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Associations of "Top of the line" (30 Words)

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| acme | The highest point (of something). <i>His landscapes were deemed the acme of beauty.</i> |
| altitude | The perpendicular distance from the base of a geometric figure to the opposite vertex (or side if parallel). <i>Flight data including airspeed and altitude.</i> |
| apex | The point on the celestial sphere toward which the sun and solar system appear to be moving relative to the fixed stars. <i>Melodic lines build up to the chorus and it apexes at the solo.</i> |
| apical | (of a consonant) formed with the tip of the tongue at or near the front teeth or the alveolar ridge, for example th or trilled r. |
| apogee | Apoapsis in Earth orbit; the point in its orbit where a satellite is at the greatest distance from the Earth. <i>A film which was the apogee of German expressionist cinema.</i> |
| cliff | A steep rock face, especially at the edge of the sea. <i>A coast path along the top of rugged cliffs.</i> |
| crest | (of a wave) form a curling foamy top. <i>She crested a hill and saw the valley spread out before her.</i> |
| jag | Cut teeth into make a jagged cutting edge. <i>She jagged herself in the mouth.</i> |
| ladder | With reference to tights or stockings develop or cause to develop a ladder. <i>The first time I put them on one of the stockings laddered.</i> |
| lade | Ship (goods) as cargo. <i>The surplus products must be laden on board the vessels.</i> |
| lofty | (of wool and other textiles) thick and resilient. <i>An extraordinary mixture of harsh reality and lofty ideals.</i> |
| maximum | A maximum permitted custodial sentence for an offence. <i>An offence which carries a maximum of 14 years.</i> |

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| meridian | Relating to or situated at a meridian. <i>The meridian moon.</i> |
| minaret | Slender tower with balconies. |
| nadir | The lowest or most unsuccessful point in a situation. <i>Asking that question was the nadir of my career.</i> |
| peak | The pointed top of a mountain. <i>Just when we think we've reached peak the trend is showing no signs of slowing down.</i> |
| pinnacle | Set on or as if on a pinnacle. <i>Pinnacle a pediment.</i> |
| plateau | Denoting a group of North American peoples of the high plains of western Canada and the US, including the Nez Percé. <i>The peace process had reached a plateau.</i> |
| raised | Embellished with a raised pattern created by pressure or embroidery. <i>Raised needlework.</i> |
| rope | Fasten with a rope. <i>Rope the bag securely.</i> |
| rung | A level in a hierarchical structure, especially a class or career structure. <i>We must ensure that the low skilled do not get trapped on the bottom rung.</i> |
| seam | Put together with a seam. <i>The buried forests became seams of coal.</i> |
| stepladder | A short folding ladder with flat steps and a small platform. |
| summit | Reach the summit of a mountain or hill. <i>Many mountaineers go up Mt Everest but not all summit.</i> |
| superlative | The superlative form of an adjective or adverb. <i>Least famous is the superlative degree of the adjective famous.</i> |
| unsurpassed | Better or greater than any other. <i>The quality of workmanship is unsurpassed.</i> |
| up | Lift something up. <i>They were up at Cambridge about the same time.</i> |
| upper | Superior in rank or accomplishment. <i>Leather uppers.</i> |
| uppermost | In or into the most prominent position, as in the mind. <i>Her father was uppermost in her mind.</i> |
| zenith | The time at which something is most powerful or successful. <i>The sun was well past the zenith.</i> |
