avalanche	A slide of large masses of snow and ice and mud down a mountain. <i>He was swept to his death by an avalanche in 1988.</i>
barrage	The heavy fire of artillery to saturate an area rather than hit a specific target. <i>A barrage of questions.</i>
battery	A device that produces electricity; may have several primary or secondary cells arranged in parallel or series. <i>Battery hens.</i>
<u>cascade</u>	A succession of stages or operations or processes or units. <i>The waterfall raced down in a series of cascades.</i>
cloudburst	A heavy rain.
current	A flow of electricity through a conductor. <i>The current of history.</i>
deluge	A great quantity of something arriving at the same time. <i>A deluge of rain hit the plains.</i>
downpour	A heavy fall of rain. <i>A sudden downpour had filled the gutters and drains.</i>

effusion	Flow under pressure. <i>A massive effusion of poisonous gas.</i>
flood	The act of flooding filling to overflowing. <i>His column provoked a flood of complaints.</i>
flow	Something that resembles a flowing stream in moving continuously. <i>The flow of thought.</i>
fountain	A natural flow of ground water. <i>Little fountains of dust.</i>
gushing	A sudden rapid flow (as of water).
<u>hail</u>	Precipitation of ice pellets when there are strong rising air currents. <i>A hail of pebbles.</i>
inundation	An overwhelming number or amount. <i>The annual inundation of the Nile.</i>
onslaught	An offensive against an enemy (using weapons). <i>A series of onslaughts on the citadel.</i>
outburst	An unrestrained expression of emotion. <i>A very dramatic outburst of neutrons.</i>
outpouring	The pouring forth of a fluid. <i>She attacked him with an outpouring of words.</i>
overflow	The flowing over of a liquid. <i>To accommodate the overflow five more offices have been built.</i>
pelter	A heavy rain. <i>The police were too busy to chase the pelters.</i>
rain	Falls of rain. <i>He fell under the rain of blows.</i>
rainstorm	A storm with heavy rain.
rush	A sudden thrill or feeling of euphoria such as experienced after taking certain drugs. <i>There was a rush for the door.</i>
shower	An act of washing oneself in a shower. <i>Look at this lot what a shower.</i>
soaker	A person who drinks alcohol to excess habitually.
spate	The occurrence of a water flow resulting from sudden rain or melting snow. <i>A spate of attacks on holidaymakers.</i>
<u>stream</u>	Something that resembles a flowing stream in moving continuously. <i>Two streams of development run through American history.</i>

- tide** Something that may increase or decrease like the tides of the sea.
*The rising **tide** covered the wharf.*
- volley** A tennis return made by hitting the ball before it bounces.
*He unleashed a **volley** of angry questions.*
- waterspout** A channel through which water is discharged (especially one used for drainage from the gutters of a roof).



Usage Examples of "Torrent" as a noun

- *After the rains, the stream becomes a raging torrent.*
- *A torrent of abuse.*
- *She was subjected to a torrent of abuse.*
- *Rain poured down in torrents.*
- *The houses were swept away in the torrent.*



Associations of "Torrent" (30 Words)

cloudburst	A heavy rain.
cyclone	(meteorology) rapid inward circulation of air masses about a low pressure center; circling counterclockwise in the northern hemisphere and clockwise in the southern.
deluge	Charge someone with too many tasks. <i>He has been deluged with offers of work.</i>
downpour	A heavy rain. <i>A sudden downpour had filled the gutters and drains.</i>
drown	Deliberately kill a person or animal by drowning. <i>His voice was drowned out by the approaching engine noise.</i>
embankment	A long artificial mound of stone or earth; built to hold back water or to support a road or as protection. <i>A railway embankment.</i>
flood	Cover or submerge an area with water in a flood. <i>Flood the market with tennis shoes.</i>

floodplain	A low plain adjacent to a river that is formed chiefly of river sediment and is subject to flooding.
flow	Cause to flow. <i>Water flowed into the cave.</i>
flowage	A body of water that has been created by deliberately flooding an area. <i>Many campsites were located near the flowage.</i>
freshet	A rush of fresh water flowing into the sea.
gust	Of the wind blow in gusts. <i>The tree was bent almost double by the gust.</i>
<u>hurricane</u>	A severe tropical cyclone usually with heavy rains and winds moving at 63-136 knots (12 on the Beaufort scale). <i>The manager resigned in a hurricane of disagreement.</i>
<u>influx</u>	An arrival or entry of large numbers of people or things. <i>A massive influx of tourists.</i>
inundate	Fill or cover completely, usually with water. <i>The islands may be the first to be inundated as sea levels rise.</i>
inundation	Flooding. <i>Areas were at risk of inundation.</i>
outpouring	A natural flow of ground water. <i>She attacked him with an outpouring of words.</i>
overflow	Overflow with a certain feeling. <i>There was some overflow after heavy rainfall.</i>
<u>overwhelm</u>	Overcome, as with emotions or perceptual stimuli. <i>They were overwhelmed by farewell messages.</i>
penstock	Conduit that carries a rapid flow of water controlled by a sluiceway.
rainfall	The fall of rain. <i>The absorption of further supplies from rainfalls.</i>
rainstorm	A storm with rain.
runoff	The occurrence of surplus liquid (as water) exceeding the limit or capacity.
squall	Blow in a squall. <i>When it squalls a prudent sailor reefs his sails.</i>
<u>storm</u>	Attack by storm attack suddenly. <i>It was storming all night.</i>
<u>submerge</u>	Sink below the surface; go under or as if under water. <i>Submerge your head completely.</i>
<u>torrential</u>	Relating to or resulting from the action of a torrent. <i>Torrential applause.</i>

tsunami

A cataclysm resulting from a destructive sea wave caused by an earthquake or volcanic eruption.

wave

A shape regarded as resembling a breaking wave.
