- *The configuration of a surface and the relations among its man-made and natural features.*
- *A detailed description or representation on a map of the physical features of an area.*
- *Precise detailed study of the surface features of a region.*
- *The distribution of parts or features on the surface of or within an organ or organism.*

beach	Run or haul up a boat or ship on to a beach. <i>He managed to beach a fine trout.</i>
biodiversity	The diversity of plant and animal life in a particular habitat (or in the world as a whole). <i>A high level of biodiversity is desirable.</i>
boundary	A line determining the limits of an area. <i>A county boundary.</i>
coast	The Pacific coast of North America. <i>The coast is clear.</i>
continent	Any of the world's main continuous expanses of land (Europe, Asia, Africa, North and South America, Australia, Antarctica). <i>Pioneers had to cross the continent on foot.</i>
foreshore	The part of the seashore between the highwater mark and the low-water mark.
geology	A science that deals with the history of the earth as recorded in rocks. <i>The geology of the Outer Hebrides.</i>
island	A thing regarded as resembling an island especially in being isolated detached or surrounded in some way. <i>This island nation.</i>
isle	An island or peninsula, especially a small one. <i>Crusoe s fabled isle.</i>
land	Put someone or something on land from a boat. <i>A fly landed on Tom s nose.</i>
layer	Arrange in a layer or layers. <i>They can be increased from cuttings and layers.</i>
marine	Relating to or found in the sea. <i>Marine plants and animals such as seaweed and whales.</i>
nature	The natural physical world including plants and animals and landscapes etc. <i>It is impossible to change the laws of nature.</i>
ocean	A very large expanse or quantity. <i>They scramble across the beach to the ocean and plunge into the surf.</i>
offshore	Towards the sea from the land. <i>Offshore politics.</i>
outrigger	A boat fitted with an outrigger.

outside	Leading to or from the outside. <i>Anne put the outside lights on.</i>
peninsula	A piece of land almost surrounded by water or projecting out into a body of water.
sea	Used to refer to waves as opposed to calm sea. <i>A sea view.</i>
seabed	The ground under the sea; the ocean floor.
shell	Remove the shell or pod from a nut or seed. <i>Several villages north of the security zone were shelled.</i>
soil	Make soiled filthy or dirty. <i>Good agricultural soil.</i>
stratigraphy	The branch of geology concerned with the order and relative position of strata and their relationship to the geological timescale. <i>You can find materials at the surface which are samples from the deeper stratigraphy.</i>
surface	Relating to or found on the surface of something. <i>They skimmed over the surface of the water.</i>
topsoil	The top layer of soil. <i>Keep all the topsoil you remove you re bound to find a use for it later.</i>
underwater	Growing or remaining under water. <i>They learn to navigate underwater at night.</i>
undulation	A movement up and down or back and forth. <i>The soft undulation of the waves animates the scene.</i>
waterfront	The area of a city (such as a harbor or dockyard) alongside a body of water. <i>Liverpool s waterfront.</i>
wave	Set waves in. <i>She waved him goodbye.</i>
