### **Definitions of "Torrential" as an adjective**

According to the [Oxford Dictionary of English](#), “torrential” as an adjective can have the following definitions:

- *Relating to or resulting from the action of a torrent.*
- *(of water) flowing rapidly and with force.*
- *Resembling a torrent in force and abundance.*
- *(of rain) falling rapidly and in copious quantities.*
- *Pouring in abundance.*
- *Resembling a torrent in force and abundance- Winthrop Sargeant.*

<b><u>copious</u></b>	Affording an abundant supply. <b><i>Copious</i></b> provisions.
<b>heavy</b>	Large and powerful especially designed for heavy loads or rough work. <b><i>Heavy</i></b> traffic.
<b><u>rapid</u></b>	Happening in a short time or at a great rate. They made a <b><i>rapid</i></b> exit.
<b><u>relentless</u></b>	Never-ceasing. <b><i>Relentless</i></b> persecution.
<b><u>severe</u></b>	Severely simple. <b><i>Severe</i></b> pain.
<b>violent</b>	Marked by extreme intensity of emotions or convictions inclined to react violently fervid. A <b><i>violent</i></b> noise.

<b>blizzard</b>	A severe snowstorm with high winds. A <b>blizzard</b> of forms.
<b>blowing</b>	Processing that involves blowing a gas.
<b>cloudburst</b>	A sudden violent rainstorm.
<b>cyclone</b>	(meteorology) rapid inward circulation of air masses about a low pressure center; circling counterclockwise in the northern hemisphere and clockwise in the southern.
<b>deluge</b>	Charge someone with too many tasks. <i>This may be the worst <b>deluge</b> in living memory.</i>
<b>downpour</b>	A heavy rain. <i>A sudden <b>downpour</b> had filled the gutters and drains.</i>
<b>flood</b>	Of a flood force someone to leave their home. A <b>flood</b> barrier.

<b>flowage</b>	The act of flooding; filling to overflowing. <i>Many campsites were located near the <b>flowage</b>.</i>
<b><u>gale</u></b>	An outburst of laughter. <i>It was blowing a <b>gale</b>.</i>
<b>gust</b>	Of the wind blow in gusts. <i>The tree was bent almost double by the <b>gust</b>.</i>
<b><u>hail</u></b>	Hail falls. <i>A <b>hail</b> of bullets.</i>
<b>heavy</b>	A thing such as a vehicle that is large or heavy of its kind. <i>A <b>heavy</b> thundery sky.</i>
<b><u>hurricane</u></b>	A severe tropical cyclone usually with heavy rains and winds moving at 63-136 knots (12 on the Beaufort scale). <i>A powerful <b>hurricane</b> hit the Florida coast.</i>
<b>monsoon</b>	The rainy season accompanying the wet monsoon.
<b>rain</b>	Of the sky the clouds etc send down rain. <i>The low sky <b>rain</b>ing over tower d Camelot.</i>
<b>rainfall</b>	Water falling in drops from vapor condensed in the atmosphere. <i>Wildebeest sense distant <b>rainfall</b>.</i>
<b>rainstorm</b>	A storm with heavy rain.
<b>season</b>	A time of year traditionally adopted by the English upper classes for a series of fashionable social events. <i>To everything there is a <b>season</b>.</i>
<b>snow</b>	A layer of snowflakes white crystals of frozen water covering the ground. <i>They would <b>snow</b> the public into believing that all was well.</i>
<b>squall</b>	Blow in a squall. <i>When it <b>squalls</b> a prudent sailor reefs his sails.</i>
<b><u>storm</u></b>	Attack by storm attack suddenly. <i>He <b>stormed</b> out of the house.</i>
<b><u>swirl</u></b>	Cause to move in a twisting or spiralling pattern. <i><b>Swirls</b> of dust swept across the floor.</i>
<b><u>tempest</u></b>	A violent wind. <i>A <b>tempest</b> swept over the island.</i>
<b><u>thunderstorm</u></b>	A storm with thunder and lightning and typically also heavy rain or hail.
<b><u>tornado</u></b>	A purified and potent form of cocaine that is smoked rather than snorted; highly addictive. <i>Teenagers caught up in a <b>tornado</b> of sexual confusion.</i>

<u><b>torrent</b></u>	A heavy rain. <i>The houses were swept away in the <b>torrent</b>.</i>
<b>typhoon</b>	A tropical cyclone occurring in the western Pacific or Indian oceans.
<u><b>weather</b></u>	Change under the action or influence of the weather. <i>Stone walls provide shelter from wind and <b>weather</b>.</i>
<u><b>whistle</b></u>	Blow a whistle especially as a signal. <i>The bullets <b>whistled</b> past him.</i>
<u><b>windy</b></u>	Using or containing too many words. <i>Long winded or <b>windy</b> speakers.</i>
