A violent noise.






Usage Examples of "Torrential" as an adjective

cloudburst A sudden violent rainstorm.

(meteorology) rapid inward circulation of air masses about a low pressure

deluge Charge someone with too many tasks.

A powerful **hurricane** hit the Florida coast.

monsoon The rainy season accompanying the wet monsoon.

rain Of the sky the clouds etc send down rain.

The low sky **rain**ing over tower d Camelot.

rainfall Water falling in drops from vapor condensed in the atmosphere.

Wildebeest sense distant rainfall.

rainstorm A storm with heavy rain.

A time of year traditionally adopted by the English upper classes for a

season series of fashionable social events.

To everything there is a **season**.

A layer of snowflakes white crystals of frozen water covering the ground.

Blow in a squall.

squallWhen it **squall**s a prudent sailor reefs his sails.

storm Attack by storm attack suddenly.

swirl Cause to move in a twisting or spiralling pattern.

thunderstorm A storm with thunder and lightning and typically also heavy rain or hail.
