### Definitions of "Torture" as a noun

- *Great physical or mental suffering or anxiety.*
- *The act of distorting something so it seems to mean something it was not intended to mean.*
- *Intense feelings of suffering; acute mental or physical pain.*
- *Extreme mental distress.*
- *The deliberate, systematic, or wanton infliction of physical or mental suffering by one*

*or more persons in an attempt to force another person to yield information or to make a confession or for any other reason.*

- *Unbearable physical pain.*

<b>abuse</b>	The improper use of something. <i>A black eye and other signs of physical <b>abuse</b>.</i>
<u><b>agony</b></u>	Intense feelings of suffering; acute mental or physical pain. <i>He crashed to the ground in <b>agony</b>.</i>
<u><b>anguish</b></u>	Severe mental or physical pain or suffering. <i>She shut her eyes in <b>anguish</b>.</i>
<b>distortion</b>	A shape resulting from distortion. <i>We re fed up with the media s continuing <b>distortion</b> of our issues.</i>
<u><b>horror</b></u>	A thing causing a feeling of horror. <i>The <b>horrors</b> of civil war.</i>
<b>infliction of pain</b>	An act causing pain or damage.  A primitive method of determining a person's guilt or innocence by subjecting the accused person to dangerous or painful tests believed to be under divine control; escape was usually taken as a sign of innocence. <i><b>Ordeals</b> conducted in the twelfth century.</i>
<b>overrefinement</b>	The act of distorting something so it seems to mean something it was not intended to mean.
<b>pain</b>	Mental suffering or distress. <i>The <b>pain</b> of loneliness.</i>
<u><b>straining</b></u>	Difficulty that causes worry or emotional tension- R.J.Samuelson.
<b>suffering</b>	Psychological suffering. <i>His disregard for the <b>sufferings</b> of his fellow countrymen.</i>
<b>torment</b>	A feeling of intense annoyance caused by being tormented. <i>The journey must have been a <b>torment</b> for them.</i>
<b>torturing</b>	Intense feelings of suffering; acute mental or physical pain. <i>It required unnatural <b>torturing</b> to extract a confession.</i>
<u><b>trial</b></u>	A test of individual ability on a motorcycle over rough ground or on a road. <i>The editor was summoned to stand <b>trial</b> for libel.</i>
<b>twisting</b>	A hairdo formed by braiding or twisting the hair. <i>It broke off after much <b>twisting</b>.</i>

## Synonyms of "Torture" as a verb (13 Words)

### [afflict](#)

(of a celestial body) be in a stressful aspect with (another celestial body or a point on the ecliptic.

*His younger child was **afflicted** with a skin disease.*

### **agonize**

Cause to agonize.

*A question which will **agonize** the technocrats.*

### **cause agony to**

Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.

### **cause suffering to**

Cause to do; cause to act in a specified manner.

### **distress**

Bring into difficulties or distress especially financial hardship.

*The manner in which leather jackets are industrially **distressed**.*

<b>excruciate</b>	Torment (someone) physically or mentally. <i>I stand back <b>excruciated</b> by the possibility.</i>
<b>harrow</b>	Draw a harrow over land. <i>They ploughed and <b>harrowed</b> the heavy clay.</i>
<b>inflict anguish on</b>	Impose something unpleasant.
<b>inflict pain on</b>	Impose something unpleasant.
<b>inflict suffering on</b>	Impose something unpleasant.
<u><b>plague</b></u>	Cause continual trouble or distress to. <i>He has been <b>plagued</b> by ill health.</i>
<b>rack</b>	Go at a rack. <i>He was <b>racked</b> with guilt.</i>
<b>torment</b>	Torment emotionally or mentally. <i>Every day I have kids <b>tormenting</b> me because they know I live alone.</i>



## Usage Examples of "Torture" as a verb

- *His tortured mind.*
- *Most of the victims had been brutally tortured.*
- *He was tortured by grief.*



## Associations of "Torture" (30 Words)

<b><u>anguish</u></b>	Cause emotional anguish or make miserable. <i>Philip gave a cry of <b>anguish</b>.</i>
<b>atonement</b>	The action of making amends for a wrong or injury. <i>He submitted his resignation as an act of <b>atonement</b>.</i>
<b>confess</b>	Confess to a punishable or reprehensible deed usually under pressure. <i>150 people <b>confessed</b> faith in Christ.</i>
<b><u>confession</u></b>	The religious body or Church sharing a confession of faith. <i>Proof of this crime must be established by <b>confession</b>.</i>
<b>contrition</b>	The state of feeling remorseful and penitent. <i>To show <b>contrition</b> for his crime he offered to do community service.</i> (with reference to a person) in a way that wilfully causes pain or suffering to others.
<b>cruelly</b>	<i>He marries Edgar's sister Isabella and <b>cruelly</b> ill treats her.</i>
<b>distortion</b>	A shape resulting from distortion. <i>The virus causes <b>distortion</b> of the leaves.</i>
<b>extrajudicial</b>	(of a sentence) not legally authorized. <i>An <b>extrajudicial</b> offer does not carry the same penalty in expenses.</i>
<b>forgive</b>	Stop blaming or grant forgiveness. <i>I'll never <b>forgive</b> David for the way he treated her.</i>
<b>guilty</b>	Culpable of or responsible for a specified wrongdoing. <i><b>Guilty</b> of murder.</i>
<b><u>misdeed</u></b>	Improper or wicked or immoral behavior. <i>His past <b>misdeeds</b> were forgiven.</i>
<b><u>mistreat</u></b>	Treat (a person or animal) badly, cruelly, or unfairly. <i>He denied <b>mistreating</b> his workers.</i>
<b>penance</b>	Impose a penance on. <i>The Bishop <b>penanced</b> him severely for his conduct.</i>
<b>penitence</b>	The action of feeling or showing sorrow and regret for having done wrong; repentance. <i>A public display of <b>penitence</b>.</i>
<b>penitent</b>	(Roman Catholic Church) a person who repents for wrongdoing (a Roman Catholic may be admitted to penance under the direction of a confessor). <i>A <b>penitent</b> expression.</i>
<b>penitential</b>	Relating to or expressing penitence or penance. <i><b>Penitential</b> tears.</i>

<b>regret</b>	Express with regret. <i>I <b>regret</b> to say that you did not gain admission to Harvard.</i>
<b>relentlessly</b>	In an unceasingly intense or harsh way. <i>He worked <b>relentlessly</b>.</i>
<u>remorse</u>	Deep regret or guilt for a wrong committed. <i>They were filled with <b>remorse</b> and shame.</i>
<b>remorseful</b>	Filled with remorse; sorry. <i>The defendant was <b>remorseful</b> for what he had done.</i>
<b>repent</b>	Feel remorse for; feel sorry for; be contrite about. <i>Marian came to <b>repent</b> her hasty judgement.</i>
<u>repentance</u>	The action of repenting; sincere regret or remorse. <i>Each person who turns to God in genuine <b>repentance</b> and faith will be saved.</i>
<b>repentant</b>	Feeling or expressing remorse for misdeeds. <i>He is truly <b>repentant</b> for his incredible naivety and stupidity.</i>
<b>rue</b>	Leaves sometimes used for flavoring fruit or claret cup but should be used with great caution: can cause irritation like poison ivy. <i>To his <b>rue</b> the error cost him the game.</i>
<b>ruthlessly</b>	In a ruthless manner. <i>They fell prey to money lenders who <b>ruthlessly</b> exploited them.</i>
<b>sadistic</b>	Deriving pleasure from inflicting pain, suffering, or humiliation on others. <i>A <b>sadistic</b> killer.</i>
<u>sin</u>	Commit a sin violate a law of God or a moral law. <i>I <b>sinned</b> and brought shame down on us.</i>
<u>sinner</u>	A person who transgresses against divine law by committing an immoral act or acts. <i>God forgives repentant <b>sinner</b>s.</i>
<b>torment</b>	Torment emotionally or mentally. <i>So great was his harassment that he wanted to destroy his <b>tormentors</b>.</i>
<u>trial</u>	Of a horse dog or other animal compete in trials. <i>A <b>trial</b> of progesterone failed to relieve the pain.</i>
