alone	On one's own. Could be <b>alone</b> in a crowded room.
<u>asunder</u>	Apart. As wide <b>asunder</b> as pole from pole.
avulsion	The sudden separation of land from one property and its attachment to another, especially by flooding or a change in the course of a river.
cloistered	Kept away from the outside world; sheltered. The <b>cloistered</b> academic world of books.
detached	Being or feeling set or kept apart from others. <b>Detached</b> youth workers.
dichotomous	(of branching) in which the axis is divided into two branches. A <b>dichotomous</b> view of the world.
<u>disjointed</u>	Taken apart at the joints. A <b>disjointed</b> fowl.
farther	To or at a greater extent or degree or a more advanced stage further is used more often than farther in this abstract sense. <i>Farther</i> north.
individually	Apart from others. Partnerships and <b>individually</b> owned firms.
individuation	The quality of being individual.
isolated	Being or feeling set or kept apart from others- Sherwood Anderson. <i>He lived a very</i> <b>isolated</b> <i>existence</i> .
<u>isolation</u>	A country's withdrawal from international politics. <b>Isolation</b> from family and friends may also contribute to anxiety.
partition	The act of dividing or partitioning separation by the creation of a boundary that divides or keeps apart. The cafe was divided up by glass <b>partition</b> s.



<u>reclusive</u>	Avoiding the company of other people; solitary. <i>He led a <b>reclusive</b> life.</i>
<u>remote</u>	A remote control device. A second feature allows pagers to be alerted from <b>remote</b> alarm sensors.
rend	Tear (something) into pieces. The speculation and confusion which was <b>rend</b> ing the civilized world.
rive	Split or tear apart violently. The party was <b>rive</b> n by disagreements over Europe.
schism	The formal separation of a Church into two Churches or the secession of a group owing to doctrinal and other differences. The persistence of this group could produce <b>schism</b> within society.
secluded	Providing privacy or seclusion. The gardens are quiet and <b>secluded</b> .
segregation	A social system that provides separate facilities for minority groups. The <b>segregation</b> of pupils with learning difficulties.
separable	Able to be separated or treated separately. The siamese twins were not considered <b>separable</b> .
separate	A garment that can be purchased separately and worn in combinations with other garments. <i>A problem consisting of two <b>separate</b> issues.</i>
separated	Separated at the joint. A <b>separated</b> shoulder.
separately	Apart from others. They arrived together but left <b>separately</b> .
<u>separation</u>	The action or state of moving or being moved apart. Fragile items require <b>separation</b> and cushioning.
<u>sever</u>	Put an end to (a connection or relationship); break off. The head was <b>sever</b> ed from the body.
<u>solitary</u>	(of a flower or other part) borne singly. Each spider like bloom is <b>solitary</b> .
<u>split</u>	The act of rending or ripping or splitting something. A 75 25 <b>split</b> of proceeds.
unattached	Not associated in an exclusive sexual relationship. She began to wonder if he was <b>unattached</b> .
uncommitted	Not committed to a cause, activity, etc. There is very little <b>uncommitted</b> money to fund new policies.
