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## Associations of "Top of the line" (30 Words)

<a href="#">acme</a>	The highest point (of something). <i>His landscapes were deemed the <b>acme</b> of beauty.</i>
<b>altitude</b>	The perpendicular distance from the base of a geometric figure to the opposite vertex (or side if parallel). <i>Flight data including airspeed and <b>altitude</b>.</i>
<a href="#">apex</a>	The point on the celestial sphere toward which the sun and solar system appear to be moving relative to the fixed stars. <i>Melodic lines build up to the chorus and it <b>apexes</b> at the solo.</i>
<b>apical</b>	(of a consonant) formed with the tip of the tongue at or near the front teeth or the alveolar ridge, for example th or trilled r.
<b>apogee</b>	Apoapsis in Earth orbit; the point in its orbit where a satellite is at the greatest distance from the Earth. <i>A film which was the <b>apogee</b> of German expressionist cinema.</i>
<a href="#">cliff</a>	A steep rock face, especially at the edge of the sea. <i>A coast path along the top of rugged <b>cliffs</b>.</i>
<b>crest</b>	(of a wave) form a curling foamy top. <i>She <b>crested</b> a hill and saw the valley spread out before her.</i>
<b>jag</b>	Cut teeth into make a jagged cutting edge. <i>She <b>jagged</b> herself in the mouth.</i>
<b>ladder</b>	With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>The first time I put them on one of the stockings <b>laddered</b>.</i>
<b>lade</b>	Ship (goods) as cargo. <i>The surplus products must be <b>laden</b> on board the vessels.</i>
<a href="#">lofty</a>	(of wool and other textiles) thick and resilient. <i>An extraordinary mixture of harsh reality and <b>lofty</b> ideals.</i>
<a href="#">maximum</a>	A maximum permitted custodial sentence for an offence. <i>An offence which carries a <b>maximum</b> of 14 years.</i>

<b>meridian</b>	Relating to or situated at a meridian. <i>The <b>meridian</b> moon.</i>
<b>minaret</b>	Slender tower with balconies.
<b>nadir</b>	The lowest or most unsuccessful point in a situation. <i>Asking that question was the <b>nadir</b> of my career.</i>
<b>peak</b>	The pointed top of a mountain. <i>Just when we think we've reached <b>peak</b> the trend is showing no signs of slowing down.</i>
<b>pinnacle</b>	Set on or as if on a pinnacle. <i><b>Pinnacle</b> a pediment.</i>
<b>plateau</b>	Denoting a group of North American peoples of the high plains of western Canada and the US, including the Nez Percé. <i>The peace process had reached a <b>plateau</b>.</i>
<b>raised</b>	Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i><b>Raised</b> needlework.</i>
<b>rope</b>	Fasten with a rope. <i><b>Rope</b> the bag securely.</i>
<b>rung</b>	A level in a hierarchical structure, especially a class or career structure. <i>We must ensure that the low skilled do not get trapped on the bottom <b>rung</b>.</i>
<b>seam</b>	Put together with a seam. <i>The buried forests became <b>seams</b> of coal.</i>
<b>stepladder</b>	A short folding ladder with flat steps and a small platform.
<b>summit</b>	Reach the summit of a mountain or hill. <i>Many mountaineers go up Mt Everest but not all <b>summit</b>.</i>
<b>superlative</b>	The superlative form of an adjective or adverb. <i>Least famous is the <b>superlative</b> degree of the adjective famous.</i>
<b>unsurpassed</b>	Better or greater than any other. <i>The quality of workmanship is <b>unsurpassed</b>.</i>
<b>up</b>	Lift something up. <i>They were <b>up</b> at Cambridge about the same time.</i>
<b>upper</b>	Superior in rank or accomplishment. <i>Leather <b>uppers</b>.</i>
<b>uppermost</b>	In or into the most prominent position, as in the mind. <i>Her father was <b>uppermost</b> in her mind.</i>
<b>zenith</b>	The time at which something is most powerful or successful. <i>The sun was well past the <b>zenith</b>.</i>
