town after capture. <i>Looters moved into the disaster area to <b>plunder</b> shops.</i>
<b>procure</b>	Cause (something) to happen. <i>He <b>procured</b> his wife to sign the mandate for the joint account.</i>
<b>ransack</b>	Go through (a place) stealing things and causing damage. <i>Man has <b>ransacked</b> the planet for fuel.</i>
<b>secure</b>	Protected against attack or other criminal activity. <i>A <b>secure</b> unit for young offenders.</i>
<b>seize</b>	Seize and take control without authority and possibly with force take as one's right or possession. <i>He <b>seized</b> his chance to attack as Carr hesitated.</i>
<b>supplant</b>	Take the place or move into the position of. <i>The computer has <b>supplanted</b> the slide rule.</i>
<b>usurp</b>	Take the place of (someone in a position of power) illegally; supplant. <i>Gloom had <b>usurped</b> mirth at the party after the news of the terrorist act broke.</i>
